In 1841 Francisco Vasquez de Coronado and a party of 30 Spanish cavalary were the first white men to set foot on the territory now known as the great state of Nebraska. About the year 1700 French explorers, fur traders and trappers began to venture up the Missouri River to Nebraska shores. In the years 1739-1740 the Mallet brothers and a party of Frenchmen crossed the region from East to West, and were responsible for naming the Platte River. While trading posts in the territory existed as early as 1795, the more important early white settlement was Fort Atkinson. This fort, founded in 1819 on the present site of Fort Calhoun, was a military post of 1,000 men, and the center of the first white industry and agriculture. The name, "Nebraska," was derived from the Otoe Indian name "Nebrath-ka," meaning "Shallow Water," after the Platte River.

Even in those early settlement days, ploneers inaugurated a system of trades and services that was to eventually become a part of the daily lives of over a million people. In those early days with the state serving as the principal gateway to the Wast, tewns and settlements were developed and served the meeds of those who followed the Overland, Oregon, and Mormon trails. Today, most of these same towns still exist, offering comfortable living to their schabitants.

From this early historical haginaing, then, Nebraska has continued to grow in wealth and importance. Today, Nebraskans, who spring from hardy stock and guarded by excellent medical facilities, are a healthy and happy lot.







A Look at Ourselves

Wayne city government got a good look at itself last Thurnday through the eyes of the folks who come to our city the farmers who live around us. And many of the ideas extressed by the "Council for the Day" were good. We also found out how the people we serve like our improvement.

In general, we seem to be doing all right. The new stop and go lights on Main street were hearthy approved. That is good to know, for some of as here didn't like em ourselves at first but we have been won over, too.

It was suggested by the Farmer-Manager day council that the city get busy and trim the tree hranches that hang over the street up at the corner of Fourth and Main—so a driver can see the stop light there as he comes down the hill into the business section. Yes, that is certainly necessary. Many of us have been fighting the same tree for a squint at the light, but we must have thought it had to stay there. Let's get it out now.

But the discussion of the Farmer-Council in favor of parking meters was indeed a surprise. Perhaps just because we don't like the duri things, we thought no one else did. But parking for people coming into Wayne is a problem. At busy hours there isn't a place to park in close.

Of course it isn't necessary to park in close all the time. We think nothing of driving a considerable distance to a city—then parking four or five blocks, maybe more, from where we want to go.

more, from where we want to go.

However, the parking problem could be greatly relieved evernight if all business and professional people of the city would just rule their own cars off the "close in" parking spaces. A quick count of the business occupants of one building, upstairs and down, totals at least 16 cars driven to work—and parked. There are only 14 parking areas (and that's certainly all there is room for) in a half block on each side of Main street.

Believe it or not, little of the defense dollar goes for the purchase of actual fighting equipment. Of the billions of dollars spent for national defense, only about 18 cents of every dollar goes for guns and ammunition and tanks for the ground troops, aircraft for filers and ships for the Navy. The largest single part of the dollar—40 cents—is used for pay, food, clothing and transportation.

'Eggs' or 'How to Lose Money'

Eggs' or How to Lose Money'

In spite of the "cold war" against Communists in Europe, the United States during the first 11 months of the last fiscal year imported over 15 million dozen Manchurian dried legis from Communist China at a time when the Department of Agriculture was buying up eggs in this country to bolster prices. This practice not only is costly to American taxpayers but also provides the dollar exchange to finance subversive activities here and to buy materials with a high war potential which may be used against our doys in Korea and other parts of the world The Administration has the power to stop this trade.

The Department of Agriculture now owns nearly 107 million pounds of dried eggs, of which nearly 75 million pounds have been purchased this year in price support operations. Because of the large stock on hand, the support level was set at 25 cents in 1943.

During the past six months, the United

During the past six months, the United States sold Britain, at approximately 25 cents a pound, over 30 million pounds of dried eggs which had cost our government the set price of \$1.26 a pound. The purchase was handled through the Economic Cooperation Administration. British citizens pay \$1.36 per pound for eggs, giving their government more than a dollar a point profit on the transaction at the expense of the American taxpayer. Recently the British Ministry of Food contracted with the Chinese Communists for 44 million peunds of dried eggs at prices slightly below those quoted and payable in Marshall Plen funds.


