Paper Supply Getting Tighter, More Expensive

The future is looking darker for the nation's newspaper readers and publishers, who are faced with tighter newsprint supplies and higher prices.

With paper consumption increasing faster than production, the price of newsprint has now doubled to hit a 30-year high.

The Herald has felt the pinch all fall due to curtailment of all shipments. Newsprint ordered last May for fall delivery is still only about three-fourths delivered.

Price increases to date appear not to be the end, according to reports from Canada, where U. S. publishers obtain 80 per cent of their newsprint.

Government demands also take a big slice from the nation's paper supply, and more so in time of expanding production and increased use for personnel in the armed forces.
