equipment will probably be completed by the end of this week.

The new equipment will give up to 100 lbs. of pressure to the spray from the city's street cleaning truck; it will be sufficient to clean city streets from gutter to gutter.

Old equipment, of a lower pressure, left three or four feet of mud out into the street from each gutter. Several businessmen had complained about the inconvenience.

Iver Jensen reported that some Wayne and nearby farmers dumped their refuse anywhere on the city dump grounds, thereby making it impossible for other people to drive their cars or trucks to the dumping area. Council members proposed that dumping hours be established to improve improvement in dumping practices shown.

Work Activity Reports

The council also discussed the possibility of having city employees fill in daily reports of work activities. The impetus for the discussion were several reports that some city employees were not putting in their full time.

Some of the complaints may have been made by citizens who didn't realize that most of the employees start work at 5 a.m. and are through by 3 p.m.

The big drawbacks to work reports, as pointed up by council members, are: Who would check them? And, would filling in reports take too much time?

There Is No State Like Nebraska

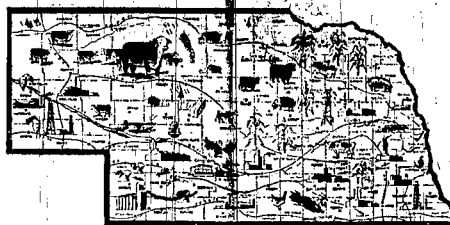
Nebraska this year will boast 88 County Fairs in addition to its State Fair



IMPORTANT TO NEBRASKA ITS STATE AND COUNTY FAIRS

In June, 1868, when Indian skirmishes were still common, and just a little over a year after Nebraska had been admitted to the Union, the State Board of Agriculture met "to take into consideration the propriety of holding a fair." At this meeting it was decided that such an exposition should take place, and in July the board met once again to choose a location and the dates on which it would be held. Invitations were received from two cities, each offering special inducements that were considered by the board. After deliberation it was finally decided that this first fair would be held in Nebraska City on October 7th, 8th and 9th. A report of the fair proceedings to the legislature assembly listed winners for 12 of the 14 classes considered at that first fair. Included in the classes listed were: agricultural implements (sorgho evaporator), cultivator (riding), cultivator (walking), Bailey's patented clothes wringer, churn, and farm gate. One of the classes mentioned in the report, and listed as "discretionary," included, lot grape vines, instant relief, flavoring extracts, patent hen's nest, model sloop, bee hives, stand of bees, specimen of mineral, case of preserved butterflies, wild plums, tame plums, cluster of grapes, and variety of pears. Mayor H. T. Brooks of Pearl Creek, New York, was the fair's principal speaker. At the end of this first state-wide festive event, Nebraskans said goodbye to many new friends . . . pioneers all . . . and returned home with determination to put into practice the things they had learned.

In the year 1898 the State Legislature established the permanent site of the fair at Lincoln. In that year, due to financial difficulties, the Fair Board found it impossible to hold a fair. Since then, however, the



The attendance at the 1949 Nebraska State Fair was approximately 225,000 people. During Fair Week a seven-bed emergency hospital is maintained. Nebraska was the first state to inaugurate the hospital unit at state fairs. In 1949 over 600 baby beeves and over 300 dairy calves were shown. In one of the outstanding swine shows in the nation there were enough hogs on exhibit to feed 10,000 people for one year. Total premiums in the open class livestock divisions at the 1949 fair amounted to \$37,173. Premiums offered in each class were: Swine, \$9,807; Horses, \$5,418; Beef Cattle, \$11,654; Dairy Cattle, \$6,351; Sheep, \$2,443; and Poultry, \$1,500.

Nebraska State Fair has increased, year by year, in size and importance.

This year, eighty-eight counties in Nebraska will hold their own county fairs. Here, as at the State Fair, young and old alike compete for prizes in recognition of their efforts to produce more and better farm and home products. At these important festive gatherings, hundreds of thousands of people from town and country meet in happy and lively confusion. The crowds from all parts of the state view with interest and pride the outstanding exhibits of prize livestock, farm produce, processed foods, flowers, improved farm machinery and implements, and many others.

These annual expositions attract thousands of 4-H Clubbers, Future Farmers of America, and members of other youth organizations. Here, Nebraska youths are given the opportunity to exhibit the products they have made or raised during the year in their club work . . . here are provided appropriate show windows for these outstanding rural educational movements.

As Nebraskans in all parts of the state are once again preparing for their State and County Fairs, excitement and anticipation is in the air. Contestants, whether they win or lose, will be richer in experience and knowledge. Those who attend only to "see the sights" will enjoy the many exhibits emphasizing the tremendous value and importance of the resources of their great state. All will return home convinced, more than ever, that there is no place like Nebraska . . . a great state in which to live, work, and raise our families.
