Christmas at Home and Abroad

With Christmas looming larger on the calendar each day, the American Legion's "Tide of Toys" campaign becomes increasingly significant.
When thoughts turn to our children's happiness on the morning of Dec. 25, we might well give a minute's thought to children overseas, many of whom are losing sight of Yuletide happiness.
American youngsters early this year sent three million toys, through the Legion, to children of 14 west European countries.
This year the Legion hopes to send 15 million toys to Europe as well as some areas in the Pacific. Crooner Ring Crosby will serve as honorary chairman with commentator-columnist Drew Pearson and Irving Geist, New York industrialist, as honorary co-chairmen.

Tom Partridge, national "Tide of Toys" chairman from New York, recently issued a plea to "our boys and girls, out of the goodness of their hearts, to donate some of their own toys so their little friends overseas might share the joys of Christmas."
It is not our duty, obviously, to provide joy in the hearts of these children—total strangers to most of us. But for very little sacrifice on our parts, we can do a great deal toward spreading Christmas joy to young hearts the world over.

Educating Our Children

The number of new teachers needed this year to "reduce teacher load and to provide adequately for increasing enrollments," as estimated recently by the National Education association, totals nearly 37,000. According to the NEA, however, this is but a small fraction of the number needed to give our nation's children top educational care.
The reason is the growing practice of issuing substandard teaching certificates to cope with the shortage of qualified teachers. Practically every state has adopted this practice in the last 10 years. This year there are an estimated 80,000 teachers holding substandard certificates.
In some areas this means merely that a teacher has been granted a certificate pending completion of work on an advanced degree. In others it means certification of personnel obviously unfit to teach, including those lacking education beyond the high school level. Figuring in the unfit, the revised NEA estimate of teacher needs for 1950 comes close to 100,000.
The fight to break this teacher bottleneck through increased salaries has been meeting with encouraging success. The latest NEA survey shows instructional employees (teachers, supervisors, principals) now have an average annual salary of \$3,080, marking an increase in real purchasing power over 1938-39 of more than 35%. While teachers' salaries have made real headway in the last five years, teachers still have not reached their pre-war position, when they were, on the average, higher paid than employed persons in general.
The big danger now is that the recent spurt in the cost of living will wipe out whatever modest advances have been made to date. If it does, we can expect an even more aggravated teacher shortage at a time when public school enrollments are slated to reach an all-time high, due mostly to a sharp rise in our nation's birth rate during and after World War II.
