"Or, no... they'd see our new front door instead of the old one that sagged way down from its hinges," Mrs. Milder exclaimed.

Main floor tiling is a "green and light grey checkerboard" with a red and yellow design worked into it.

"And the new fluorescent lights certainly make it much lighter in here... and much easier to read," she continued.

Altogether, the new, cheery floor, fluorescent lights, wide-open reading areas, rejuvenated chairs and furniture and the neatly arranged book shelves makes the room seem like a jewel in comparison to the usual impression one gets on hearing the words "library room."

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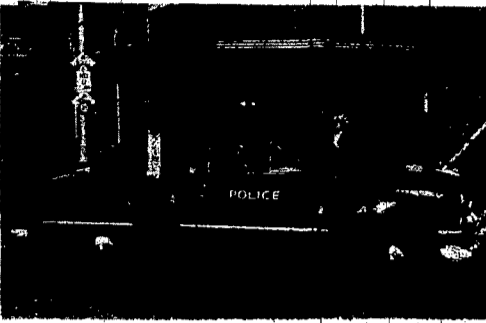

City Council Approves City-Rural Fire Merger; Hears Fair Request

Approval of the proposed merger of the Wayne Rural Fire Protection district and the city fire departments was the major item of business at Tuesday evening's city council meeting.

Les Ellis, president of the Wayne volunteer fire department, and Ralph Beckenkauer, president of the rural district, had signed the agreement before it was presented to the council for approval.

Approval was granted to the appointment by Mayor Houdersheldt of R. H. Hansen as the new city patrolman in patrol with the new police car. Hansen will be on 24-hour call.

Hansen reported to the council that patrolling had been working satisfactorily, and that he hadn't made any arrests yet.

Possibilities of issuing both county and traffic summons tickets was discussed by council members.

William Elyon was approved and hired as a new policeman to replace Hansen's vacancy. He will begin work Monday.

Two building permits were issued as follows: Ed Seyler garage in Britain and Bressler's addition outlot, 20x20 feet, one story frame, for \$300.

Hansen tied for 17th as an individual and was high man on the Wayne team.

Walter Gilbert, member of Wayne's Break-All 4-H club, and alternate on the county judges team won fourth place in the alternates judging contest.

He had a perfect score on judging in the hog division.

Two girls demonstration teams won white ribbons at the first county fair, the Benson boys' basketball team won a first place in the basketball contest.

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Wayne county citizens will be given a double-barreled ceremony next Thursday evening, Sept. 21. That's the night of the city street light dedication and Fall Opening.

As additional fall-event attractions, the annual kiddies parade will march down Main street during the evening and a debate on the highway program will be presented at the auditorium.

The street lighting ceremonies and window unveiling should work naturally together. Prize tickets are being distributed through merchants this week, and will continue next week.

Lights Collocate 14 Years' Work Contractors Lester and Egabody have assured city officials that the new mercury-vapor light installations will be ready to go by Thursday.

When Mayor Glen Houdersheldt throws the switch and the lights blaze on, the ceremony will have culminated 14 years of effort to provide better lighting for the city.

The original engineering survey was made in 1936. Inactivity and the war postponed action until this year.

A low bid of \$227,064.11, plus \$63.20 for fastoon outlets, was approved by the council May 29. The contract was awarded to the Lester and Peabody Electric company.

The contract is a combination of Lester Electric, Wayne, and C. E. "Dutch" Peabody, contractor at Laurel.

At a rate of more than 20 in a good day, the contractors have been raising the 71 poles on Main, Pearl and connective side streets.

Ceremony at Third and Main "Throwing-the-switch" ceremonies are scheduled to take place at 7 o'clock at the corner of Third and Main streets.

Simultaneous store windows will be unveiled for fall showing.

Preceding the double ceremony the Chamber of Commerce at 6 p.m. will honor all who have taken part in making the street lights a reality at a supper at the hotel.

Contractors, councilmen, the light supervisor and other guests have been invited to the "throwing-the-switch" supper.

Annual Kids' Parade "Prettiest costumes, unique entries, outstanding pets and many other types of entries will be judged by the city judges during the annual kids parade.

