When interviewed by The Herald, the tiny newcooner had no comment but was obviously proud of her accomplishment. She was born with a full head of black hair and active lungs.

Last year, Constance Dale, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Dale of Wayne, was the "first baby" contest winner. The six-pound, 14-inch girl was born just two minutes after midnight at Bentch hospital in Wayne.

Concord Woman's Husband Missing in Korean Action

Concord—First Lt. Joseph V. Manto, commanding "E Co.", 9th Infantry, of the Second Division, is reported missing in action in Korea since Nov. 28, according to a telegram received Dec. 27 by his wife, Irene Manto of Concord.

Lt. Manto, with his company, was spearheading the drive for the Second Division in northwest Korea when the overwhelming Chinese break-through came in the latter part of November. His last letter to his wife, dated Nov. 28, described the action as "nightmarish".

Bronze Star, Purple Heart Lt. Manto sailed with the Second Division on July 19 from Tacoma, Wash., and landed at Pusan, Korea, on July 31. On Aug. 9, at the Pusan perimeter, a shell exploded five feet from him and miraculously he suffered only concussion. On Aug. 29, fighting on the Nakdong River front, he was decorated with the Bronze Star medal for heroic achievement in action. On Sept. 14, he received shrapnel wounds in his back for which he was awarded the Purple Heart medal.

Married One Year Lt. Manto of Long Island, N. Y., and his wife, the former Irene Salmon of Concord, had been residing near Tacoma, Wash., following their marriage in January, 1950. He has been residing since the latter part of July with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Salmon of Concord.

National Shorthorn Show Added to 1951 Ak-Sar-Ben

Omaha—Another of the major breeding live stock shows of the nation has been awarded to Ak-Sar-Ben and will be staged as one of the big events on the organization's 1951 calendar, according to Harry B. Coffey, livestock show committee chairman.

The new event is the National Shorthorn show, which, together with the National Polled Shorthorn show, will be held in conjunction with the annual Ak-Sar-Ben Livestock show and World-Championship Rodeo, Sept. 28 through Oct. 7.

Mr. Coffey said Ak-Sar-Ben has offered to match the Shorthorn associations in putting up a prize fund totaling \$20,000. This is one of the largest premium funds offered at any similar event in the country.

4-H Show

The annual Ak-Sar-Ben 4-H Fat Stock show will be held at the same time, so the young exhibitors may derive the educational advantage of seeing some of the country's top breeding cattle on display while they are in Omaha.

To properly house the expanded show, Mr. Coffey said the Board of Governors at Ak-Sar-Ben has authorized and work has been in progress for some time on an addition which will increase by one-fourth the capacity of the new livestock exhibit building.

This addition, costing nearly \$200,000, was approved immediately after last year's National Angus show, when it was found that the present million-dollar structure, in use only two years, could not accommodate all of the exhibitors who desired to participate.

It is Ak-Sar-Ben's intention to invite the American Hereford association to have their national show at Omaha in 1952, after which the organization plans to stage an all breed show in 1953 and thereafter, Coffey said.

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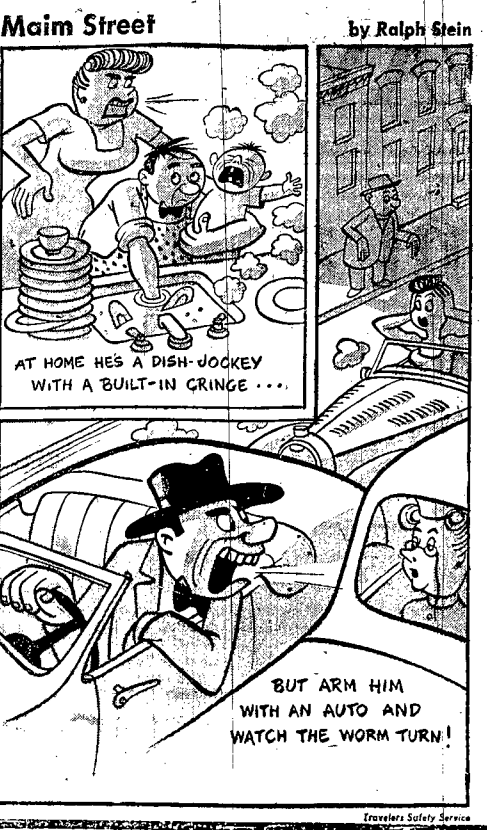
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OBITUARY

Prizes of \$600 For State-wide Essay Contest

A statewide essay contest with total prize money of almost \$600 is being sponsored by the woman's auxiliary of the Nebraska State Medical association. Competition is open to all 11th and 12th grade students, except sons and daughters of physicians, in any of the state's high schools.

