Enrollment at Wayne State Among Highest in Nebraska

Wayne State Teachers college ranks high again this year among all Nebraska college enrollments, according to a recent college survey. In fact, barring the three "big-city" universities in the state, Wayne is practically at the top.

Wayne, with 761 enrolled this year is almost tied with Kearney Teachers college where 763 are enrolled. Both schools, of course, trail the University of Nebraska, with 7,900 Creighton university, 2,541, and Omaha university, 2,331.

A 21 per cent drop in total enrollment at 20 Nebraska colleges was also disclosed. This year a total of 19,298 full-time students are enrolled as compared with nearly 22,000 last year.

Applications Ready for Trees On Clarke-McNary Program

Application blanks for Clarke-McNary trees for windbreak plantings are available now at the county extension office. Farmers are urged to anticipate their needs early and make their orders while all varieties are still available.

Broadleaf varieties listed this year are: Russian mulberry, American elm, Chinese elm, green ash, honey locust, black locust, hackberry, boxelder, wild plum, Russian olive and cottonwood.

Evergreens include: Austrian pine, ponderosa pine and red cedar. A well planned windbreak will include at least a row of evergreens, a tall tree, a low-growing tree and a shrub.

These trees are made available through the Clarke-McNary forestry program, and others are made through the county extension office. The cost of broadleaf trees this year is \$2 per 100 trees and evergreens, \$3 per 100.

Wayne Placed More Champs Than All Others

With seven grand championships under their belts, Wayne county 4-H exhibitors have captured the top award more times than any other county. The Ak-Sar-Ben judging, called the largest baby beef show in the country, has resulted in more grand champions in Wayne county than the rest of Nebraska combined.

Lester Lutt, son of Mr. and Mrs. Otto Lutt, took the grand champion honors in 1936 and 1937. Leland Herman showed the champion also for two consecutive years, 1940 and 1941.

The late Dean Meyer, who was killed in an airplane accident, took top honors at the Omaha show in 1944. This year Norman Willers accounted for grand champion last week at the Ak-Sar-Ben show, commanded \$250 a pound to top the prices paid at the annual 4-H auction in Omaha.

The steer was bought by Gorat's Steak House, Omaha, for a gross price of \$2,037.30. Champion Johnnie had gained five pounds since the show started and weighed in at 815 pounds.

Willers, son of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Willers, Wayne, had bought the Hereford calf for a little under \$80 last year at the Wayne 4-H auction. He and Willers both came from Kinney's range herd. Perry is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Herb Perry.

Not since Meyer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Meyer, sold his Hereford grand champion for \$4.45 a pound in 1944 has an Ak-Sar-Ben grand champion come near the price Willers received this year. The 1944 price is an all-time high.

In 1948, Norman's first big triumph, his grand champion steer brought him \$185 a pound. Last year's champion was sold by Howard Johnson of Fremont for \$130 a pound.

Wayne county is always well represented at the show and this county's 4-H exhibitors that do not become grand champions also rank well towards the top.

Blue ribbon winners are Walter Gilbert, Angus steer and Dick Longe, Angus steer.

Red ribbon winners are Gayle Wolcott, Angus steer, and Herb Biermann, Angus heifer.