Parade entries should be at the auditorium well in advance of the 7:30 p.m. starting time.

From the auditorium, the parade will march to Fourth and Main, and down Main street to First street.

Both the college and high school bands, and possibly the college pep group, will add color and music to the parade.

The parade will serve as a college pep rally, too, for the first home football game. The Wildcats will play Midland college Saturday, Sept. 23, at 8 p.m.

Concluding feature of the evening of ceremony and fun will be a debate at the auditorium.

Debate on "Valuable" The subject of the debate, "The Highway Issue," should prove both interesting and valuable because of its proximity to the general election, Nov. 8.

Herb Hahn, representing the Nebraska Farm Council and the Nebraska Farm Bureau Federation, representing the Better Nebraska association, proponents of the governor's highway program, will be allowed 20-30 minutes each for affirmative discussion and additional time for refutation.

In view of the large crowd that is expected to attend the debate, it has been requested that there be no questions from the floor.

Al Baho, representing the fair board, asked the council if the city would cooperate with the fair in the extent of furnishing labor for setting up a light and power system and other jobs, as it had in past years.

"We have the cooperation of private citizens, over 50 of them on several different Fridays, and it is the county government," the fair is providing, and we'd like to establish a definite policy of cooperation with the city," he said.

Most of the council members agreed. **Walt Bressler**, city clerk, pointed out that the city does donate some power, water and services of its tank truck.

As it stands now, the fair board collect from concessions for power in its flat rental rate, and is supposed to pay for the actual power used minus power for the grandstand which is given to the fair). However, the board has run up a bill of over \$300 during the past two years for power, materials and labor.

Council members will establish a definite policy to refer to in coming years, keeping constant the fact that the fair does definitely add to the wealth of the city.

Renovated Library

Mrs. Midner estimates that she and her staff check out an average of 200 books from the children's room per week.

The new basement wing, under the stack room, has been set aside for a public reading room. The room is finished with red and yellow designs, contains into the meeting room and the walls, chairs and tables have been painted cherry colors.

During the renovation of the basement, everything was moved over to the basement of the Baptist church.

One of the expenditures not often considered as part of redecoration cost was \$500 to terminate.

Upstairs again, it's apparent after a quick glance around the library that its shelves offer any type of reading material. Besides current fiction and non-fiction, there's a file of pamphlets on subjects from "Accidents" to "Yugoslavia" - a teen-corner with 14 shelves of books, a case of books, 14 Nebraska authors and the latest papers and magazines.

Even though the library has been equipped considerably, there are still some needs, Mrs. Midner said. We'd like to have some more furniture now that we have more space in the reading room, an electric clock would help, and a dictionary stand, and a record player and records for adults.

"The children certainly enjoy their records," she continued, "and it would be nice if we could offer the same enjoyment to adults."

In the meantime, we're certainly thankful for the improvements that have been made, but we're not through yet," she concluded. We'll have a move all the books again, soon, for the painters.

Wayne's good record of no fire calls in 73 days was rudely broken last week by a small fire in an automobile at the college campus.

But, the worst part of the incident was not the fact that a record had been broken. The residents and businessmen along Main street thought that everyone in Wayne county had gone crazy.

The worst speed-mad traffic ever seen clogged Main street and other streets leading to the college. And college students by the hundreds ran from their dorms to the scene.

An efficient fire department is useless if it can't reach the scene of the fire because of traffic or fight the fire after it gets there because of the crowd of curiosity seekers milling around.

Wayne firemen and policemen, instead of trying to quell the mob, were being pelted with stones.

Ordinarily normal people drove their cars onto the campus and private lawns, parked their cars in the middle of the street, jumped out of cars and leaped over hedges, pedestrians dodged in and out of moving cars, kids screamed after the traffic on their bicycles.

The fire department has three main jobs to perform: get to the fire, put it out and get back to the fire house as quickly as possible. All three of these functions were hampered seriously by "fire horse" Wayneites.

If the fire had been in Terrace hall, where the call was placed, last week's news story may have been a tragic one.

As it was, it's incredible that none of the curious was injured.

Next time there's a fire call, put your "fire horse" instincts in harness and congratulate yourself on having good "horse sense."

