Bulk of Corn Should Be Ready by Oct. 15

Wayne county farmers, bringing in their corn crop, are optimistic that the bulk of the crop will be ready by Oct. 15. The weather has been favorable, and the corn is maturing rapidly. Farmers are expected to begin harvesting in earnest by the end of the month.

A light frost speeds up the on-the-stalk drying process. If the corn is dented by natural drying or with the aid of a heavy frost it usually withstands a light frost. The late growing season sowed corn maturity, thereby extending harvest time dangerously close to the frost season, but the late season also reduced second-generation corn borer damage.

Recipes to Try

With all you ladies busy canning just as fast as you can, cooking becomes a time-consuming labor. Mrs. August Altemann has given us a recipe that not only won a prize for its delicious flavor, but also for the brevity needed in preparing the cake. It is known as the Quick Mix Peach Meringue Cake. The cake batter consists of:

- 1 cup heavy cream
- 1/2 cup baking powder
- 1/2 cup sugar, all these to be sifted together. Then add 3 egg yolks
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/2 cup vanilla. This mixture must be beaten for two minutes of 300 strokes. It is then poured into a greased and floured oblong pan.
- A meringue as follows is made: Beat three egg whites, add 1/2 tsp. salt and beat until foamy. To this is added 1/2 cup cream tartar, and this is beaten until it is stiff and dry.
- 1/2 cup of sugar is put with the meringue, 2 lbs. at a time. The vanilla is added.
- The meringue is spread over the top of the batter and dents in the form of miniature cups are made along the top with the back of the spoon. The batter with the meringue is baked in an oven 325 degrees for about 30 minutes. After it has cooled, pieces half an inch thick are cut out and placed on a round side plate with the cup which had been made with the meringue. In the center of each of these peach halves put a dab of whipped cream.
- If all sounds very good, doesn't it? And it is to be sure.

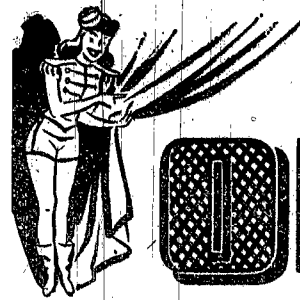

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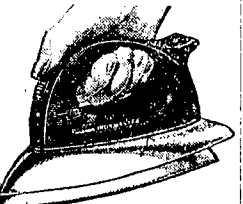

Wayne State Trounces Midland Warriors 25-7

Wayne State's Wildcats successfully defended their NCC title Saturday night by trouncing the invading Midland Warriors, 25 to 7, after having their 14-game winning streak snapped by Colorado college last week.

Midland was unable to penetrate the strong Wildcat defense for three quarters. It was not until late in the final quarter, after Coach Jack Wink threw in the Wayne reserves, that the Warriors were able to put on a scoring jaunt.

After 15 minutes of play, in the first quarter, Wayne's husky full-back, Rollie Gast took a hand-off from Dan Joiner and scooted eight yards around left end for the Wildcat's first touchdown. Chuck Lanik made good the conversion attempt, his only point after touchdown of the game.

Held in check for three successive downs, Midland was forced to punt. Wildcat stand-out, Don Kane, made a 28-yard return from the 15-yard marker.

Neither team gained much ground before midway in the sec-

ond quarter when Wayne recovered a quick kick intended for Midland on their own 15-yard stripe. With Dan Joiner completing two passes in a row to Kane, the ball rested a yard from the goal. Gast crashed through the line, picking up another touchdown before the half.

Flynn Scores Twice
In the second half, Wayne bounced back to garner two more tallies. Bill Flynn, sophomore halfback, got into the scoring act by carrying the ball across the end zone both times. He ran 21 yards for the first touchdown.

And a few plays after the kickoff, Flynn scored again after Wartman pilfered a short Warrior pass to the Midland 32 and returned it to the 19-yard line behind good blocking.

Immediately after the Wildcat substitutions were made, the Warriors started to gain ground. An attempted Wildcat punt was blocked and Midland recovered on their own 24-yard line toward the end of the quarter.

Midland scored its lone touchdown against the Wayne reserves mid-way in the fourth quarter. The Warrior's Wagner plunged over for the touchdown.

