Election? That's Over!

Wayne and Wayne county business is generally back to normal again this week. Today. Tuesday, one almost has to blink and ask, "Was there really an election only week ago?"
Issues and candidates and questions that seemed all important only seven days ago are nearly forgotten already. The majority vote of the election is recorded and acceptably the rank and file

Again, Young Objectors

How are we to judge the cases of young men who are again in trouble with the courts of the nation because they resist the laws and regulations governing the registration of citizens for possible service in defense of the nation?

In the beginning of World War II they resisted and were put in prison for their defiance. Their defense was that their Quaker religious faith and their consciunces would be violated by the mere act of registration.

At that time they were paroled from prison to give service in non-combat activities. Now they are following the same determined course of resistance. They say that it is against their consciences and against the will of God as they interpretit. "Magnificent!" we heard one person say by way of comment on that situation. Our interpretation is somewhat different. We are of the belief that such conduct overlooks some very important things. It ignores gratitude for the defense of the mation that protects us from greater foes and problems of living together than the individual can contend with. These young men overlook support of the hation that as opened the way to the blessings that are ours on every hand. They ignore the security that comes to us only through our living together and the "give and take," together that makes for our mutual good and happiness.

This list of mutual blessings could go indefinitely. All rest upon the fundamental principle of "one for all and all for one," the cooperation on which the nation is based. To violate that fundamental principle is far from 'magnificent.' Such conduct is rightfully in the jurisdiction of the courts for judgement when they are in possession of all the facts. It is not for use to judge, but for the courts.


