Editor's note: Nebraska too often has been maligned by comparison. This week the state's would-be critics are effectively put in their place. The writer is Sally Malone, a senior in the School of Journalism, University of Nebraska.

Nothing can make one appreciate his home state more than to travel through the other 47 during the summer.

Now that summer is over and the last stragglers are returning from their vacations, they can look back over all the miles covered and be thankful they're home again.

The adage "Go west, young man, and prosper" still seems to be the chief highway leading in that direction for always under construction. And when one sees

the thousands of cars on roads, he wonders if anyone is staying at home.

"Wonderful Wyoming"—so the chambers of commerce there call it. But it doesn't seem too wonderful to the weary traveler who had thought he might see some beautiful scenery in its southern half. The only thing it can offer that Nebraska can't is a large supply of high, red rocks. However, those rocks lose their charm when the traveler sees that they are surrounded by little more than sagebrush and tundra. No one has to travel much farther north to see the "green grass of Wyoming."

Utah is the next state to be crossed. And on viewing Salt Lake City from the mountain

pass, one can easily see why the weary Mormons said "This is the place," and gave up any further westward movement. The dream doesn't last long, though, for as the traveler leaves that beautiful city, he encounters nothing but miles of salt desert. Again he wishes he had never left home.

After Utah comes Nevada. About all one can say about that state is that the highways are wonderful—thanks to gambling. Towns are few and far between, but on yearly visits one can amuse himself by seeing how much the sagebrush has grown. So it's a good thing Nevada has fine highways because there is certainly no reason to drive slowly.

When California is finally reached, one thinks his vacation is at his feet. But he hasn't reckoned with the weather—for which the natives always have an excuse. If it's too cold, they say you came a month too early; if it's too hot, they say you came a month too late. Consequently it's no wonder that the chamber of commerce there is so widely quoted. Yes, Californians may love the weather, but they're used to it.

After all is said and done, and the traveler leaves that beautiful land, he looks forward to seeing the wastelands of Nevada, the great salt desert of Utah and the red rock of Wyoming for only one reason—he's heading home.

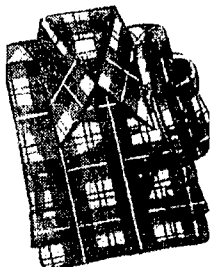

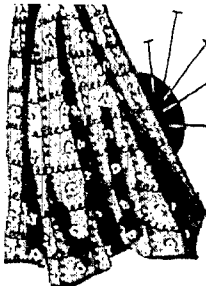

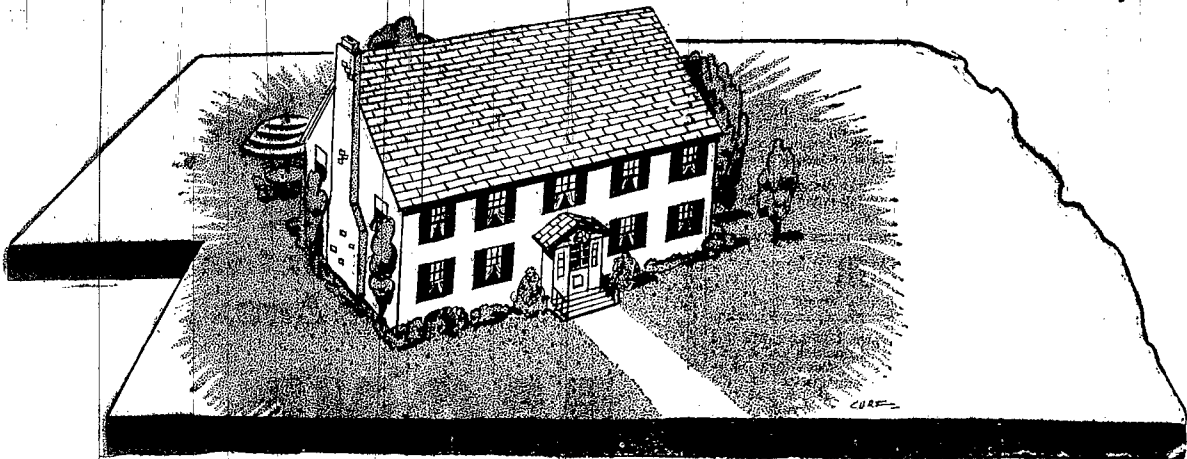

There Is No State Like Nebraska

Nebraska ranks 2nd in blue grass seed; 4th in sweet clover seed; 14th in red clover seed



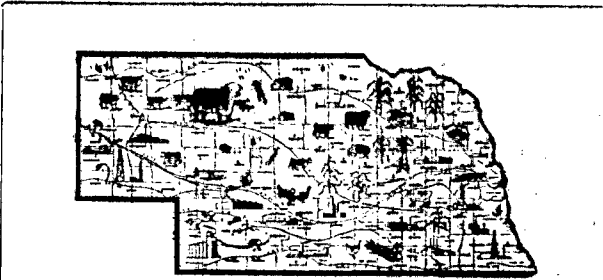
BLUE GRASS FROM NEBRASKA

MAKES BEAUTIFUL LAWNS THE NATION OVER

Nebraska, as is known, is one of the outstanding cattle states in the nation. Because of this, pastures are an important source of feed. A large percentage of the income from Nebraska farms comes from the sale of livestock and livestock products. This, then is one of the main reasons why clover and blue grass seed have become an important part of the economic picture of our great state.

