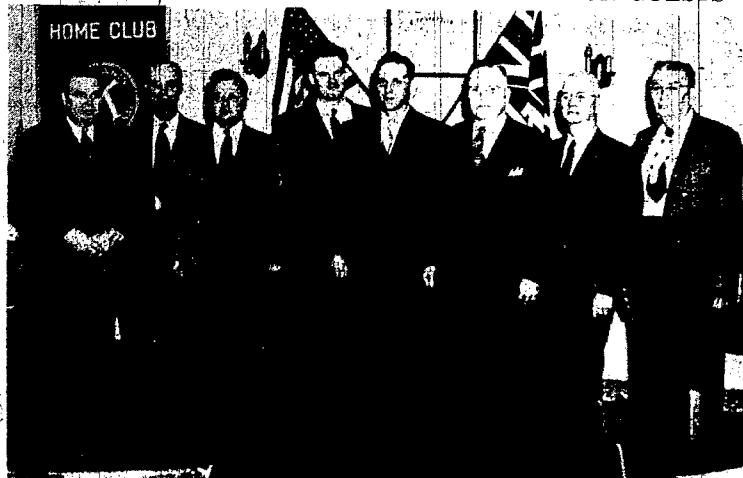

# Hamilton and Hahn Battle Over Pros and Cons of Road Program

A scant 50 or 60 current-issue minded citizens defied bad-weather hints to listen to a hotly debated presentation of Nebraska's road program here Sept. 21 in the city auditorium.

Ed Hahn, Lincoln, secretary of the Nebraska Petroleum Marketers association, and representing the Nebraska Farm council and other private groups, attacked Governor Val D. Hanson's road program as an "unfunded, unsecured, unfinanced, unapproved and unapproved program."

Home Hamilton, Holdrege attorney, representing the Better Nebraska association, supporters of the governor's program, stated that the roads were essential to the state's economy and that the money needed to carry out a well-organized road-system improvement program.

Although the program was originally scheduled as a debate, charge and counter-charge turned it into a series of speeches. Hamilton's statement, the most climactic statement of the evening followed a blistering attack by Hahn charging that the BNA was being subsidized by large oil and cement companies.

Hamilton replied, "The association represents the common people of Nebraska who are interested in seeing better roads and progress for this state. . . and you, Mr. Hahn, may look over the association's books."

Previously, Senator Norris Schroeder, of this district, was denied access to the BNA records. Hamilton, who is in charge of the road program, is opposed to the methods of raising the money needed for expansion and improvement.

The plan, already in state law, but up for a vote of confidence at the general election, provides a one cent tax increase and a graduated license fee for vehicles. "There has been no increase for licenses on an ordinary car," Hamilton explained, "there has been an increase in truck licenses, and trucks are the vehicles that are using and wearing out our roads."

When the referendum comes up for the public vote, if you're for the governor's program, vote "no," and if against the program, vote "yes."

As the debate got underway and turned into a charge and counter-charge, Hamilton became apparent that the case has a lot of politics linked to it. . . not party politics, but politics by lobbyists and pressure groups.

Hamilton said that he opposed the plan because of the "burdening the people with excessive taxes. . . and there's something that can be done (state and federal) taxes?" he asked.

yards of gravel on a 25-foot width of the highway.

**More Work in Area**  
Nearly six miles of road construction west of Winnebago and about five miles east of Thurston are among the projects to be included under the letting in this area.

A new bridge over Middle creek is to be built on the Thurston road. It will be a three-span concrete slab structure 120 feet long with a concrete floor 22 feet wide. Three narrow wooden bridges on the present Thurston east road will be replaced by culverts.

Two right angle turns on the road west of Winnebago will be eliminated. The grading on this project will require the excavation of about 115 thousand cubic yards of earth.

A third project involves reconstruction of highway No. 51 from Bancroft east to U. S. No. 77-73W. Heaviest grading on the project will be done to cut down the hills east of the railroad tracks. Building a roadway 22 feet wide the length of the job will require the excavation of more than 183 thousand cubic yards of earth.

World Series time means baseball's last fling and gives us some grounds to talk about the Pioneer league baseball meeting held at Fremont last week.

If anything constructive were ever settled at these meetings, those in attendance would be dangerously shocked.

It is superfluous to say that all hands on deck last Thursday left in perfect physical condition — though fatigued.

The meeting opened with Millard and Elkhorn innocently suggesting that they wanted into the league. Subsequently, the 13 teams which competed in 1950 voted unanimously that they wanted nothing to do with a set up such as existed this year.

All agreed that things were bad, that they should be improved — that players cost too much money.

It was barely suggested that the same quality baseball could be obtained for less money by limiting the amount that could be paid for a team. The boys agreed that \$150 would be about right. At this point someone — nobody — remarked that some unfortunates individuals might slip in a few bucks to the pitcher or others on the side, but the suggestion was quickly dismissed by the majority as an insult to their collective integrity.

One big-dog calculated that if a team loses two hundred dollars a game, the solution would be to cut the number of games played — fewer contests — lose less money.

