License fees for Nebraska passenger cars reverted Dec. 1 to the old rate in effect before the state's 1949 road program came into existence.

Up until Dec. 1, 1950, the fees for passenger car registrations were \$8 for autos weighing 2,600 pounds or over. Those weighing less than 2,600 pounds required a \$6 registration fee.

Wayne County Treasurer Jean Boyd said the result of voters' decision Nov. 7 this year to repeal the gas tax and license fee program puts auto fees back on the former scale.

In effect now are requirements calling for \$5 license fees on passenger cars weighing 2,800 or over and \$3 for autos weighing less than 2,800 pounds.

Boyd pointed out, however, that although the change took place as of Dec. 1, new 1951 registrations are not available until Jan. 2, 1951.

Holiday Accidents

Once again American armed forces are in action trying to protect and uphold the ideal of freedom. Once again the spirit of Christmas will be mocked by the hate and bloodshed of the battlefield.

In many American homes the roar of the cannon will make it hard to hear the ringing of Christmas bells. That is to be deeply regretted, but at least we can say it is for a purpose. Throughout history the torch of man's dignity and freedom has been held aloft only through the sacrifice of its bearers.

We, as individuals, can do little to prevent such personal tragedies. But we can do a lot to prevent another kind of tragedy which is equally poignant at the Christmas season—and more cruel because it is needless.

We refer to the preventable tragedy of accidents. The National Safety Council has called for intensive accident prevention efforts during the holidays—usually a very dangerous period of the year.

There is an objective which has our wholehearted support, not only because it is better to have a joyous Yuletide and to save lives, but also because we cannot afford to waste the resources of manpower and material so necessary these days to our national strength.

The waste is enormous—much more than most persons realize. The American Medical association has shown that accidents rob the nation of more working years than any disease, because accidents strike all age groups, not just those whose productive years are largely behind them.

Ned Dearborn, council president, reports the Christmas-New Year's holiday season as the peak accident period of the year, with traffic accidents presenting the most acute problem. Heavier travel and the festive spirit of the season always add to the normal winter hazards of bad weather, slippery roads, and added hours of darkness.

The traffic accident problem this year is serious, with a death toll of 35,000 in prospect. That would be the largest number of automobile victims since the record year of 1941.

Rigid enforcement of the laws by state, county and municipal police, plus individual determination to play it safe, can keep the Christmas spirit—and all of us—alive this year.

Christmas Has Begun

For families with small children, Christmas begins weeks before December 25. It doesn't take much to set the small fry off. Winter's first "full-fledged" snow, a toy shop window or a Christmas gift suggestion in school can all have the same effect. From then on, Christmas for them is the "event" of the future. And for their parents it means shopping time is here.

The toy departments are usually the first to burst forth in Christmas raiment. With the opening of "Toyland," children know the wonderful holiday is near, and the clamor begins.

"I want that doll and a train and a tricycle and a buggy and a sled and a . . . murmur little voices as their owners gaze, starry-eyed, at the shiny, linsely silver and gold of "Toyland."

At about this time of year, too, parents find a way to twist the Christmas angle to their own advantage. Whenever the junior members of the family want something new, the ever-present reply is: "Wait and see what Santa brings."

Secrets also begin to pop up at this time of year as small heads fairly burst with the importance of the "secret" projects under way at school.

Another sign of the season is the appearance of earnest young Christmas card salesmen from schools and Scout groups. They approach friends and strangers alike with a seriousness which makes those approached stop and wonder if it is time to send Christmas cards already.

Meanwhile, "searching" becomes a favorite pastime for the more worldly of the younger generation. From past experience, they know that the season is almost here when new and strange boxes appear in the dark corners of closets and under unused furniture.

Such, then, are the signs of the beginning of the Christmas season. And though older folks shake their heads and sigh about the commercialization of the season, children everywhere agree that it is the most wonderful season of the year.

gives one an inkling as to why his firm stood pre-eminent in the overland freighting business out of Nebraska City and Leavenworth.

