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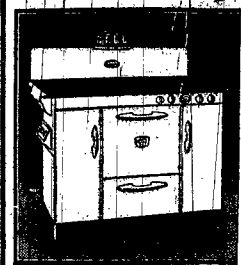

ribbon calf in the finalists. The third place was won by Judy Heinenman; and Gayle Wenner placed fifth. Fat Steer Show. The other "first" exhibition involved feeding too. But in the open class fat steer show, steers had to weigh at least 1200 lbs. to be eligible.

The show was one of the best audience-attractions at the fair . . . throughout the judging, Saturday morning, there were several hundred spectators around the pen.

Receiver of a gold plaque from Wayne's Chamber of Commerce and a check for \$108 was Melvin Dinslage, West Point, for winning first place with his Angus steer. Dinslage also won third with another Angus.

The three judges, meat packers from Sioux City stockyards, judged the steers from "the killing angle." Joe Watson, also from West Point, was awarded second place with his Hereford. Willers and Ritter took fourth place with an Angus. And Boys Town took fifth place among the finalists.

The heaviest steer, owned by Clarence Schroeder, weighed in at 1,735 lbs. The judges concurred that the finalists would average about 65 per cent meat dressed.

Two Fires Thursday

Both fires occurred Thursday afternoon, both were minor and both could be attributed to carelessness. A carelessly thrown cigarette started a small grass fire south of the poultry house very quickly because of loose straw piled within it.

Just seconds after the blaze was discovered the Wayne volunteer fire department arrived and doused it.

Early Thursday evening, at about 6:30 p.m., Warren Bilson discovered and extinguished a small blaze near the west end of the grandstand.

The fire was caused by a short circuit in wiring leading to an exhibitor's booth. Bilson was on duty on the grounds as a National Guardsman when he discovered the fire. He is also a volunteer fireman. He put out the fire with a CO2 extinguisher, loaned to the fair board by the city.

Straightening-up days are over for the Friday-afternoon volunteer crew, but there's a lot of cleaning up to do tomorrow. All those who wish to help are asked to be at the fair grounds during the afternoon.

School Results

Wayne public school won the school exhibit this year with 342 points. Fairly close behind was Winside with 315 points. Hoskins was third, with 29 points. Carroll school did not enter the competition this year.

It was a closer race for the rural schools. District 26 garnered 77 points for first. District 10 had 59 points and district 40, 58 points.

