

Stefan Blasts Truman's 'Bunk' and 'Bungle' Policy

The Truman Doctrine of bunk-bungle and blunder is the principle cause of confusion in the country today, Congressman Karl Stefan stated recently. There were sharp points of issue raised this week in the debate on a Truman Administration bill to pay transportation and re-packing charges on surplus foods to be given away abroad, including four Communist dominated countries: Hungary, Poland, Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia.

The items that Secretary Brannan is so anxious to get rid of are dried eggs, dried milk powder, butter and cheese.

Yet while we are trying to give food away before it spoils, we have been importing the same foods and in some cases from the same countries on whom the Truman Administration now seeks to unload our surpluses.

According to figures recently released by the Department of Agriculture during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1950, we imported the equivalent of 23,894,873 dozen eggs of which 19,487,673 dozen came from Communist China. The American taxpayer could have saved over \$7,500,000 spent in supporting prices of domestic eggs, and an estimated \$14,000 a month in storage charges on surplus eggs had these imports been banned.

The import of pork products, mostly from Communist Poland during the last fiscal year, totaled nearly 15,000,000 pounds, compared with slightly over 1,000,000 pounds in the previous year. Dried milk imports were 7,605,000 pounds during the last fiscal year compared with 2,133,000 pounds in the 1948-49 fiscal year. Cheese imports during the last fiscal year were 40,735,000 pounds compared with 25,135,000 pounds the year before.

The imports are to a large extent responsible for the size of our present surpluses, which the Secretary of Agriculture is anxious to get rid of before they spoil. Further, the taxpayer must now pay in addition to the storage charges for the past year, freight charges to get rid of our surpluses.

"Not only do we lack a foreign policy and a foreign trade policy, but we are forced to live with Truman Confusion at which this is but one small example," Stefan concluded.

Random Thoughts of TOWN & COUNTRY

Because of the enthusiastic reception of the first TOWN AND COUNTRY column, we have asked the writer to continue the feature each week.

A freckle-nosed fiend came in recently to inquire about an add creature he had uncovered in a log near the creek.

"The thing," he said, "looked like a snake but had four legs." Having never been informed of gila monsters and such, he innocently grasped the "thing" by the tail—which tail promptly snapped from the body and continued wriggling violently while the beast vanished in the brush.

Thus consulted, this completely incompetent naturalist volunteered that this was probably a skink and hastened to a reference text for verification. According to the volume, the skink is a moderate-sized lizard which is common in the central states, including Nebraska.

Come to think of it, "skinker" is probably a good name for the grown man who goes about beating little animals on the back with a stick to see if the posterior appendage will fall off.

At any rate, the book stands as a monument to the WPA which built a lot of monuments both big and small, public and private.

Who knows, many a contemporary full-fledged Congressman or investigator (of either party) may have received his basic training while hunting skinks back in the 30's. In our humble opinion, the skink hunt was probably cheaper and about as effective, even though the lizard didn't make newspaper headlines.

a two-wheel manure spreader out of a barn and into an alley and back, with three-inch clearance, (3) pulling a four-wheel trailer through a serpentine course and (4) belting up to a stationary machine unassisted.

Bionest Livestock Show
Even with the added capacity of the hog barn and steer pen, entries will overflow existing facilities for livestock. The fair board with an unexpected rush of entries, decided to relocate housing for livestock.

The poultry building will be renovated to accommodate open class dairy cattle. Overflow 4-H and open class beef will be put in the open class cattle barn. The west horse barn will be used for overflow horses. And, temporary pens will be set up for extra hogs.

The new steer pen will greatly facilitate the showing and judging of livestock shows. Free seats will be available. Fair board members say "An increasing number of people have found that they miss an entertaining part of the fair if they pass up the livestock judging, particularly the 4-H shows."

Exhibitor's Tickets
Exhibitor's tickets will be mailed to all 4-H members who have sent in their entries. All members who expect to get in and out of the gate must get their entries to the county extension office within the next few days to get exhibitor's passes.

Friday, Sept. 15, will be children's day. Gate admission tickets have been sent to school children for that day. Schools will be dismissed for the matinee. Carnival rides will be reduced to 10 cents.

Actions by Fair Board
With prospects of the biggest fair in history in mind, the fair board last Tuesday voted to rent more bleachers and add to the seating capacity of both judging arenas and grandstand.

The board also voted to grant grandstand concession rights to the 4-H clubs. Clubs will pay the fair board 15 per cent of the proceeds from sales.

Besides attending meetings, fair board members have been busy circulating fair premium lists and pamphlets. Fair books are available at banks in Wayne, Winsde, Hoskins, Wakefield, Wisner, Laurel, Pilger and Allen.

Thursday and Friday afternoons, a horse show, presented by Wayne area saddle clubs, and horse racing events will precede stage entertainment.

"Seasations of 1950," the Gertrude and Randolph Avery show, promises to be particularly entertaining this year. The show includes entirely new members and acts. Novelty acts and other entertainment will also be presented on the new stage during afternoons and evenings.