Midland's Pilmore set up the scoring play by running 30 yards to Wayne's 12-yard line. A Wildcat back, Bill Black, playing in the safety position, stopped Pilmore with a shoestring tackle.

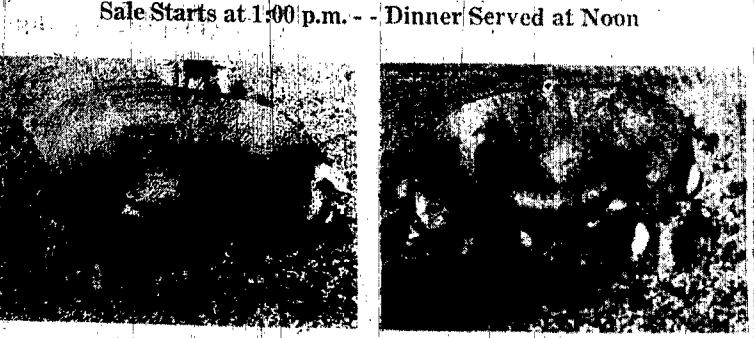

habits of children, learning how to care for a young child and learning how their habits develop as they grow.

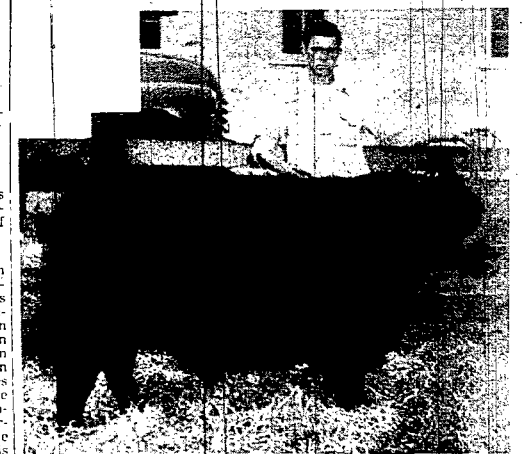
As an added feature, the class will have a nursery school for children from three to four years of age.

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'Confusion' Say... Be a Mind Reader
Frankly, one needs to be a mind reader to fathom the ins and outs of the opponents and proponents of Governor Val Peterson's road program.

Thursday evening's debate at the city auditorium of the two rival factions brought out an explanation of the plan, true, but all the charges and denials served only to cloud the issue for many of the spectators.

Before the debate began, 10 spectators (by a show of hands) knew how they were going to vote on the referendum, and probably no more than that knew how they were going to vote after the debate was over.

Mr. Hahn of the opposition spent most of his time black-balling the Better Nebraska association, nor did he have anything concrete to offer to replace it.

Mr. Hamilton of the BNA presented a clear-cut outline of the needs and plans of the highway department, but Mr. Hahn shook BNA's case by "political" implications and charges of misrepresentation of some facts.

Regardless of the melee caused by charge and countercharge, some facts remained paramount:

(1) The governor's program has been law this past year... it was passed by the legislature after a two-year study by a non-partisan citizens' committee.

(2) Whether or not to continue the program will be decided by a special referendum at the general election. The referendum was called for by popular petition.

(3) The opposition is made up of private lobby groups with some farm and labor support.

(4) The proponents of the plan are, in the main, unidentified... representatives listed include ranchers, farmers retail associations, manufacturers and lawyers.

(5) Senator Norris Schroeder voted against the program in 1949—not because he was against the idea, but because he was not sure whether this area would get any direct benefits.

(6) Although road work has been progressing, definite plans for the program are still in the tentative stage due to the impossibility of planning without knowing what funds are available.

To add to the general confusion, the referendum is so worded that if one is in favor of the program he should vote "no," and if he is opposed he should vote "yes."

Undoubtedly, the referendum will cause more fervor in the state than any other single program or platform at stake in the election.

Another Best Seller
The Federal government is carrying on a thriving book-selling business, the Government Printing Office announced today, as it found another best seller on its hands—the second within a month.

The book is "United States Civil Defense," which sells for 25 cents.

The government's other best seller, called "The Effects of Atomic Weapons," was released last month, at \$1.25.

