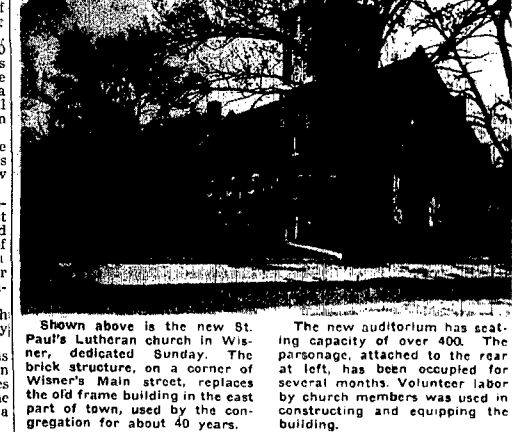

Recipes to Try

Mrs. Frank Griffith has given us her very old, traditional Swiss recipe for preparing pheasant and this being the season, it is indeed appropriate. The recipe calls for one pheasant, or other similar wild game, cut up in pieces the usual way. The pheasant is rolled in a mixture of one cup of flour, a heaping teaspoon of salt and 1/2 teaspoon of pepper. It is then browned in a deep frying pan with two heaping tablespoons of fat.

When brown, a medium onion chopped fine and three bay leaves are added. Two more tablespoons of flour are added to the pheasant mixture and this is also allowed to brown. Hot water to cover is put on, with two tablespoons of vinegar and one tablespoon of sugar.

The pheasant is placed in the oven and baked two to three hours, depending upon the age of the fowl. Hot water is put on from time to time, to keep the pheasant well-covered.

For added taste, Mrs. Griffith suggests you use two slices of white bread which have been cubed. These are browned in a tablespoon of butter and placed in the green. When the pheasant is ready, pour it and the hot gravy over the bread.

The sweet hot flavor is delicious in our typical fall weather. We are sure you'll like it.

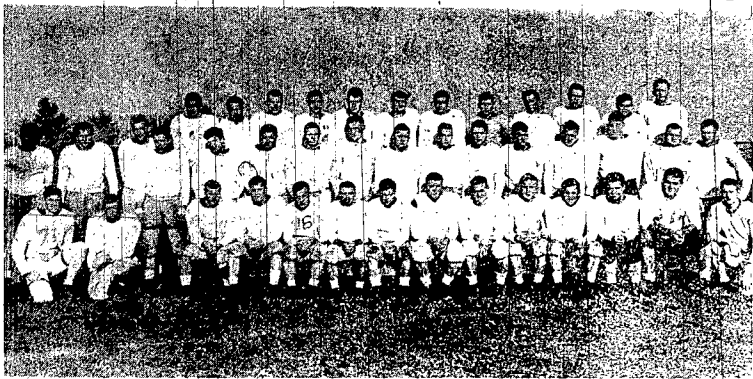

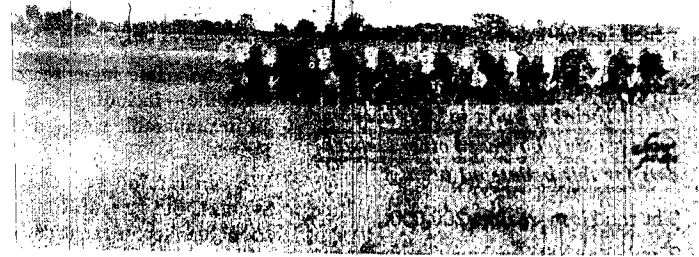