Almost half of Nebraska's land is devoted to grass. These grasslands range from small pastures in the eastern part of extensive grazing areas in the sandhills region, and comprise over twenty million acres. In addition to being used as pasture land, many clover and blue grass fields are used to produce seed for resale purposes. In this seed production Nebraska ranks high among other states in the nation. In 1949, Nebraska was second in the United States in the production of blue grass seed, fourth in the production of sweet clover seed, and fourteenth in the production of red clover seed.

During the past several years, Nebraska has become known as an important producer of Kentucky blue grass seed. Prominent buyers over the nation regard this Nebraska seed as outstanding and much of it is sold for use in planting reseeded lawns. Old as it may seem, beautiful, velvet-smooth grounds and yards of mansions and modest homes all over America come from Kentucky blue grass... produced in Nebraska. Not being adapted to extremely dry weather, this grass is generally produced in the eastern one-fourth of the state. It is, however, produced to a limited extent under favorable conditions in the remaining sections.



According to the United States Department of Agriculture, Nebraska harvested 18,803,000 acres of principal crops in 1949 to place seventh in the nation in the production of agricultural commodities. In 1949, the state ranked second in the production of blue grass seed with 783,000 bushels; fourth in the production of sweet clover seed with 48,000 bushels; and fourteenth in the production of red clover seed with 16,000 bushels. Clover and blue grass seed are included in the list of principal agricultural products produced in Nebraska.

Sweet clover, another nationally famous Nebraska seed product, is grown most extensively in the eastern part of the state and in other sections where moisture conditions are favorable. It is utilized for soil improvement, pasture, hay, and silage. Discriminating seed buyers the nation over rely on Nebraska year after year for high quality sweet clover seed... another great product of a great state.

Red clover in Nebraska, while not as prominent a seed product as blue grass and sweet clover, also ranks high in national importance. This clover makes excellent pasture, especially for young stock. It is grown in the extreme eastern part of the state and in the irrigated and subirrigated lands in other sections. It is an excellent product for increasing soil acidity, and because of its fibrous root system gives soil somewhat more resistance to erosion. It is interesting to note that red clover seed production depends greatly upon insects for pollination. Because of this, hives of bees are often placed near red clover fields.

Here, briefly, is another chapter in the Greater Nebraska story. It portrays the results of efforts on the part of progressive Nebraskans to bring into prominence products that contribute to the fame and fortune of our great state, making it an ever better place in which to live, work, and raise our families.

Against amendment of sections 6 and 7, Article III, of the Constitution of Nebraska, providing for either annual or biennial sessions of the Legislature, providing restrictions on business that may be transacted by the Legislature in even-numbered years, providing for election of members of the Legislature for four-year terms, and providing for payment of compensation to members of the Legislature as may be provided by law.

TEXT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEBRASKA, Section 1. That at the general election in November, 1950, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, for approval, the following amendments to sections 6 and 7, Article III, of the Constitution of Nebraska, which are hereby proposed by the Legislature.

Section 2. That the proposed amendments shall be submitted to the electors upon a ballot separate from that upon which the names of candidates appear after publication once each week for four weeks in at least one legal newspaper in each county where a newspaper is published immediately preceding the general election in 1950. The ballot for the submission of the proposed amendments shall be as follows:

For amendment of sections 6 and 7, Article III, of the Constitution of Nebraska, providing for either annual or biennial sessions of the Legislature, providing restrictions on business that may be transacted by the Legislature in even-numbered years, providing for election of members of the Legislature for four-year terms, and providing for payment of compensation to members of the Legislature as may be provided by law.

Against amendment of sections 6 and 7, Article III, of the Constitution of Nebraska, providing for either annual or biennial sessions of the Legislature, providing restrictions on business that may be transacted by the Legislature in even-numbered years, providing for election of members of the Legislature for four-year terms, and providing for payment of compensation to members of the Legislature as may be provided by law.

Section 3. That the proposed amendments, if adopted, shall be in force and take effect immediately upon completion of the canvass of the votes, at which time it shall be the duty of the Governor to proclaim the amendments adopted as a part of the Constitution of Nebraska.