It is nice to know that the government has made these books available to us now, particularly after Russia has been stealing our top secrets for ten years and loud-mouthed Senators have been filling in the details.

A bill has been passed by the House appropriating three hundred thousand dollars to buy automobiles for all of the legless veterans whose claims have been processed up to this time. There are over 175 applications and additional ones are still being made.

Sound Familiar?... Today?
During the late 1800's when the Fabian society and other socialist groups were forming as a protest to Karl Marx's "revolutionary" socialism, they listed a program for destroying democracy piece by piece.

The technique has been followed militantly wherever the "isms" have killed freedom: 1. Establish a school for training socialist leaders, writers, speakers, and so forth.

2. Organize pressure groups to lobby for insignificant socialist ideas, under the banner of worthwhile projects.

3. Identify important statesmen, teachers, journalists and professional men with half-socialistic movements and politics.

4. Always work under the guise of half-truthing, innuendoes and insignificant facts.

5. Never call an idea or program socialistic. Talk about pensions, compensations, health insurance, welfare, but not socialism.

6. Launch the program a bit at a time. Do not frighten the people by showing them the whole program at once.

7. Assure the common people that their rights will be protected. Tell them that whatever is done will be done for the further well-being of the average man, "the little fellow."

8. Capture the labor unions, and through them destroy the Liberal party.

9. Use the Liberal party to get things going, then cast it aside.

The welfare and prosperity of any state is wholly dependent upon the employment available to those living within that state. The people of the state have a heritage that is, perhaps, unique . . . they expect to return a day's work for a day's pay.

Many leading industrialists throughout the state have highly praised the adaptability and stability of Nebraska workers. Many of these employers have had the opportunity to compare the workers in this state with those in other areas. Their comments can be summed up in a testimonial from Elmer G. Jurs, factory manager for Elgin National Watch Company at Lincoln. Mr. Jurs states: "Nowhere else in the country have we found labor so generally cooperative, willing and quick to learn as here in Nebraska." Labor-management problems are also at a minimum in the state. Donald P. Miller, Commissioner of Labor, has stated: "We

The estimated active labor force in Nebraska is composed of the following components: Agricultural workers, 146,000; non-agricultural workers, 345,000; unemployed, 15,000.

The non-agricultural worker group is broken down as follows: Manufacturing, 49,500; construction, 18,000; transportation, communications and public utilities, 38,700; wholesale trade, 24,800; retail trade, 64,700; finance, insurance and real estate, 15,700; services, 36,300; other industries, 1,100; government, 58,300; proprietors self-employed and domestics, 37,500.

While the unemployed make up a portion of the state's labor reserve, the bulk of the reserve lies in the estimated 24,000 persons not at present on the job market, but who could be recruited. Nebraska labor has maintained an excellent production record. From 1941 to 1946, for example, Nebraska had only 306,520 man-days idle due to work stoppages. This is the best record of any middle western state. The closed shop is prohibited in the state by constitutional amendment.

have an unusually fine relationship between employer and employee in Nebraska. No serious disputes have arisen that could not be settled around the conference table. All effort is directed to bring about full understanding of the problem at hand. Cooperation seems to be the inevitable and voluntary result."

Nebraska's rate on unemployment insurance last year was the lowest in the nation, and was equalled by only two other states. During the fiscal year of 1949, employers in the state paid an average unemployment insurance payroll tax of only 0.8 per cent. This figure is just half of the national average of 1.22 per cent. Wages in private employment in Nebraska have increased considerably over the last ten years. In 1939 the average wage earner received in estimated income of \$1,205 while in 1949 the estimated average wage was \$2,740. At the present time Nebraska's estimated labor force is well over 500,000 persons. Of this number less than three per cent are unemployed.

With the continued growth of present industries within the state, and the efforts being made to attract new enterprises, Nebraska's over-all labor picture is, indeed, bright. Responsible for this economically healthy condition are Nebraskans themselves and their progressive and enlightened labor leadership. The efforts put forth by workers to do a better job have gained the state an outstanding reputation. This spirit and initiative is another reason why there is no other state like Nebraska . . . a great place in which to live, work, and raise our families.
