Cornhuskers Live Longer

If you are interested in living a longer life—and who isn't—you should live in Nehraska, according to a New York authority, who says the Cornhusker state leads the nation in longevity.

He is Dr. Charles E. Dutchess, medical director of a noted New York laboratory and an authority on geriatrics, the science of sging.

Dutchess reports that the life and a second

director of a noted New York laboratory and an authority on geriatrics, the science of aging.

Dutchess reports that the life span of Nebraska residents, based on latest government and insurance company figures, has lengthened by seven years since 1930 and now ranks No. 1 in the United States.

A girl born in the state today, he says, has a life expectancy of 74—three years minger than the average for the country's female population, and a baby boy in Nebraska now can expect to live to nearly 70—about four years above the national average for males. (Further encouragement for 1951's first baby).

Increase in longevity of state residents, Dutchess adds, has occurred since 1930 when Nebraska ranked fourth in the nation on male expectancy and sixth on longevity of its female population.

He believes healthy and active Americans of 85 years of age and over will be a common sight during the next generation. A possible factor in longen life is the report that the sum shines longer in Nebraska during the summer than it does in the 'sunshine state' of Florida, according to a study just completed.

The study, based on United States weather bureau records for the last 50 years, shows Nebraskans can expect about 300 to 325 hours of sunshine in June, compared with 275 for Florida. During the winter months, however, Nebraska should get 150 to 175 hours in December and January, while Florida can expect 200 to 225 hours of sunshine.

Tipping the Scales

Our country is confronted with a struggle for survival against an enemy that has shown it can draw on the unlimited reserves of the manpower of Asia. Factors that can help mightly to tip the scales in our favor will be superior technical ability and productive efficiency. These must be our conservers of manpower. No longer can we afford promiscuous political crusades against our most efficient industries. No longer can we afford to condemn bigness in itself. Well managed bigness operating competitively is national necessity.

In one field alone, retailing, the manpower situation promises to be critical although mass distribution is a modern miracle of efficiency. We would be facing a worse manpower shortage now if the political attacks of a few years ago on chain stores had succeeded in stifling the labor-saving innovations they introduced, such as self service. Moreover, it has now proved beyond a deubt that neither chains nor any other system of merchandising can exert a monopolistic influence. To cite an example, there are 80,000 more individual grocers in business today than there were 10 years ago—and about 275 more food chains. In other words, competition has grown steadily more intense. What is true here is also true in the other fields of retailing. It is true in manufacturing and related lines.

One thing we often overlook is that the small business has its special advantages in attracting and holding its customers— personal contacts, special services and oth-or factors. The smaller concern is often able to avoid overlead and operating costs which are a necessary part of larger opera-tions.
