Olson of Lyons led the visitors with 15 points while his teammate, Svendsen, collected nine. Four players did all the scoring for Lyons.

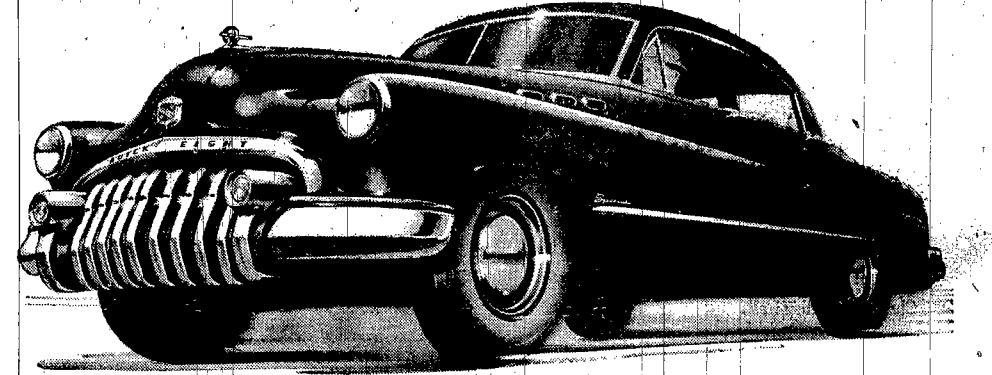