The pros who have been operating the league are frankly in a quandary. They have not been able to determine majority opinion in their own communities because most folks are either too busy or too indifferent to express an opinion. And it is always easier to gripe after the job is done than to help constructively in planning.

Furthermore, few people associated with the league are viewing the prospects realistically. They want top quality baseball in communities which have not been able to afford the league expenditure. How much do you think a baseball program should cost?

Another discrepancy is quite obvious — distressingly so. It appears that there is little future for the home town boy after league age, unless he is an outstanding player, equal to the product of the Omaha baseball program.

The decision for 1951 rests with those who furnish the financial support. And all those individuals should make their desires known.

## OUT OF OLD NEBRASKA

**JAMES C. OLSON, Superintendent of STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY**

One silly August day in 1873, according to Dean Frank E. Weaver's fine book, "Presbyterian Colleges and Academies in Nebraska," three friends were visiting in a little frontier store located at what was to become the corner of Hastings Avenue and First Street in the city of Hastings. One of them said to the other two, "Why not have a Presbyterian college at Hastings?"

The pioneer settlers of Hastings immediately took hold of the idea. The two town companies, representing the H & M and St. Joseph railroads, subscribed a total of 40 acres for a campus, plus a large number of business and residence lots. The potential assets of the proposed college were placed conservatively at \$100,000.

The middle seventies, though, were years of great and widespread depression in Nebraska, and the state Presbyterian synod felt unable to assume responsibility for an institution of higher learning far out on the prairie.

As a result, the project languished, but not the enthusiasm of the people of Hastings, and particularly that of the members of its little Presbyterian church. In 1879, they resumed plans for a college. These plans resulted in the appointment of a board of trustees who, on May 10, 1882, accepted the organization of Hastings college.

The college formally opened on Sept. 12, 1882, with a chapel service in First Presbyterian church. The first faculty was composed of five members, two of whom served only part-time. A total of 41 students enrolled the first year, all in the secondary department.

During the first two years, classes were held in six rooms on the second floor of the Chilcote Building, located at what is now the corner of First street and Hastings avenue.

The first building at Hastings college was made possible through the generosity of Cyrus L. McCord.

Welfare Is Big Item
State receipt-expenditure figures reveal some facts that may surprise some Nebraskans.

The figures represent state government incomes and disbursements for the fiscal year July 1, 1949 to June 30, 1950.

Welfare activities took the largest chunk out of the state funds, a little over \$21 million.

Property taxes do not provide the greatest income for the state. Both sales and gross receipt taxes and federal-grants-in-aid provide a greater share of the receipts.

The total spent for welfare includes funds for such varied activities as employment security, relief of blind, veteran's affairs, Nebraska soldiers and sailors home, retirement systems and child welfare.

A breakdown of receipts and expenditures follows:

Table with 2 columns: Receipts and Expenditures. Receipts include Sales-Gross Receipt Taxes, Federal Aid, Property Taxes, Sale of Goods and Services, License Fees, Other Taxes. Expenditures include Welfare, Highways, Education, Hospitals, Health, Sanitation, General Government, Aeronautical Development, Correctional Institutions, Protection: Persons-Prop.

**Dabekrow Released From Hospital**

The government now has 492 million bushels of the 1948 and 49 nation-wide corn crops stored at an estimated value of \$667 million.



## Wesleyan Game Was Wildcats' 14th NCC Conference Victory

Wayne State's champion-Wildcats tallied their 14th straight conference win Friday night, routing Wesleyan 32 to 6 at Lincoln. It was the Plainsmen, incidentally, who handed the Wildcats their last NCC defeat in 1948.

The Wildcat victory was sparked by the scamping tactics of sophomore Bill Flynn, who led the way with three of the five touchdowns of the game.

Flynn opened his assault six minutes after the beginning of play by stealing a Plainsman pass out of the air on the Wesleyan 40-yard line and trotting into the end zone with it.

A few minutes later in the same quarter, Wayne took a fumble from the Lincoln team on the Plainsman 40, and a 15-yard pass from Kane to Flynn had the inspired sophomore headed for pay dirt again.

Three Passes Count

Three successful passes into Wesleyan's leaky defense carried the Wildcats to another touchdown at the outset of the second period.

Don Kane was on the throwing end of the first two and Dan Joiner tipped the third. Eddie Gast plowed across to make the score from the one-yard line.

Late in the second quarter the Wildcats took advantage of a Plainsman fumble to start a drive down the field which ended with Flynn again trotting across the goal-line after a 12-yard sprint.

The second quarter also saw Wesleyan's only scoring march when the Plainsmen moved the

ball from the 48-yard line to the 3-yard stripe through a Wayne defense made up largely of reserves. Wesleyan Halfback Roger Fosbender made the final plunge across the goal for the score, and the half ended 25 to 6.

It was a different story in the second half, from the scoring standpoint, at least. The Wildcats controlled the game, but were able to get into the pay zone only once.

Kane was on the scoring end of the final quarter toward the end of the third quarter. He swept wide for the last 10 yards after Flynn opened the march with a 39-yard dash. Chuck Lanik again made the extra point.
