Over 400 Attend Livestock Men's Annual Banquet

Don Cunningham told over 400 livestock feeders, their wives and others at the Wayne County Cornbelt Livestock Feeders banquet Tuesday night that he "believes in ceilings on every industry" if our economy needs such stabilization.

"I don't believe we'll complain if ceilings are put on all industries," he continued, "when the government takes a man from his home, family, job or business, puts a rifle in his hands and gives him \$75 a month" for serving our country.

Serving as toastmaster for the group's third annual banquet, Cunningham expressed optimism toward the livestock feeding business. He expected more meat to be consumed and at fair prices even if controls are put on the meat industry.

"I don't think ceilings will hurt any of us," he added, saying that the ceiling, if and when, would be high enough to be equitable. Cunningham, a former Wayne mayor, is secretary and traffic manager of the Sioux City Livestock exchange.

The Rev. A. VanBenschoten of Wayne Baptist church gave the invocation, and Marvin Dunklau, county association president, presented the welcome. Dunklau and Don Warner, secretary-treasurer of the group, conducted a short business session.

Special entertainment included songs and dances by a troupe from Lincoln headed by Fleeta Ziegenhein, organist-accompanist for a Lincoln radio station.

Banker Henry Loy of Wayne gave Lawrence Blackstrom, Wayne farmer, divided a \$33.50 cash prize for guessing a year ago the correct cattle price paid on the Sioux City market Tuesday. Each forecast \$35.25 at last year's banquet and hit the price on the nose.





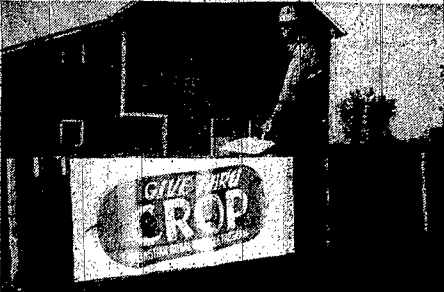

Institutions Get Building Levy Funds

Gov. Val Peterson's suggestion Tuesday that state institutions receiving funds under the L. I. mill building levy freeze public building "for the duration" affects the board of control, the University of Nebraska, the normal board and the military department.

The 1947 legislature provided the following split: Military, 1; control board, 43; normal schools, 35; U. of N., 40.

The University of Nebraska public relations department said the university's principal immediate projects are a \$300,000 meat laboratory and a \$200,000 research job on the dairy plant, both on the college of agriculture campus.

The university's share of the building levy revenue is about a million dollars a year. The money is committed as soon as it becomes available. Since the program became effective in 1947, about \$3 1/2 million has been spent by the university.

Albin Larson, secretary of the state normal board, said the governor's request would affect the half-million-dollar auditorium at Chadron State college, along with repair work at the other three colleges—Peru, Kearney and Wayne—which Larson estimated roughly at \$100,000.

Brig. Gen. Guy N. Henninger, adjutant general, said the military department's armory building plans have already been delayed while awaiting federal aid. The governor, said the military building "will have to wait."

Carl Botsford, board of control engineer, said the board has two "minor projects" under contract for spring construction which presumably would be halted. He also said the board also had planned to let the contract for a kitchen building at the Lincoln state hospital late this month.

When the legislature meets next month, the governor said, he would recommend that "it freeze all funds for public building in Nebraska immediately."

The governor was asked whether the freeze applied to highway construction.

"I deliberately left out highway," he said, "because they are pretty well frozen by the weather. He said he anticipated directions from the federal bureau of roads curtailing highway construction in the state.

The governor said, "I regret all this because I would a lot sooner see Nebraska money used to build new buildings in our state institutions than to see it go for preparation for a war which I don't have any choice in the matter."

Peterson stressed that he would "fight in the legislature" to retain the building levy and let the money accrue to meet the post-emergency situation.

The governor, who returned Tuesday from Chicago and Washington where he attended conferences on civil defense and testified before a congressional committee, said he had no "inside information" which prompted the "freeze" suggestion.

"Every man that I talked to in Washington is worried sick over the situation," he said. "And they all realize that war and peace is strictly in the hands of Joe Stalin."