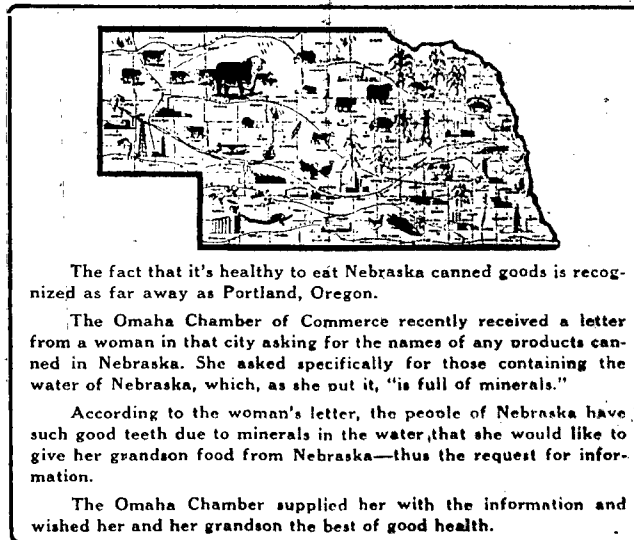
CANNING

ANOTHER PROGRESSIVE NEBRASKA INDUSTRY

Canning in Nebraska is a typical example of the industrial diversification found within the state. It is one of the ways in which the agricultural raw materials produced within the state are processed and distributed to many parts of the world. It is another industry that contributes substantially to the prosperity and economic stability of our great state.

Home canning and preserving of foods has been practiced since the time of the first pioneers. With the influx of many thousands of people into the Nebraska territory, and the fertile Nebraska soil offering a bright future for agricultural developments, commercial canning of fruits and vegetables was destined to become firmly established in the state. Not too many years after Nebraska had received statehood, canning factories were in production in many parts of the state. During the drought years, agricultural production was greatly affected. This condition, of course, was felt by the canneries, and some ceased operations. Others survived, however, and as time went on new factories were started. Today canning plants are located in Scottsbluff, Crete, Grand Island, Omaha, Nebraska City, Fremont, and Plattsmouth.

Nebraska has one of the nation's richest areas for raising canning crops. Until a few years ago, the industry was confined largely to the canning of fruits and vegetables. During World War II, however, beef, pork and beans, asparagus, boned chicken, and boned turkey were added to the production list. In addition to these products factories in the state can corn, hominy, tomatoes, green beans, pumpkin, squash, spinach, kraut, beets, tomato pulp, succotash, lima beans, apples, cher-

The Omaha Chamber of Commerce recently received a letter from a woman in that city asking for the names of any products canned in Nebraska. She asked specifically for those containing the water of Nebraska, which, as she put it, "is full of minerals."

According to the woman's letter, the people of Nebraska have such good teeth due to minerals in the water, that she would like to give her grandson food from Nebraska—thus the request for information.

The Omaha Chamber supplied her with the information and wished her and her grandson the best of good health.

ries, poultry, fish, chili, soups, bouillon, pickles, preserves, and condensed milk.

While Nebraska canneries support the commercial needs of the state, home canning is undertaken extensively. Schools, community clubs, colleges, and agricultural agents further this practice, and some state institutions grow and can their own food supplies. It is also interesting to note that the state has one can-making plant, in Nebraska, to serve the needs of the canners throughout the Mid-west.

Canning in Nebraska is a progressive part of the state's industrial output. It is largely dependent upon the agricultural products produced within the state, and, as a result, provides excellent markets for many Nebraska farm crops. It is an industry that is making great strides forward and is growing in personnel as well as production. The overall picture of this Nebraska industry is indeed bright. The successful and evergrowing operations of the factories now located in the state prove that agricultural and industrial diversification in any area is a healthy and sound condition. The canning industry in our state is playing . . . and will continue to play . . . an important part in providing jobs for Nebraskans and outlets for Nebraska food products. It's canned in Nebraska . . . you know it's good.

Here, then, is another chapter in the story of the great state of Nebraska. It's another example of the industrial contributions being made to help make our state a better place in which to live, work, and raise our families.