He was convinced of the superiority of oxen as freight animals. "Oxen proved to be the cheapest and most reliable teams for long trips, where they had to live upon the grass," he wrote.

"They did good daily work, bathed their own living, and properly driven would travel 2,000 miles in a season, or during the months from April to November, traveling from 1,000 to 1,200 miles with the loaded wagons, and with plenty of good grass and water, would make the return trip with the empty wagons in the same season."

Even more important was the skill and discipline of the teamsters. Unlike many freighters, Majors did not leave the management of the train solely to the discretion of the master. He drew up and had printed a set of "Rules and Regulations" for the conduct of a wagon train. They were distributed

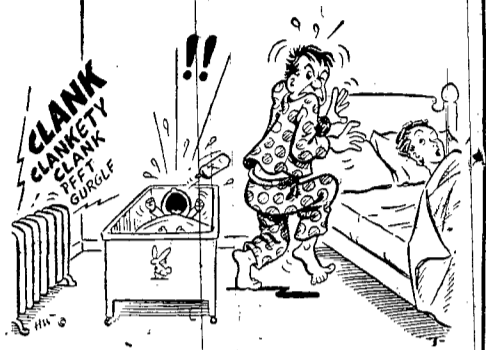
among the men and it was expected that they would be strictly observed. It was in these that he laid injunction against "kneading, gambling and intemperance."

The "Rules and Regulations" included everything from how to say "whoa" in the proper manner to the statement, "We expect you to observe the Sabbath, whenever an opportunity occurs to hear preaching, embrace it."

He gave each man in his employ a Bible and expected him to use it, if he could read.

Though some of the bullwhackers must have chafed under the rigid discipline, Majors was satisfied that his system produced the desired results. He records in his autobiography, for example, that his men could yoke six pairs of oxen and have them hitched to a wagon and ready to move in 16 minutes, a job that often took un-disciplined teamsters almost an hour.

A trip along U. S. Highway 6, one of Nebraska's great transcontinental highway connections and "the main line" for much South Pacific traffic into Omaha and Lincoln will give you an excellent opportunity to combine an inspection of modern Nebraska with a look at some of the state's interesting historic sites and a visit to some of its most important museums.

In Omaha, you'll be principally interested in viewing the wonders of Nebraska's first city, but you should also remember that historically the Omaha area is one of the west's most important. Here (at Winter Quarters, now the suburb Florence) the great Mormon migration began. Here (at Bellevue) was a center of early trans-Missouri fur trade and missionary activity, as well as Nebraska's first settlement. As you pass Omaha Central High School, driving west on Dodge street, you go by the site of Nebraska's second territorial capital. Remember, too, that no

trip to Omaha is complete without a visit to the Union Pacific Museum and the nationally famous Joslyn Memorial.

At Lincoln, your interest will focus on the beautiful state capitol. While in the building, spend some time in the State Historical Society's museum. You'll find it's like taking a course in Nebraska history and much more interesting. Be sure to have some time, too, for

Morrill Hall on the university campus.

As you approach Hastings, you'll see signs advertising the House of Yesterday. Be sure to heed them for if you don't, you'll miss Nebraska's finest municipal museum and for that matter, one of the west's finest.

West of Hastings, you'll see signs pointing to Kenesaw. A short side trip will take you there and to the grave of Susan Hale, one of the best known on the thousands of graves marking the final resting place of overland emigrants.

At Minden you can see the little museum of the Kearney County Historical Society and while you're so close, you'd better run up to Fort Kearney State Park, the site of old Fort Kearney, guardian of the overland trails.

You're now in "Swede country" — many of the earliest settlers in this region were Swedish immigrants. You're also in the Platte County area, and you'll see plenty of evidence of one Nebraska solution to the problem of the plains. For a look at one of the new Missouri River Basin dams, take a short side trip from Cambridge north to the Medicine Creek dam.

McCook, the trading center of southwest Nebraska, is nationally famous as the home of Senator George W. Norris. His home is on Main street, opposite the city park. You'll hit the historic Frenchman River at Culbertson, and you'll follow this stream, at varying distance to the Colorado line.
