





Few people deny this. Yet huge numbers of Americans, who regard themselves as good and patriotic citizens, fail to take advantage of their greatest privilege.

In local elections, it is common for less than half of the eligible voters to go to the polling hooths. Even in mational elections, in which men are running for the highest offices, and in which issues and principles of the atmost moment are at stake, millions of us don't vote.

The result, of course, is government by minority—there is no way to measure the views and opinions of the man who fails to exercise the right of franchise. Government of the people is possible only when the people make their stand known—and that can be done only at the ballot box.

In just 11 days there will be another election of great importance. The control of Gongness will be decided. The Presidential campaign of 1952 will be strongly influenced by, what happens this November. Policies which will determine the future of the nation, for good or ill, will be established. The majority will rule, as usual. But the true voice of the majority can never be known if again, as in the past, millions of people who possess the right to vote shirk their duty and responsibility.