Essays must not be over 1,500 words written on the topic, "Medicine's Role in Preserving the American Life."

Dr. Charles Sheets of Cozad, association president, said this is the first year for such a contest but the association plans to continue it in future years.

Each of the association's 12 council districts will receive a \$25 bond for first prize, \$10 cash for second prize and a certificate of honorable mention for third place.

Winner of the state contest, whose paper will be selected from the 12 district winners, will receive a \$100 bond plus an expense-paid trip to the association's 1951 annual meeting at Omaha in May. Second and third-place winners will receive \$50 and \$21 bonds, respectively.

All entries in the district races must be submitted to the judges by March 15, 1951.

Packets will be sent to every high school in the state, according to the chairman.

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OUT OF OLD NEBRASKA

by JAMES C. OLSON, Superintendent STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The statement that "the historical records of tomorrow" is borne out by the value of many of the old guide books to the west, issued to facilitate the westward movement of the American people. One of many such books in the State Historical Society's library is Edward H. Hall's, "The Great West: Railroad, Steamboat, and Stage Guide and Hand-Book for Travelers, Miners and Emigrants to the Western, Northwestern and Pacific States and Territories," published in New York in 1866.

"For those going across the plains, Hall recommended Atchison, Nebraska City and Omaha as starting places. From Nebraska City the traveler would find "a new tri-weekly line of excellent stages running to Fort Kearney, making the trip in 40 hours. Fare \$15. The time and fare from Omaha to Fort Kearney were the same as from Nebraska City."

"At Fort Kearney," the Guide warned, "the emigrant bids adieu to civilization, and thence onward must rely upon his own resources, striking out boldly for new regions." He might take passage on one of Ben Holladay's stages, however, which would put him in Salt Lake City in nine days.

Regarding Nebraska as a potential home for emigrants, Mr. Hall was quite optimistic. He wrote: "Considering its recent settlement, Nebraska is a cheap place to live. Almost every article of consumption being abundant. Pork sells at 5 cents per pound; flour, \$2.50 to \$3 per cwt.; eggs, 8 to 10 cents per dozen; chickens, \$2 per dozen; and other articles in like proportion."

The prospects for employment were also bright. He noted that "in great demand and readily commands high rates. Farm hands find ready employment at \$18 to \$25 per month, with board. Carpenters, blacksmiths, bricklayers and mechanics generally make from \$2 to \$3 per day."

Land was fertile and easily available, under the Homestead law or by purchase. "As a general rule," Hall wrote, "farms can be bought at less than the cost of improvements, owing to the constant em-

Railroaders Have Sign Language of Their Own

EVERY little motion has a meaning of its own on the railroad—the wave of an arm by the station agent or a sectionman along the crew of passing trains usually means something more than a casual greeting.

If something were wrong with the train, a hot-box, for instance, the agent or sectionman would signal the train to stop by raising his arm back and forth across his knees at right angles to the track.

The raised-arm signal, known to the railway fraternity as the "high ball," is one of a number of hand signals which are in daily use on the Canadian, National Railways and other North American railroads.

Frequently, the signals are given at a considerable distance from the locomotive and to increase visibility in poor weather, the sectionman or crew member usually carries a lantern when at work. Here are some of the signals most commonly used, and what they mean.

When a train is required to take on an extra car, it backs up toward the car until the coupler at the end of the train and on the required car have been joined. To signal the engineer to back the train, the trainman swings his flag or lantern in a circle at head-on length as shown in illustration 1.

As the end of the train nears the car, the trainman signals the engineer to slow down in order that the couplers may be joined with a minimum of shocks. To give this signal, he holds out his hand with flag or lantern as shown in illustration 2.

Before a train goes out on a run, the brakes along the entire length of it must be inspected. The trainman doing the job is at the rear of the train when he begins his inspection, he signals the engineer to apply the air brakes, in manner of figure 5, by waving his hand horizontally above his head. Then he walks the length of the train checking each wheel to see if the brake shoes have a firm grip of the tire in each case.

When he reaches the head end, he signals for the release of the brakes. This he may do verbally

1-Back Up 2-Slow

To bring the train to a halt at the couplers joint, the trainman gives the engineer the "stop" signal by waving his lantern or flag back and forth across his knees in a pattern as shown in illustration 3.

If operations require the train to move forward following the coupling job, the trainman will signal the engineer to proceed by raising and lowering his arm in a waving motion as shown in illustration 4.

5-Apply Brakes 6-Release Brakes

or by holding his hand above his head and returning the length of the train to check that the shoes on each wheel have been released. If he begins his inspection from the head end of the train he will give the signals in reverse order.

Hand signals are an essential part of train operations and contribute greatly to the safety of the traveler and efficient operation of Canadian National Railways and other trains.