A Vote Costs You \$1.35

Governor Val Peterson, republican candidate for reelection, is worth at least \$1,277.10 to Wayne county.

It cost county taxpayers \$1.35 for each of the 946 votes cast for Peterson in the August 9 primary election.

The primary election cost the county \$2,106.71 in fixed costs, to say nothing of the time and effort spent by county officials in pre-primary preparations.

Whether you're all-out for economy in government, an efficiency expert or just a plain citizen, figures like that could mean one of two things. Either more people should recognize their civic duty and vote...

Very few would support the latter. It is up to the majority who want to see local governments continue to function to vote.

The state law requires the county to spend money for specified items and services during an election. A breakdown of the \$2,106.71 follows: salaries for election officials, \$1,083.05; ballots and supplies, \$876.36; newspaper publication of notices, \$133.45; and rent for polling places, stamps and other miscellaneous supplies, \$13.85.

According to the ballot returns, Hans Tietgen is the most valuable candidate. The 1,178 votes for him are worth \$1,590.30 to county taxpayers.

\$95 Billion for Defense

City officials warn that Wayne folks will have to "get used to the mercury-vapor lights" after using incandescents so long.

The mercury-vapor is a white light that tends to distort some red colors, like the daylight fluorescent tubes used in homes.

The new effect on red colors will be no excuse for citizens driving through red stop lights, law enforcement officials warn.

Christmas decorations, too, will be the victim of color distortion. Businessmen will be instructed how to treat their red decorations so that a true red color will be visible.

The nation-wide trend in street lighting favors mercury-vapor lamps because of high levels of illumination with a minimum of power consumption.

The installation of the lamps will be another sign of the progressiveness of the Wayne community.

Funny about those street light installations, though. Workmen seem to have made the first installations near Pearl and Third streets, near the city hall—near the city light office, city clerk's office and the council chambers.

There was some inconvenience while installations were being made—dirt on the sidewalks and grass and alleys blocked off. But there were only a few complaints.

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Pre-Season Practice Readies All Wayne Gridders

16 Lettermen Bolster College; City-Prep Teams Open Sept. 15

Most of the young men in Wayne might agree that it's hot enough for the corn, and they'd all agree that it's almost too hot for football practice.

Nevertheless, 25 Wayne high school boys, eight prep school boys and 41 college gridiron men have turned out for pre-season practice sessions this fall.

WAYNE STATE COLLEGE

On the basis of past years' experience and the usual amount of pre-season dope and guesses Wayne State's prospects for the coming grid season look pretty good.

Two years ago the "Wildcats" climbed out of their cellar spot in the NCC to share the league championship with the "Eagles" of Chicago State. Last year they made a clean sweep of the field with no losses and no ties to top the first clear conference title awarded since the league was formed in 1945.

With a schedule of seven conference and two non-conference games in front of him, Coach Jack Wink and Assistant Coach Chuck Obye are looking over a crew of 41 men who reported in for suits, to see how they stacked up with last year's champions.

Sixteen Lettermen

Sixteen lettermen will spread among key positions, are back to form the nucleus of this year's squad. These will be backed up by seven men who saw experience with last year's B squad and 26 bushy newcomers.

The Wildcats are riding a 14-game winning streak at the present time, but the season's curtain-raiser with the Tigers of Colorado college may very well be the game that snaps it. The Wayne gridgers travel to Colorado Springs Sept. 16 to meet the hill state team for the second time, the first being in 1948. Wayne took the first tilt 27 to 7, but met a vastly improved squad this fall.

For the 1950 season Wayne and Clinton will probably be top contenders for the title, although Hastings college is expected to make big strides forward and will be a team to watch.

Regulars Listed

Back again this fall in Wink's backfield are all-conference Don Kane, Stanton, who for the past two years has ranked among the conference's top scorers, and in the 1948 season threw 20 touchdown passes and Robby Gast, Plainview, who placed in the top-scoring bracket last year.

In the center spot are Dick McDonald, 295-pound letterman from South Sioux City, and Vern Wortman, Big (295 pounds) Bill Plund

man, Waltham, from last year's B of Norfolk will divide his time between center and tackle.

Letterman Ronnie Breyne, Naperville, Ill., will do duty as tackle again this year with Chuck Lanik, Wahoo.

In the end spots are lettermen Duane Pearson, Lyons, with two years varsity play behind him, and Ralph Conner, Wakefield.

CITY HIGH SCHOOL

At the city high school, Coach Lloyd Horton has issued equipment to 25 boys. They have been practicing Tuesday through Friday at 9 a. m. and 7:30 p. m.

William Edwards and Gilbert Gimbel, students at Wayne State, will assist Horton with his coaching duties.

Horton considers seven of his 14 returning lettermen as regulars thus far. There are still one backfield and two line positions open on the regular squad. Jerry Lamp and Jack March, both lettermen, will alternate at center.