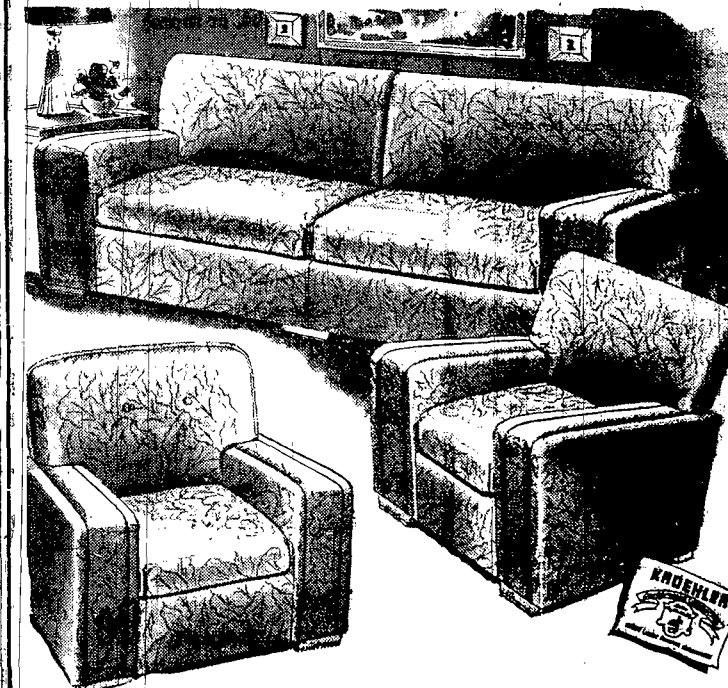

# Kluge Farm Is 1950 Progress Winner

The E. A. Kluge farm, six miles southwest of Wayne, has been selected as the 1950 progress winner for Wayne county in the Sioux City permanent agriculture program. The supervisors of the Wayne County Soil Conservation District made the selection.

Kluge purchased this 240-acre farm last fall and moved to it in the spring of 1950. Since March practically the entire farm has been terraced. Eight miles of terraces have been built. Most of the waterways are ready for seeding.

Eighty acres of corn were planted on the contour with the terraces. The terraces were built just before corn planting, and the ground was packed during construction. This made the first year's farming quite difficult, but he wanted the job done. He expects to hold all the soil and most of the water for greater crop production in the future.

The livestock program also included baby beef and pig projects by his four sons.

The excellent crop rotation and livestock program started on this farm by Kluge are the first and most important part of any conservation program. Terraces and contour farming only preserve the fertility and moisture after the land is made more productive through good rotations and livestock.

Kluge and his family moved to Wayne county from Dixon county this spring. Mr. and Mrs. Kluge have one daughter and four boys.

The supervisors of the soil conservation district had little difficulty in selecting his farm as making the most progress in conservation in Wayne county for 1950.

The 1949 progress winner for Wayne county was the T. S. Hook farm, operated by Harry Goehbert.

The important part of Kluge's soil conservation program is his planned rotation and livestock program. This year he seeded 25 acres sweet clover and 35 acres of new alfalfa. He has an old 22-acre field of alfalfa and home and 28 acres of pasture. He had and marketed 90 head of cattle since spring and has another 33 head of feeders on hand. He raised 17 spring pigs and 95 fall pigs. He has seven milk cows and their calves.

But that school spirit, it is in the air. It surges through the fall air all the way up to Wayne from Lincoln 125 miles away. And for Wayne State, did you see the gang that made the 350-mile round trip Saturday night to see the boys get the job done in Peru?

Yes, sir... if you want to talk turkey these days around here, we suggest that you keep up with names like Gast and Kane and Pfund, know about Reynolds and Wingender and Scott, beware of getting tripped somewhere between a single-wing and a T. H. U.S.A., Middle West, Nebraska Fall!

### Horse Power, Horse Sense?

Watched a car full of the younger set wheel around our corner the other evening with tires squealing for traction—causing an innocent neighbor to slam on all four brakes to preserve his fenders and grill work... it would seem that high-power engines furnish as much horse power as ever, tho' some of the folks who control it have no horse sense.

### Placing the Responsibility

Reverend Robert H. Sweeney, president of the University of Portland, recently told a student body assembly that the University of Berlin (which sponsored the philosopher Hegel) and the University of Bonn (which sponsored Marx) are the two universities most responsible for these theories of government which make the state supreme over the individual. "The universities are responsible for the ideas that created the savage struggle of today," he stated.

Father Sweeney then reminded the students that their primary aim in attending a

university should be to learn how to live, rather than how to make a living, and added, "We have not tolerated and we will not tolerate a professor on our staff who teaches state socialism or totalitarianism."

This is a refreshing attitude in an age in which many teachers seek to undermine the faith of young people in the economic and political systems which made this country great and free—and which, incidentally, made our colleges possible. It is an attitude which should be general.

