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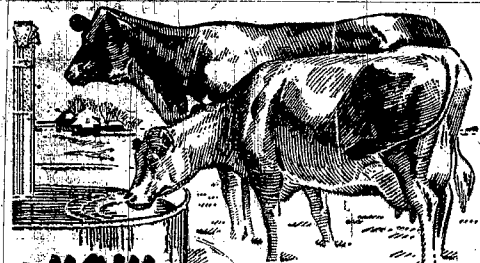
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# Wayne High Holds Primary Election

A Friend in Need

It's been said before and emphasized in many ways, but we want to issue one last plea this year for less "cornpicker carelessness." The few seconds you might save by not turning off the power may turn into time, money and even life, lost through a split-second lapse of good sense.

It is heartening to hear of the many husking bees taking place in our corn territory, as long as mishaps do continue. One rarely hears of a farmer being hurt in a cornpicker accident anymore but what his friends and neighbors take over to finish gathering the injured man's harvest. We more or less take the "Good Samaritan" acts for granted.

Maybe we say "that's nice," but little do we realize just how much the act is appreciated. It's a timely boost for a farmer to know all his hours of toil and worry through the growing season aren't in vain, when he is faced with the loss of a hand and most of the year's corn crop.

So we doff our editorial hat to the co-operative midwest farmer who is, indeed, a friend in need.

Big Men from Small Towns

A big step has been taken in behalf of small towns. The George F. Baker Foundation of New York recently awarded money to 12 colleges in the United States to assist in the education of outstanding leaders for the American economy of tomorrow.

One of the 12 institutions awarded funds was Grinnell (Iowa) college, a small school in a town of some 6,000 people. Grinnell has stipulated that its \$50,000 award be used for graduates of small town high schools—towns of less than 15,000 population—because officials are of the opinion that "in the future, as in the past, this potential leadership is to be found in the small town high schools of America."

Three cheers for that kind of thinking. We heartily agree. In our day when mere size in city, industry or university is often construed as proof of greatness, it is heartening to know that the virtue of smallness is still respected.

An educational institution or a community may easily become too large for the emotional and intellectual comprehension of the individual. The vastness of our country demands individuals who in their formative years have been trained in a community which can be understood and fully experienced. Some degree of intimate exchange in the classroom must accompany the teaching of wisdom of the past and future. The small town, where our social institutions had their beginnings, must be basic knowledge to our country's leaders, present and future.

We believe it is no accident that many of our greatest statesmen, scientists, clergymen and educators, who have contributed so much to the determination of what our country is and has been, have come from small towns all over the United States.

Carl Sandburg has characterized Chicago as "hog butcher of the world," in his well-known poem, but how did it become "hog butcher"? Philip Armour and his brother Joseph, were born in Stockbridge, Mass. (population 1800). Gustavus Swift was born in Sandwich, Mass. (population 950).

Only twice have we elected presidents who were born in large cities, Theodore Roosevelt, born in New York City, and William Howard Taft, born in Cincinnati, Ohio. The rest have hailed from such places as Braintree, Mass., Kinderhook, N. J., Point Pleasant, Ohio, Caldwell, N. J., Staunton, Va., Plymouth, Vt., West Branch, Iowa, and Lamar, Mo.

Thomas Edison, inventor or at least developer of the telephone, electric light, phonograph and moving picture, was born in Milan, Ohio. Wilbur and Orville Wright, builders and flyers of the first successful airplane, were born at Melville, Ohio. Lee De Forest, "father of radio," was born in Council Bluffs, Iowa. Henry Ford was born at Greenfield, Mich.

So we wish to understand the contribution to twentieth-century civilization of the small town in the west, we need only to imagine Chicago without the telephone, electric light, phonograph, moving picture, airplane, radio and the automobile.

Now that National Book Week is over our thoughts turn to the next activity of special interest. It used to be that the next thing we would do was to make a poster for Thanksgiving and arrange a display of Thanksgiving books and stories. Not a soul has asked for anything along that line but instead we began having requests for Christmas material the first of November. It hardly seems worth the time and effort to make a Thanksgiving poster only to take it down a week later to make way for Christmas decorations. We notice that stores have skipped Thanksgiving and much as we hate to do it we probably will too, since no one seems to be interested. Do you think it is because no one has anything to be thankful for anymore? Surely the world hasn't reached that sad state yet but it very well might if we keep on forgetting to be thankful for what we have.
"OUT OF THE MOUTHS OF BABES" COME some statements at times which give us pause.
