Corn Borer's Activity Lower This Year; Prospects Better

Activity of the corn borer, the mid-west's cornfield menace, is at the lowest ebb this year since 1948 and indications are it will be even less active next spring.

Survey counts for this area are not yet available but Warner points out they should be low. In addition, 50 per cent of the borers found have been immature—only about half grown.

Entomologists insect specialists tell us that half grown worms won't go through the winter, which fact should mean less trouble from the first generation borer next spring.

Damage Lower

Damage to corn was minimized this year because the first generation borer, which usually starts in June, was slowed up by unusually cool weather in July and August.

According to Warner, more damage has resulted this year from the corn rootworm than from the corn borer.

Rootworm Hard to Control

There is very little control over the rootworm. Some combat it by spraying the soil, but spraying often kills the useful bacteria also.

Noted Cellist And Longines Symphonette

Two outstanding programs are slated during the coming week for Wayne State students and townspeople by the college special programs committee, according to Mrs. Maude Joseph Smith, professor of English and chairman of the special programs committee.

First of these will be the Longines Symphonette, famous New York radio symphony orchestra, scheduled to appear in the Wayne city auditorium Sunday, Nov. 5, at 8 p.m.

The Symphonette, under the direction of Michel Piastro, includes every instrument of a "symphony" orchestra, but with some of them notably the strings, in smaller number. Piastro's theory, which is borne out by the Longines group, is that the smaller size is adequate when every member is a virtuoso.

Wednesday evening, Nov. 8, at the Wayne college auditorium, Dimitry Markevitch, internationally known young cellist, is scheduled to perform.

Markevitch, who began his concert career in Europe at the age of 15, has just returned from his third concert tour of the European continent and is making a series of appearances in this country.

At the outbreak of World War II, Markevitch made a tour for the U.S. before his induction into the U.S. Army, in which he was a corporal for three years. He is a student and friend of Gregor Piatigorsky, recognized as one of the outstanding cellists of our time.

No Admission Charge

Both the Symphonette and the Markevitch program are open to the public and are being presented by the committee without charge. Children under 12, however, will not be admitted unless accompanied by their parents or an older person who will be responsible for them, Mrs. Smith announced.

The nature of these musical programs is such that the committee feels it isn't prudent to group young children to disturb or distract from the appreciation of the best of the audience, Mrs. Smith said.

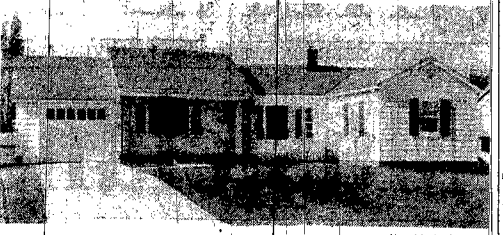
Twelfth English

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"Just One Vote"

Read these examples of how a single vote changed the course of history

Frequently, especially around election time, you hear this question,

"What good will one vote do?"

Of course, hundreds of elections, small and large, have swung on a single ballot.

Here is some really big stuff when just one vote turned the tide.

The Declaration of Independence

Our American charter of liberty, the Resolution of the Declaration of Independence, was passed by the Continental Congress, July 2, 1776, when Caesar Rodney, delegate from Delaware, rose from a sick-bed and rode 89 miles, on horseback through a stormy night to cast just one vote—putting his state on the side of freedom and helping assure unanimous approval of all the colonies.

Saves a President... Elects a President

Andrew Johnson, only U. S. President to be impeached, kept the Presidency by just one vote. The U. S. Senate, sitting as a court of impeachment, voted 35 for conviction and 19 for acquittal—just one vote less than the two-thirds majority necessary to convict.

Rutherford B. Hayes was elected President by one vote. His election was contested, and it was referred to an electoral commission. The commission gave the contested electoral votes to Hayes by just one vote, 8 to 7. Whereupon, Congress declared Hayes elected by just one vote, 185 to 184.

Incidentally, the man who cast the deciding vote for Hayes, an Indiana Senator, won his place in Congress by just one vote. And that one vote was cast by a man who, though desperately ill, insisted on being taken to the polls to cast that one ballot.

Votes for Women by Just One Vote

In 1918, woman suffrage in the U. S. passed the House of Representatives with just one vote to spare. When the bill went to the Senate, it failed to pass by just two votes. (It passed both houses of Congress the next year.)

In World Affairs Today

But don't think the importance of just one vote, or a few votes, applies only to the past.

This very year, the present Government in England is maintained in office by just three votes. They must hold 313 seats in Parliament for an absolute majority—it has barely enough for day-to-day business with 316.

Yes, friends, you can check the present or dip into the past and turn up a lot of cases where just one vote tipped over or set up somebody's apprearat.

Every Vote Is Equal

"My vote doesn't count" is pretty silly stuff, isn't it? Your vote counts just as much as the President's. Your vote is the equal of anybody else's in hiring or firing a man in public office—if your vote is used. Yet in the last Presidential election, 45 million qualified voters failed to go to the polls.