'United Foreign Policy Vital to the United States'

Young GOP Leader Back From Europe

Ernest Strate, jr., of Hoskins, Neb., returned from a personal tour of Europe, Tuesday said the only hope for the formation and continuation of an intelligent foreign policy on the part of the United States is for the American people to get the committees of the new congress to work on the problems facing American political and economic action through the world.

Strate, who is chairman of the Nebraska Young Republican organization, spoke to the Norfolk Junior chamber of commerce at their regular luncheon Tuesday.

Among the problems that Strate outlined in his informal talk were:

1. Lack of business acumen among the American aid-fund administrators.
2. Lack of red tape methods among the administrators.
3. No unified foreign policy to act as a guide.
4. The fact that aid funds, in England particularly, seem to be making the rich people richer and the poor people more destitute.

Traveling nearly 23,000 miles in 23 days, Strate through most of the countries in Europe, including Greece. He returned to Norfolk early Saturday morning.

In discussing the possibility of war in Europe, Strate said Russia has enough armor to overrun Europe to the English channel within two weeks, but he doubted that Russia would attack within two years.

He believes there is little hope of avoiding an eventual conflict. "The one bright spot in the whole defensive system of western Europe," he said, "is the Swiss Army. It's the only army that is strictly volunteer, the only army that is self-sustaining and the only army that has developed without the aid of American loans and grants."

End of 'Nicies'

Strate said he thought the time for "niceties" has come to an end. He favored strengthening of all European armies, the formation of a German army, economic aid to Spain and the molding of a 35 million man army from Norway to Iran. Also that the new army be staffed and run entirely by Americans.

The Americans also should commandeer all the resources of the entire world in the fight to contain communism and each continent and each nation be required to pay its just share of the cost. Also that new super weapons be kept and put to use only by United States forces.

The information gathered on his trip will be presented to the committees of the new congress which will meet in January.

FHA Loans Available Now for Enlarging or Improving Farms

Farmers who want to enlarge or improve their farms to family-type farms may now secure farm-enlargement or farm-development loans from the Farmers Home Administration, according to Wayne county supervisor Russell A. Dills.

Mr. Dills explained that an efficient family-type unit is a farm which furnishes the most employment for an average farm family and which produces well. It is a farm which an average farm family can operate successfully without employing outside help, except possibly during season peak-load periods.

To Enlarge Farm

Farm-enlargement loans will be made to qualified farmers who own farms which are definitely too small to be classed as family-type farms. The loans will enable the farmers to buy additional land, and to repair and improve the enlarged farms.

Farm Development

Farm-development loans will also be made to qualified farmers who own farms large enough to be family-type farms, but which need improvement to definitely produce enough income for the farm family. The purpose of this type of loan is to repair and improve family-size farms.

Existing debts will be refinanced with both enlargement and improvement loan funds, so that there will be only the first mortgage securing the FHA loan. Refinancing in connection with either farm-enlargement or farm-development loans must not be the chief purpose of the loan, however.

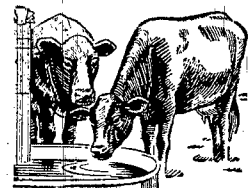

The eyes of state and nation were on Lincoln 14 years ago this January 5th as Nebraska's first unicameral legislature began its work. It was called into being by a constitutional amendment approved by the voters in 1931, and its 43 members had been elected on November 15th in the general election of 1930.

Long before the session opened, corridors in the capitol as well as the chamber's galleries were thronged with visitors. Among the most interested of those visitors was Senator George W. Norris, who in this first session of the unicameral was witnessing the realization of a long-cherished dream.

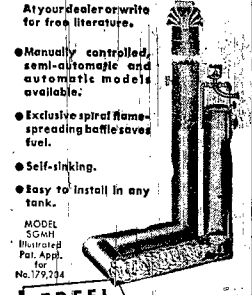
"The Nebraska unicameral, incidentally, was not the only Norris dream coming true during that January of 1931," in Washington on the 20th he would witness the inauguration of the first President under the Norris amendment to the constitution abolishing the "lame duck" sessions of Congress.

Called upon to address the legislature, Senator Norris reminded its members that the eyes of the nation as well as the state would be upon their work in this initial session. He bluntly told them: "We expect an economical and efficient



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35 Carloads of Foodstuff

CROP Contribution From Nebraska

Thirty-five carloads of bulk foodstuff, with a cash equivalent of approximately \$70,000 have been reported as contributed to the 1950 Christian Rural Overseas Program drive in Nebraska, according to word from state CROP director Martin Frantz.

