There Is No State Like Nebraska

Nebraska's are served by over 105,000 miles of state highways, county-township roads and city-village streets





NEBRASKA RANKS 8th IN THE NATION IN MILES OF OPEN ROADS

The transportation pattern in the Nebraska territory during the middle of the 19th century was substantially the same as that in other areas of the west where civilization was gradually making 166W felt. During the decades preceding the Civil War, the white man made use of Indian trails and soon developed reason ably direct routes across the territory from east to west. Most of the early proneers traveled on horseback and on foot, and in later years covered wagon trains and stagecoaches dotted the Nebras he plains. During the Civil War, the state was on the threshold of the railroad era, and from 1867 until the end of the century when the automobile first made its appearance, goods and people were transported either by rail, wagons, or stagecoach over the primi-We pathways of the state.

Early roads that existed in those days had been built by nties, cities, and the federal government with no aid from the state. It was not until early in the 20th century that the state started assuming any road construction or maintenance costs.

Today, with over 105,000 miles of state highways, county Township roads, and city-village streets, Nebybaska ranks 8th in the nation in miles of open roads. Of the more than 9,500 miles of state roads maintained by the highway department, over 1,400 miles are concrete of heick, more than 2,800 miles are black-top, over 5,500 miles are gravel, and approximately 170 miles are earther roads. At the present time, funds for the state highways state highways 3.3% of the sixcent garoline tax, 46% of the motor vehicle registration fees, and approximately \$8,000,000 of Federal road aid annually if matched by the state.



Nebraska highways serve 450,000 farm people. Of all farm traffic, 47% is on state highways, 45% on county rural roads, and 8% on city streets. Since 1947, all Nebraska gas tax and registration fee money has gone to roads-state, county or local. The average highway construction cost per mile in Nebraska is \$13,924.19. This cost per mile is approximately 50% of the average per mile cost of eight North-Central states. The total road planning expense in Nebraska for all administrative services including engineering is 9.8% of the annual road program cost. This ranks well under the national average of 12%. According to engineering standards, to meet modern traffic, paved roads have a 20 year average life. Today maintenance of state highways costs about \$7,000,000 a year As no lederal money can be used for this purpose, maintenance funds are derived from the state's share of state-created funds.

County-township roads are all open roads not included in the state system or within the street system of cities and towns. There are more than 91,000 miles in the county-township system which constitute 87% of the total Nebraska road mileage. State revenues now going directly to these roads include 38.8% of the gasoline tax, and 39% of motor vehicle registration fees. This income ounts to approximately 84% of the funds available for countytownship roads, the other 16% coming from local property taxes.

City-village streets are platted roads lying within the cities and villages of Nebraska. There are over 4,500 miles falling in this classification within the state. Streets are financed by generated property assessments paid by taxpavers of the respective communities. In addition to this, how ever, cities and villages in the state receive an average of approximately 15% of the motor vehicle registration fees and 2.9% of the state gas tax revenue.

The roads and highways in Nebraska, as in other states, are in need of improvement. However, much can be said about the progress made in the past, and plans for the future. In line with the state's pay-as-you go form of government there is no bonded indebtedness on any of the state highways. Bonds have been issued, however, to some extent for road and street development in the county and city-willage categories. Generally speaking, Nebraskans can be proud of the overall road building accomplishments made by their elected representatives during the past half-century. The efforts they have made in cerrying out the wishes of the people they serve to continually better the state's road conditions are typical of Nebraska pride and progress. It's another reason why durs is a great state in which to live, work, and raise our families.



Who Runs America?