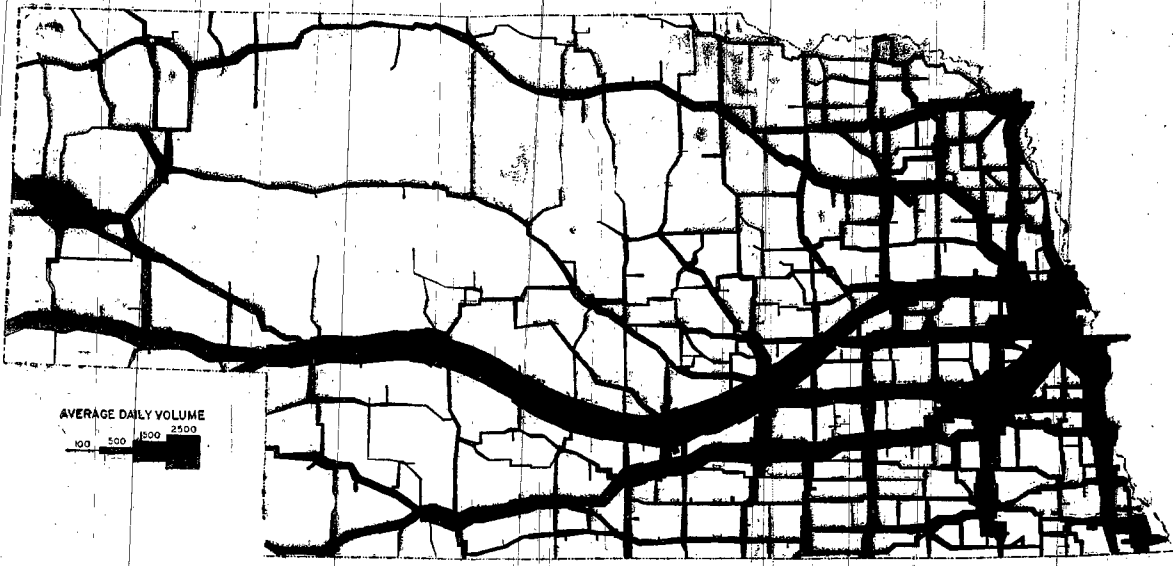

# There Is No State Like Nebraska

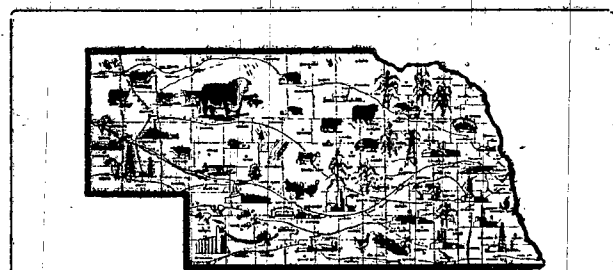
Nebraska's are served by over 105,000 miles of state highways, county-township roads and city-village streets



The above illustration pictures the average daily volume of traffic flow on Nebraska's state highway system. Note that major routes connect the principal cities of Nebraska and thus are magnets which draw vehicles from feeder roads. On all state highways, traffic builds up as the routes approach cities and is heavy in the cities themselves.

## NEBRASKA RANKS 8th IN THE NATION IN MILES OF OPEN ROADS

The transportation pattern in the Nebraska territory during the middle of the 19th century was substantially the same as that in other areas of the west where civilization was gradually making itself felt. During the decades preceding the Civil War, the white man made use of Indian trails and soon developed reasonably direct routes across the territory from east to west. Most of the early pioneers traveled on horseback and on foot, and in later years covered wagon trains and stagecoaches dotted the Nebraska plains. During the Civil War, the state was on the threshold of the railroad era, and from 1867 until the end of the century when the automobile first made its appearance, goods and people were transported either by rail, wagons, or stagecoach over the primitive pathways of the state.



Nebraska highways serve 450,000 farm people. Of all farm traffic, 47% is on state highways, 45% on county rural roads, and 8% on city streets. Since 1947, all Nebraska gas tax and registration fee money has gone to roads—state, county or local. The average highway construction cost per mile in Nebraska is \$13,924.19. This cost per mile is approximately 50% of the average per mile cost of eight North-Central states. The total road planning expense in Nebraska for all administrative services including engineering is 9.8% of the annual road program cost. This ranks well under the national average of 12%. According to engineering standards, to meet modern traffic, paved roads have a 20-year average life. Today maintenance of state highways costs about \$7,000,000 a year. As no federal money can be used for this purpose, maintenance funds are derived from the state's share of state-created funds.

