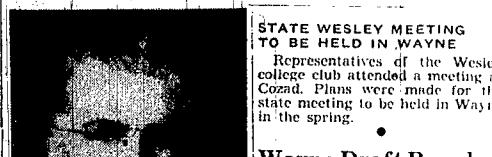

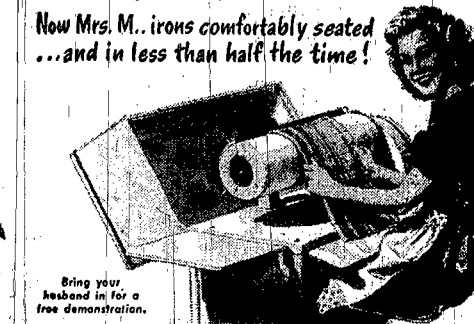

Here We Go Again... No need to say "Stop me if you've heard this one," because of course you have.

So we at The Herald want to issue this annual warning to our northeast Nebraska farmer friends: "Don't Take Chances... Shut off the power before you reach for those rollers!"

Sure—the story about the fellow who gets "shucked clean" of his clothes by a corn picker is always funny afterward. But we don't want to even have that kind of a story to publish around here, because for everyone who "just loses his clothes" in such an accident there are dozens who get injuries so serious that they become lifetime handicaps.

So please, friends—be careful! We want to put your name in the paper... but not because you have lost a hand in a picker accident.

J. Edgar Hoover, director of the FBI, has informed Congress that his agency has tagged 12,000 of the most dangerous communists in the United States and is ready to round them up in case of war with Russia.

'Panic Buying' in Washington

According to a bulletin of the National Retail Dry Goods Association there is encouraging evidence that the wave of hysterical buying which hit retail stores as a result of the Korean situation has begun to ease off.

The common-sense expression of one retailer is typical: "The retail buying rush doesn't do the retailer any good. It only borrows from future business. The consumer will have to consume this merchandise; the result will be diminished sales later. This involves a danger that some manufacturers may base their production on unjustified premises, and then may have to dump heavy inventories..."

It seems hard for some to understand simple but fundamental characteristics of the retail distribution system. It must move a high volume of goods at minimum prices. It is geared to operate in a flexible market—this means a free market. It is built on competition. Not only its efficiency but its function can be speedily wrecked by centralized government control.

Europeans and people in the Near-East who are worried about the future are sending their money, gold, silver and precious stones to the western hemisphere. Much of it is going to Uruguay and Panama for safe-keeping.

Political Profiteering

No one is trying harder to profit by the present national emergency than many government bureaus.

A glaring example is the Department of the Interior which is the primary Federal agency seeking to socialize the nation's water power resources. Public employees of this bureau are arguing for greater appropriations for uncalculated tax-exempt government power projects as "essential to national defense."

They disregard the need of conserving tax dollars in the interest of defense, in their desire to play politics as usual. The projects for which they ask billions would not be completed for years.

A dictator could not do a better job of propagandizing for government monopolies than is being done by this powerful group of public officials and employees. Their program would ultimately destroy much free, tax-paying American enterprise and create more thousands of tax-eating bureaucratic jobs. They are seeking to profiteer on the taxpayer in a national crisis, as much as would any manufacturer who set out to bleed consumers of every cent possible in the name of the war emergency.

Nebraska in the production of corn ranks 5th in the nation



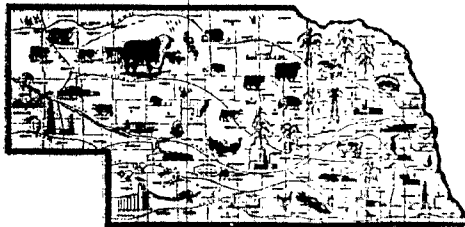
## CORN

### LEADING PRODUCT OF THE CORNHUSKER STATE

Farming in Nebraska during the past fifty years has taken tremendous strides forward. Early settlers of the territory would hardly believe their eyes at the sight of the many mechanical gadgets and pieces of equipment used by the modern farmer of today. Electricity, for example, performing chores that in the past were hard and tedious would undoubtedly make them stare in wonder. Modern gasoline powered tractors pulling cultivators up and down rows of huge cornfields or plowing vast acres of land would probably make them rub their eyes in amazement. In the early pioneer days of ox and horse drawn equipment it would be considered a major catastrophe if rains held up planting. Today, the modern farmer is rarely concerned by being held up two or three weeks. To illustrate this point Mr. Sherman E. Johnson, assistant chief of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, states:

"With tractor and power equipment, three acres of land can be prepared and planted with corn during the time that one acre can be planted by using animals. If the tractor is put on a 24-hour-a-day schedule—a thing not possible with animals but a regular procedure when farmers are working against time and the weather—the preparation and planting job can be done seven times as rapidly as with horses."

Nebraska is known primarily as an agricultural state. Outstanding, and most important of the crops raised within the state, is corn. Even before Columbus came to America, corn was raised. Since then, of course, its methods of cultivation, harvest, and use have changed markedly. Plant breeders of today are changing



In 1949, 7,364,000 acres of corn were harvested in Nebraska. At an average yield of 32.5 bushels per acre, the total production was 239,330,000 bushels. The value of this production was approximately \$37.38 per harvest acre, or a total crop value of \$275,230,000. Nebraska ranks among the nation's top ten states in the production of 20 agricultural commodities, and ranks fifth in the production of corn. In 1949, corn accounted for over half of the total value of all crops produced on Nebraska farms. In 1949, 470,500 irrigated acres were planted in corn. Of this figure 467,520 acres were harvested, yielding 56.8 bushels per acre, or a total production of 26,540,210 bushels on irrigated land.

the physical form of the plant, composition of its grain, and developing better corn yields. Most important in the advancement of the corn industry in Nebraska is the development of hybrid seed corn. In addition to giving better yields hybrid corn gives better stalks, deeper rooting, vigorous growth, and greater resistance to drought and disease. This development can be credited largely to the Federal and State governments. As the result of large scale food production problems, land grant colleges and agricultural experiment stations have worked unceasingly toward ever better grain quality and production.

The development and distribution of hybrid seed corn in the early thirties has changed farming practices considerably during the past twenty years. It has eliminated the job of selecting and storing seed corn and preparing it for planting the following spring. Today's farmers are able to buy seed corn that is precision graded, sacked, and ready to plant. Sturdy hybrid stalks and uniformity of ear height have boomed the use of mechanical corn pickers, eliminating almost entirely picking by hand. Through testing and research, Nebraska has become a world leader in the production of hybrid seed corn, and, as a result, ranks fifth in the nation in the number of bushels of corn produced.

Here, briefly, then, is the story of corn in Cornhusker land. It is another chapter in the story of a great state. It is another example of Nebraska pioneering and development that has resulted in progress and prosperity. It is another outstanding reason why there is no state like Nebraska . . . a great place in which to live, work, and raise our families.
