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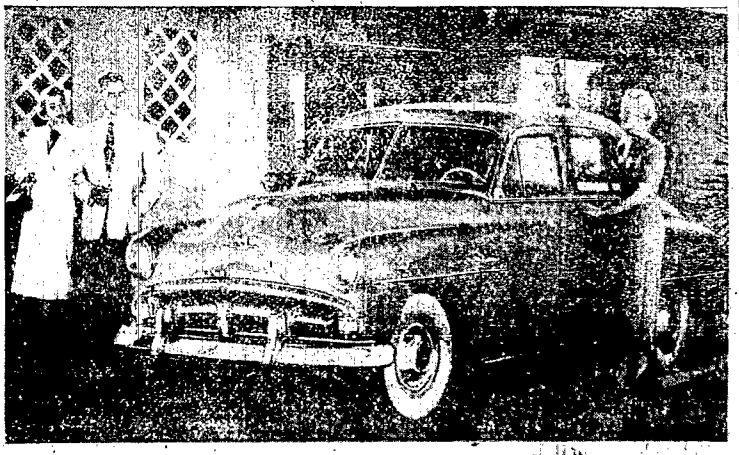

This corporation is organized for the purpose of transacting business in any state in the United States and to hold and own therein any and all kinds of property which by their laws do not prohibit the owning and holding of property and the transacting of business within their limit by a corporation created and organized by and under the laws of the State of Nebraska.

5. The authorized capital stock of said corporation shall be \$175,000 divided into 175 shares of \$1,000 each, all of which capital stock must be taken, issued and fully paid up before the commencement of business by said corporation.

The stock of said corporation may be paid for either in money or by transfer and conveyance to said corporation of property by valuation approved by the board of directors.

6. The existence of this corporation shall commence on the 1st day of January, 1951, and the corporation shall have perpetual existence.

7. The business of said corporation shall be conducted and managed by a board of five directors to be elected by the stockholders and to hold their offices for one year by January, 1951, and their election shall have perpetual existence.

8. The officers of said corporation shall be a president, vice-president, and secretary and treasurer. The president shall be elected and qualified in such manner as shall be prescribed by the by-laws of the corporation. Until other directors are elected by the stockholders, Edward Seymour, Elizabeth Seymour, Lyle E. Seymour, Marian Petersen and Melvin E. Seymour shall constitute such board of directors.

9. Until the officers of said corporation are elected and qualified as above provided, the following named persons shall constitute the officers of said corporation: Edward Seymour shall be president, Lyle E. Seymour shall be vice-president, and Elizabeth Seymour shall be secretary and treasurer.

10. The manner of holding meetings of stockholders for the purpose of electing officers and the method of conducting the business of the corporation shall be as prescribed by the by-laws thereof.