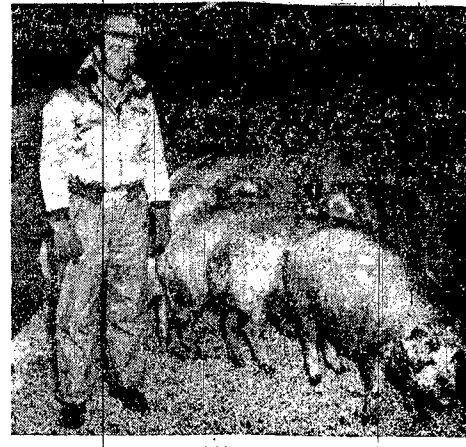
In making the report Dec. 31, Frantz emphasized that the figure was "by no means final." Even though the CROP campaign ended in most Nebraska counties on that date, very few of these counties had been able to submit complete reports.

Frantz estimated that the total collection figure for the Cornhusker state would rise to about 50 carloads of bulk foodstuff, with a cash value of \$100,000.

Incomplete and unofficial figures show that Gage county in south-eastern Nebraska leads all counties with a contribution totaling \$6,300. Those counties trail in order, according to Dec. 31 statistics: Hamilton, \$4580; York, \$2235; Thayer, \$2000; Platte, \$2087; Buffalo, \$2053; and Hall, \$2470.

Frantz said that final figures on the 1950 CROP drive will be available later on, by which time all counties will have reported to the state office in Lincoln.

Those 'Christmas Gift' House Plants

If you are among those who received a house plant or two as a Christmas gift, no doubt your primary concern is to keep those plants growing as they should. With that in mind, here are a few suggestions for the best care of just a few of the more popular ones.

No matter what the plant, proper feeding is extremely important for finest growth. Complete plant food in tablet form is available and certainly the most convenient way to see that your house plants get the vital nutrients they need from soil to be healthy and full-blooming. Plants should be fed at the rate of two tablets for a six-inch pot. For plants in 10-inch pots use four tablets. Vary the number of tablets proportionately for plants in larger

Cyclamen ideal temperature for it is between 40 and 50 degrees Fahrenheit and, while this is a temperature hard to find in your home, the closer you can approach it, the better. In watering the cyclamen, water should not touch the central growth. It is best to set the pot in a pan of water so that moisture can be absorbed from the bottom of the pot. If the water in the pan is halfway up to the pot and the soil is moderately dry, allow the plant to soak 10 to 15 minutes and then stand it in the sink to drain off surplus moisture.

Hydrangea requires plenty of water when blooming. It should be kept as cool as possible and out of drafts. If the soil dries out, it will wilt down immediately. Water daily by setting it in a large pan of water until the soil is thoroughly soaked.

Azaleas flowers last longer under cool conditions. Place in a good

light and give plenty of water. Do not allow soil to dry out. Bloom should last from two to three weeks. Do not place in direct sunshine. Remove faded flowers.

Primulas require constant moisture. Need a cool, humid atmosphere for best development. Water by setting pot in a tub. If watered from above and care is not used to keep moisture from crown, rot may set in. Also, do not allow water to fall on leaves of this plant. Keep in a moderate temperature, give good light, feed with complete plant food about every four weeks. Keep the old blooms picked off, and the plant will bloom all through the spring season.

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On Public Cooperation

This display of public cooperation was extremely gratifying to the men who fight the fires. May it set the pattern for future situations when lives and property dollars are at stake.

The Good Life

For the first time since the American Revolution, with the exception of the War Between the States, the people of our country are faced with a stark test of faith. The conflict with world communism now is not to save the world for democracy, but to repel an enemy who is determined to destroy in our own land the Christian ideal of human dignity and individual liberty and the political system which upholds that ideal.

As a nation, we came through World War II with little discomfort, although we suffered many personal tragedies. Living standards have risen to record levels. So has the public debt which is exacting its toll in depreciating money. However, it is evident that devalued dollars have not yet cramped our style.

In retrospect, after nearly two centuries of freedom and the boundless progress that only freedom could have achieved, it would be a wonder if we were not confused when suddenly confronted with the prospect of a fight for actual survival. But the time when we can afford confusion has nearly run out.

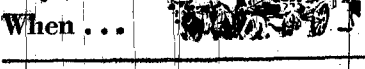
This is the ruthless concept, backed by vast military force, which is confronting America and the world. To meet it we will need more than arms and men. We will have to lay our rights on primary objectives and keep them there.

In a word, it is time we again understood what this country really stands for. John Dos Passos, the distinguished American author, has said, "This country was not founded to furnish glamorous offices for politicians, or to produce goods and services, or handouts of easy money. This country was founded to make men free."

We face a two-faceted task. We must fight with all we have against our enemies outside. And, while we are undergoing all the sacrifices and trials that may involve, we must keep our people free.

We Americans have come to a climactic phase in the history of the good life. It is our duty to hold together for future generations the framework of freedom which made that good life possible.