Last year's season included two wins, five losses and one tie. Horton hopes to start his "Blue Devils" off to a better record this year by beating Allen here Sept. 15.

CAMPUS HIGH SCHOOL

Six-man football at Wayne State campus high school got underway last Monday when practices began in preparation for a seven-game schedule stated this fall.

Training the prep team will be John Hodapp, new coach and school teacher, assisted by William Kropp and Dale Wamberg, student teachers from the college.

"Increased interest in six-man football in this area has led to our adding a trained coach to the staff for the first time," said Dr. M. B. Street, superintendent of the school. Previous teams had been coached by student teachers under the supervision of Milton J. Hasel, principal of the high school.

8th in all wheat

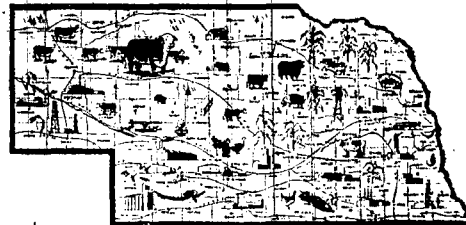
WHEAT

A GREAT NEBRASKA PRODUCT

Rising gracefully . . . and triumphantly . . . from the rich fertile soil of a territory once described as a "great desert . . . entirely unfit for agriculture" are golden stalks in the vast rolling wheat fields of the great state of Nebraska. In the entire nation, Nebraska ranks fifth in the production of winter wheat, and eighth in all wheat. It is second only to corn in importance among the cultivated field crops grown in the state.

While wheat is grown in most every section of the state, the high production acreage is limited largely to the area south of the Platte River. In this area the largest acreage is in the southeastern and south-central sections. Relatively large acreages are also grown in the southwestern sections and south of the Platte River in the northwestern region. Smaller acreages are located in the northwestern regions north of the Platte River.

Only a few short years ago the quality of wheat grown in Nebraska was considered generally poor. Inferior varieties were often grown, and re-mixed or amutty grain was common. Believing that this wheat did not contain as good milling and baking characteristics as the grain from various other states, buyers at terminal markets bought it at a discount. Here, then, was a condition that greatly needed correction. Fortunately there were Nebraskans who were eager and capable of getting the job done. These foresighted men knew the state had good and fertile soil, and a climate favorable for wheat production. They also knew that there were capable research staffs at agricultural experiment stations; and they had confidence in the intelligent Nebraska farmers who could apply and use methods necessary to produce top quality wheat for the milling trade. In 1938 the Nebraska Grain Improvement Association was organized to meet this important problem and take the steps necessary for its solution. Since the beginning of this association, tremendous



Nebraska taxpayers have invested a total of approximately \$1,000,000 during the past 50 years for crop research, but at present prices the increased return is estimated at \$90,000,000 each year.

In 1949, 3,761,000 acres of wheat were harvested with an approximate total production of 54,408,000 bushels. The appropriate total value of the 1949 wheat crop was \$103,375,000. Four wheat varieties, Pawnee, Nebred, Cheyenne and Turkey, made up 93% of the state's wheat acreage. Over 98% of the acreage was planted in winter wheat while less than 2% was made up of spring wheat. The average yield per acre of winter wheat over the last three-year period was approximately 18.7 bushels. The average yield over this same period for spring wheat was approximately 14.2 bushels per acre.

strides have been made in grain improvement. Vigorous educational programs were conducted to acquaint farmers with the needs of the milling trade, and to inform them of the steps necessary to improve the quality of Nebraska wheat. Field test plots on farms in various parts of the state have been included as important parts of each year's program.

To accomplish the objectives of the association field meetings and demonstrations have been held; advertising in newspapers and trade magazines has been done; 4-H pure seed clubs have been formed; and wheat shows and milling and baking contests have been staged. These, along with many other activities, have brought about closer cooperation between farmers, commercial processors, and the Nebraska College of Agriculture. The outstanding success of the grain improvement program in Nebraska is a story of planning, work, and patience. It reveals a picture of teamwork on the part of research workers, extension workers, millers, grain dealers, implement companies, manufacturers, utility companies, banks, civic groups, editors, radio representatives, farmers, and many others who were vitally concerned with the future and welfare of their great state.

Nebraska's grain improvement program has borne rich fruit. Surveys show that there has been a consistent increase in the acreage of improved varieties until 98% of all wheat now grown on Nebraska farms is of varieties considered good or excellent in milling and baking characteristics. Records prove that now shipments of smutty wheat originating in the state have been reduced to approximately one-half of one percent of the total receipts. Acre yields have also been increased. This great improvement in the quality of Nebraska wheat has also resulted in better market acceptance. Once frowned upon, Nebraska wheat is now favorably known at principal terminal markets, and is purchased by discriminating buyers at prevailing or premium prices.

Here, then, is a typical example of Nebraska pioneering, initiative, and cooperation that gets things done. It's an outstanding chapter in the history and progress of a great community. It's another outstanding reason why there is no state like Nebraska . . . a great place in which to live, work, and raise our families.