No matter how you vote, doesn't it give you a pretty good, red-white-and-blue American feeling when you've marked your "X" and step out of that voting booth?

This 'New' Kind of Warfare

In one of his recent columns, Walter Lippman discussed the changed concept of war that the Korean conflict brought to this country.

"The Communists call it 'people's war.' We call it guerrilla war."

"Our extremely advanced and complicated equipment, which requires a high industrial development to make it and to service it, is most effective against countries which also fight with complicated weapons made by a concentrated and complicated industrial system."

Here is one of the gravest problems that war in any part of Asia presents us with. As against the Asiatics, we are hopelessly outnumbered in the sphere of manpower.

In Korea, we could not have used the bomb even had we wished to—suitable targets for so rare and costly a weapon did not exist.

It is reported that General Bradley has said that we must not let ourselves be led by interminable "police actions" in Asia.

"We are in the midst of earth-shaking world developments and the nation is in desperate need of the advice and the vote which comes from the grass roots areas."

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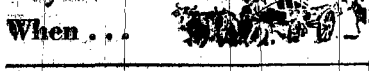

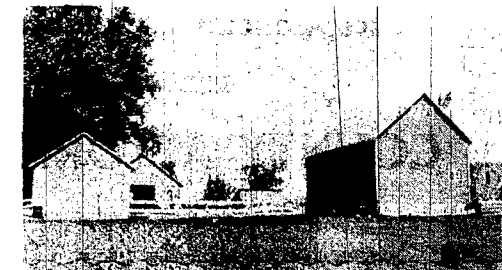

For amendment of sections 6 and 7, Article III, of the Constitution of Nebraska, providing for either annual or biennial sessions of the Legislature, providing restrictions on business that may be transacted by the Legislature in even-numbered years, providing for election of members of the Legislature for four-year terms, and providing for payment of compensation to members of the Legislature as may be provided by law.

Against amendment of sections 6 and 7, Article III, of the Constitution of Nebraska, providing for either annual or biennial sessions of the Legislature, providing restrictions on business that may be transacted by the Legislature in even-numbered years, providing for election of members of the Legislature for four-year terms, and providing for payment of compensation to members of the Legislature as may be provided by law.

TEXT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEBRASKA.

Section 1. That at the general election in November, 1950, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, for approval, the following amendments to sections 6 and 7, Article III, of the Constitution of Nebraska, which are hereby proposed by the Legislature.

"Sec. 6. The Legislature shall consist of not more than fifty members, to be elected for terms of not less than thirty months, the sessions of the Legislature shall be annual or biennial as provided by law. If the sessions are held annually, in even-numbered years the Legislature shall not transact any business except to provide appropriations for the expenses of government and to confirm appointments unless specifically requested to do so by message of the Governor.

Sec. 7. At the general election held in November, 1952, there shall be elected such number of members of the Legislature as may be provided by law from even-numbered districts for a term of two years, and such number of members of the Legislature as may be provided by law from odd-numbered districts for a term of four years. Thereafter at each general election, successors of members whose terms expire in January following, shall be elected for a term of four years. All terms shall begin at noon on the first Tuesday in January next ensuing the

general election at which the member was elected. Each member shall be nominated and elected in a nonpartisan manner and without any indication on the ballot that he is affiliated with or endorsed by any political party or organization. The aggregate salaries of all the members shall be determined by the Legislature and payable in such manner and at such times as shall be provided by law. In addition to his salary each member shall receive and be paid an amount equal to his actual expenses in traveling by the most usual route once to and returning from each regular or special session of the Legislature. Members of the Legislature shall receive no pay nor perquisites other than said salary and expenses. Employees of the Legislature shall receive no compensation other than their salary or per diem.

Sec. 2. That the proposed amendments shall be submitted to the electors upon a ballot separate from that upon which the names of candidates appear, after publication once each week for four weeks in at least one legal newspaper in each county where a newspaper is published immediately preceding the general election in 1950. The ballot for the submission of the proposed amendments shall be as follows:

"Proposed Constitutional Amendments

For amendment of sections 6 and 7, Article III, of the Constitution of Nebraska, providing for either annual or biennial sessions of the Legislature, providing restrictions on business that may be transacted by the Legislature in even-numbered years, providing for election of members of the Legislature for four-year terms, and providing for payment of compensation to members of the Legislature as may be provided by law.

Against amendment of sections 6 and 7, Article III, of the Constitution of Nebraska, providing for either annual or biennial sessions of the Legislature, providing restrictions on business that may be transacted by the Legislature in even-numbered years, providing for election of members of the Legislature for four-year terms, and providing for payment of compensation to members of the Legislature as may be provided by law.

Sec. 3. That the proposed amendments, if adopted, shall be in force and take effect immediately upon completion of the canvass of the votes, at which time it shall be the duty of the Governor to proclaim the amendments adopted as a part of the Constitution of Nebraska.