Turning again to the state budget, Peterson said, "All activities, no matter how highly desirable, that expand the services of the government should be held in abeyance for the duration." If that suggestion is adopted by the legislature most seriously hurt would be the University of Nebraska, which has asked \$2,181,000 for expanded activities during the next two years.

"The most important budgetary consideration," the chief executive said, "is the constantly declining purchasing power of the dollar. So while I must do everything I can to pare the budget to the bone, I still must in fairness to everyone concerned, recognize that it is going to take more dollars to pay adequate salaries to employees."

Conservation's Defense Role Discussed at Recent Meeting

Lincoln Journal

The role of conservation in national defense, and research, education and progress in this field, were discussed at the opening meeting of the Association of Nebraska Soil Conservation Districts Tuesday morning, Dec. 5 in Lincoln.

Bernard Spittgerber and Albert Watson, directors of the Wayne county soil conservation district, attended this meeting. Watson is also treasurer of the state association.

Dr. G. E. Condra, president of the state soil conservation committee, welcomed the group of 100 conservationists to the two-day conference and Dean W. V. Lambert of the college of agriculture introduced the speakers.

The struggle in Korea and the increased national defense program is not a problem only for the fighting man but for agriculture as well. A. E. McClintock, regional director of the soil conservation service, told the conference. The soil conservation district is the "home front backbone" of any stepped-up farm production program he continued.

"It is part of the defense job to maintain soil resources and their productivity under the increasing pressure for the production of food and fiber."

District supervisors must take an active part in helping the people to appreciate the meaning and need for a complete conservation program, he added.

E. G. Jones, secretary of the soil conservation service, reported that "the rate of progress in the establishment of conservation is still on the upgrade."

This is true, he said, "both in the number of new co-operators who were aided during the past year and in the amount of conservation work accomplished by those already working with the districts."

The number of new co-operators of the last year was 4,500, about 250 more than the year before, Jones pointed out. This makes a total of 29,600 in the state.

About one-fifth—9,716,300 acres—of all the land in Nebraska has now been surveyed for conservation, he said.

One of the big developments of the past year has been the growth in watershed conservation interest, Jones continued. He cited the Washo-Salt Creek Watershed association and similar groups in the Blue and Nemaha watersheds as examples of this new impetus.

There is more willingness and interest for education in soil conservation work than in almost any other field. E. W. Janike, acting associate director of the University

of Nebraska agriculture extension service, told the conference.

He listed four problems where conservation education is needed: Landlord-tenant relationships. Conversion of farm management practices. Maintenance. Analysis of manpower and facilities available for conservation.

Dean Lambert, discussing the various phases of conservation research, stressed the importance of building soil fertility.

"Fertility is sometimes overlooked when we get concerned about holding the soil in place," he said. "But both are important and equally essential in a conservation program."

Research on farm problems requires the attention of several groups of specialists—engineers, agronomists, extension agents and so on, Dean Lambert said. Farmers must cooperate by putting the research programs in action.

Nebraska Agri. Price Index Down, Nation's Is Up

The Nebraska index of prices received by farmers dropped 3 points during the Oct. 15-Nov. 15 period—running contrary to the national index which went up 8 points.

The Nebraska Nov. 15 index was 297 per cent of the 1910-11 base period. But despite the gain in the national index it was still behind Nebraska at 276.

The state index showed most commodities were higher Nov. 15 than Oct. 15. The index of livestock and related products pulled the all commodity index down with a 6 point drop, largely due to lower hog prices. However, the livestock and

related products index at 327 was over a year ago. The average was 50 points over a year ago and well above the comparable national index.

Crop prices were generally stronger and this sent the state crop index up to 217, a gain of five cents. The gain was less than the national like mainly because Nebraska does not raise cotton, now at a record high.

The state index showed hogs down \$1.60 a hundredweight from Oct. 15 yet \$2.20 a hundredweight

over a year ago. The average was \$17.60. Cattle were firm at \$27 average while calves hit a record high of \$29.60, up 20 cents from Oct. 15. Sheep advanced \$1.40 a hundredweight to \$13.50. Lambs were up \$1.20 to \$27.40.