County-township roads are all open roads not included in the state system or within the street system of cities and towns. There are more than 91,000 miles in the county-township system which constitute 87% of the total Nebraska road mileage. State revenues now going directly to these roads include 38.8% of the gasoline tax, and 39% of motor vehicle registration fees. This income amounts to approximately 84% of the funds available for county-township roads, the other 16% coming from local property taxes.

City-village streets are platted roads lying within the cities and villages of Nebraska. There are over 4,500 miles falling in this classification within the state. Streets are financed by general property taxes and special property assessments paid by taxpayers of the respective communities. In addition to this, however, cities and villages in the state receive an average of approximately 15% of the motor vehicle registration fees and 2.9% of the state gas tax revenue.

The roads and highways in Nebraska, as in other states, are in need of improvement. However, much can be said about the progress made in the past, and plans for the future. In line with the state's pay-as-you-go form of government there is no bonded indebtedness on any of the state highways. Bonds have been issued, however, to some extent for road and street development in the county and city-village categories. Generally speaking, Nebraskans can be proud of the overall road building accomplishments made by their elected representatives during the past half-century. The efforts they have made in carrying out the wishes of the people they serve to continually better the state's road conditions are typical of the Nebraska pride and progress. It's another reason why ours is a great state in which to live, work, and raise our families.

Early roads that existed in those days had been built by counties, cities, and the federal government with no aid from the state. It was not until early in the 20th century that the state started assuming any road construction or maintenance costs.

Today, with over 105,000 miles of state highways, county-township roads, and city-village streets, Nebraska ranks 8th in the nation in miles of open roads. Of the more than 9,500 miles of state roads maintained by the highway department, over 1,400 miles are concrete or brick, more than 2,800 miles are black-top, over 5,000 miles are gravel, and approximately 170 miles are earthen roads. At the present time, funds for the state highways are raised from the following three sources: 58.3% of the six-cent gasoline tax, 46% of the motor vehicle registration fees, and approximately \$8,000,000 of Federal road aid annually if matched by the state.

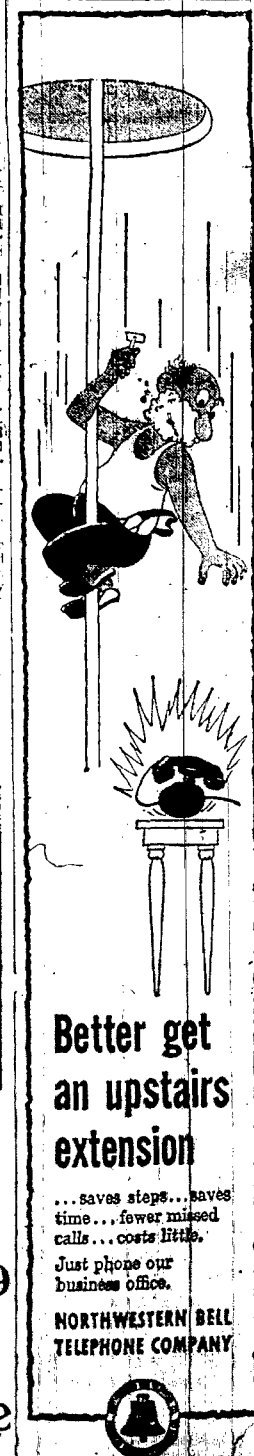

In the second half, the Wildcats made repeated threats on the Peru goal to the 9, 12, 18 and 29 yard lines, but were stopped by the Bobcats.

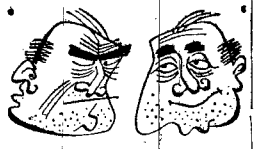

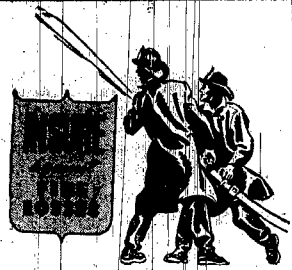