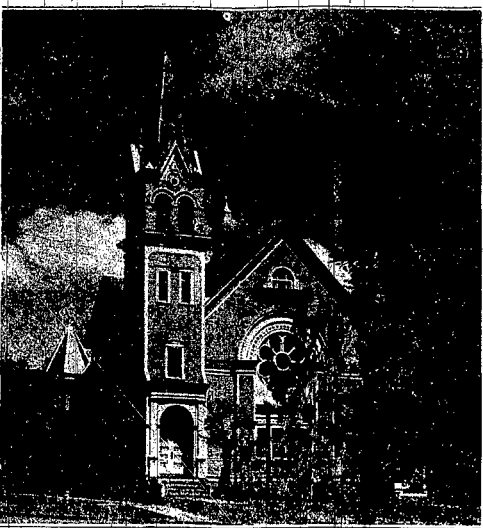

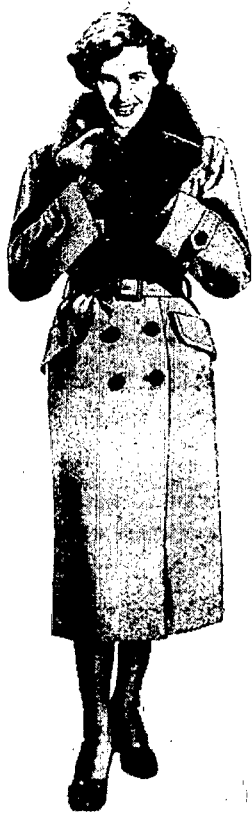

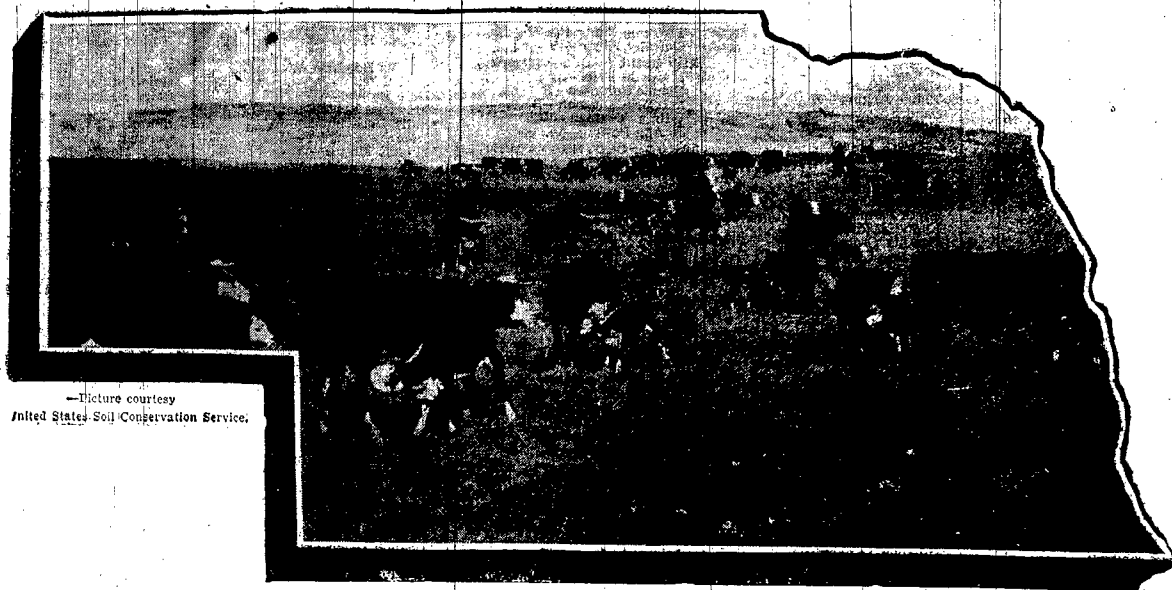

NEBRASKA CATTLE FAMOUS—THE WORLD OVER

Beginning with the Oregon trail in 1832, the Mormon trail in 1847, and the Nebraska City cutoff, 1858-1860, Nebraska furnished the principal routes from the Missouri River to the Rocky Mountains and the Pacific Coast. In a single year 50,000 people with nearly as many cattle and 8,000 wagons crossed the region by these highways. In the days of these overland trails pioneers enroute swapped their tired and footsore cattle for fresh animals. Many of these early people settled in the Nebraska territory making farming and cattle raising their chief form of livelihood. In 1862 free land was provided in the area by the Homestead Act, and by the time Nebraska received statehood in 1867, railroad exploitation of the Middle-west was under way. In 1864 and the following years the cry of "follow the Mormons and prairie dogs and find good land" brought many new settlers. Joining the stampede of unemployed workers, tenant farmers, and European immigrants, Civil War veterans flocked into Nebraska. Times were hard during this period, and when grasshoppers swarmed over the state in the late sixties and early seventies, bitterness and tension prevailed. When the rains became more regular around 1890, this feeling on the part of settlers left, and the spirit of boost Nebraska again took hold.

In the period following, Eastern investors considered this new frontier a good risk, and poured great amounts of money into the region. While the dairy industry was growing in Eastern Nebraska, large fortunes were spent extending the beef cattle industry into the semibarren lands of this new western frontier. Finding easy credit, the typical Nebraska family in 1890 found themselves saddled with one or two mortgages. In subsequent periods, drought and hard times set in and only the most deter-

Latest figures reveal that Nebraska ranks second in the nation in the production of all cattle with 3,920,000 head. Of this amount 2,054,000 are cows and heifers; 1,188,000 are calves; 601,000 are steers; and 77,000 are bulls. The average value of these cattle is \$124.00 per head, and an approximate total value of over \$486,000,000. Nebraska ranks second in the nation only to Texas in the production of purebred Hereford cattle. Ranches in Cherry County average 3,500 acres, or about five and one-half square miles in size.

mined and hardy pioneers remained. While great hardships were endured by these early Nebraskans, and the cattle industry all but ruined, the spirit of survival caused farmers to start again with what they had. Soon, pioneer herds were augmented by Longhorns from the South. Next, due to the railroads opening new markets for Nebraska products, Longhorns were steadily replaced by high grade beef and dairy cattle brought in from the East. From this time on the cattle industry in Nebraska has continued to grow and prosper.

Today, Nebraska ranks second in the nation in the number of cattle raised. While cattle are raised in most parts of the state, the sandhills of Nebraska are recognized and known all over the world as one of the greatest beef cattle empires. Cherry County, in this region, is first among the cattle producing counties in America with approximately 244,840 head. Feeder calves from this area are shipped to every major feeding section of the United States.

With Herefords, Angas, and Shorthorns the predominate breeds, Nebraska enjoys the reputation of raising only top quality cattle. Tender, delicious steaks and roasts from Nebraska cattle are famous in all sections of the country, and are desired by those who want the best.

This brief picture of Nebraska's cattle industry, then and now, is one that typifies the spirit and development that has helped to make our state what it is today. It's another reason why there is no state like Nebraska—a great place in which to live, work, and raise our families.

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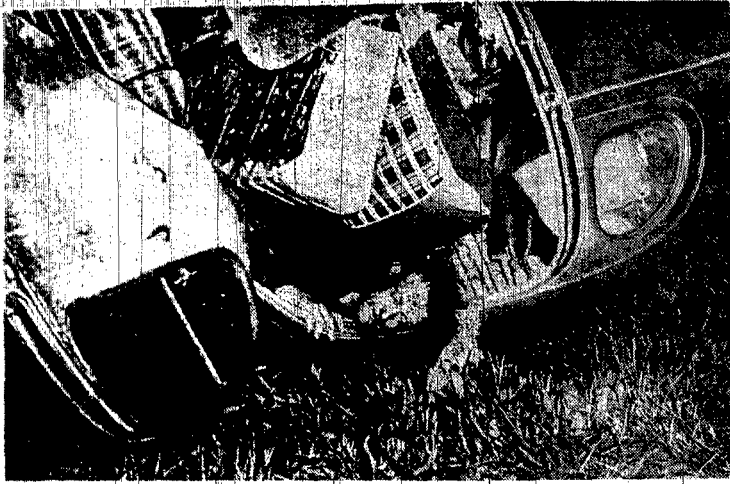