Wheat was up five cents a bushel at \$1.95 and corn was up three cents at \$1.31 average. Oats were up seven cents, barley four cents and rye eight cents from Oct. 15.

State's Corn Crop About 85 Percent In

About 85 percent of the Nebraska corn crop had been harvested by last weekend, the weekly crop report showed Tuesday.

This compared to 75 percent the preceding weekend, the state-federal division of agricultural statistics reported.

By districts, the amount of corn harvested ranges from 71 percent in the south central to 92 percent in the east central.

"An increasing number of counties in the northern portion of the state are reporting soft corn due to the frost and freeze in early October," the bulletin continued.

Sheridan county reported the quality of corn not good in the mirage flats, with some over 40 percent moisture and chaff.

Other northern counties reporting high moisture content were Cherry, Logan and Holt.

But Kearney county in the south also reported the high moisture content, since the corn there was late, due to excessive rains, and some was still immature when the early November frost occurred.

Some of the soft corn was reported selling for 80 cents a bushel. Considerable corn is being shelled and marketed. Feeders are taking a considerable quantity

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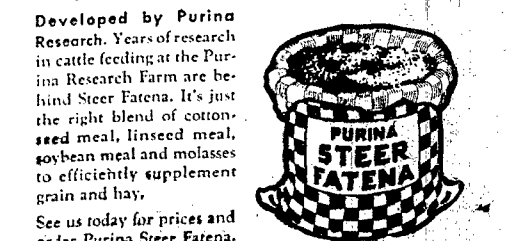
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Wildcats Meet Buena Vista Again Tonight

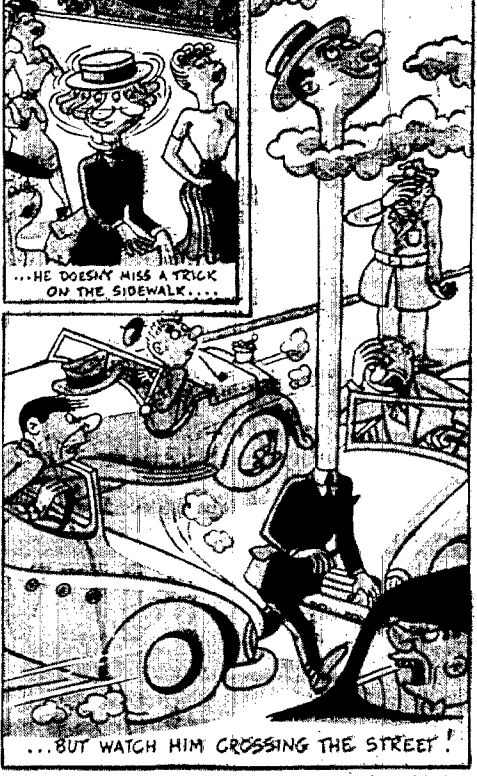

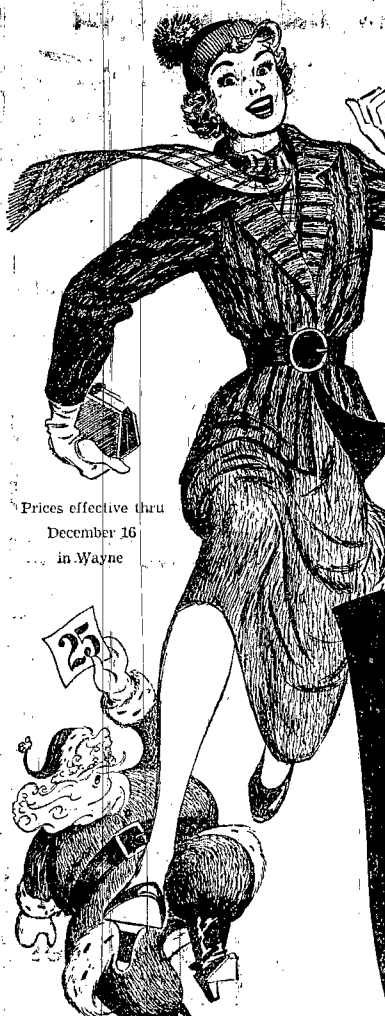


