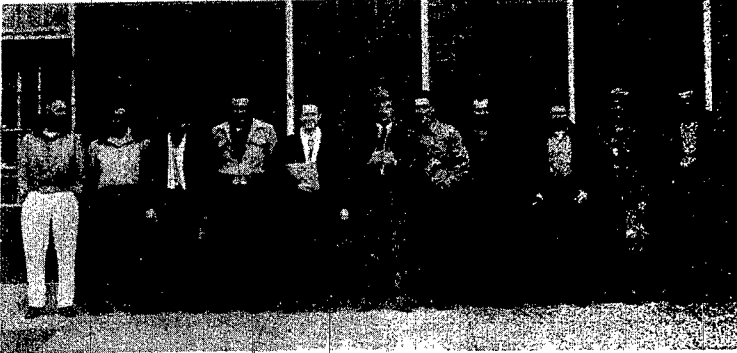

Improvement of State Libraries Is Aim of Legislative Committee

Coach Jack Wink of Wayne State received orders Monday to report for military duty Feb. 25. He is a first lieutenant in the Marine Corps reserve, and is to report at Camp Pendleton, Ocean-side, Calif.

The college has immediately made a request for Wink's deferment until the end of this semester because of his coaching duties.

Wink is in his second year as football coach and athletic staff member at Wayne State college here. He has completed two successful football seasons. Would Set Up State Control

Wayne city council Tuesday night agreed to send telegrams to each of eight state legislative committees now considering a bill affecting water pollution. The messages will oppose LB-94 before the legislative committee which would set up a board of five members to "control, prevent and abate pollution of surface and underground waters of the state."

The bill, if passed, would give the board power to enforce construction of sewage disposal plants. The council decided that building and maintaining such a plant would be too expensive for the city at this time.

Action came after a letter opposing LB-94 was read to the council. The letter, written by C. E. Beals, secretary of the Nebraska League of Municipalities, called the bill "vicious."

Accept Lease Bid

The city's governing body also accepted a \$400 bid by Dale Meyer, Wayne, for a one-year lease of the pasture east of the airport. The pasture has been leased by Virgil Kartell.

An application of J. H. Morrison for a retail liquor and beer license was approved by the council.

Lyle Pierson's application for an and off sale beer license was also approved at the meeting.

Price Freeze May Affect Farmers

Farmers may be affected by the current price freeze in spite of the fact that live animals are exempt by the order. The farmer can sell his livestock for as much as he can get but the butcher and packer are under control and limited as to what they can pay. Thus the farmer will feel an indirect effect of the order.

Farm products are exempt from price controls unless they have reached parity or the highest price paid during the period of May 24 to June 24, 1950, whichever is higher.

Many farm products are now selling under parity and are not affected by the freeze. Fresh fruits and vegetables were exempted from control, as also are all seeds.

There may be a raise in parity level on livestock and livestock products since the overall price level has been rising rapidly.

Safety Patrol Arrests 14,500 During 1950

Arrests for 14,500 driving offenses which definitely endangered human lives were made by the Nebraska Safety Patrol during 1950. Spending constituted the greatest offense with 5,130 arrests during the year. According to the patrol's annual report, drunken driving accounted for 773 arrests. There were 1,665 stop sign offenders, and 841 motorists were arrested for reckless driving.

The patrol contacted 85,300 motorists on Nebraska roads last year. This was a 40% increase over the number of drivers stopped in 1949.

During the year the patrol assisted 248 stranded motorists. Civil and school groups were presented 1,845 safety programs by the patrol.

In the year's activity, the patrol traveled a total of 3,752,727 miles.

HARBOUR THRILLS WAYNE AUDIENCE

The Wayne Community Concerts Association presented Dennis Harbour, Metropolitan Bass Baritone, in recital Thursday evening. A sizable local audience was afforded a rare opportunity for an evening of fine music, superbly performed.

Mr. Harbour revealed a voice of depth and quality which was positively thrilling at times and handled with the instinct of the true artist throughout.

The concert, entirely conventional in content, opened with a group song in French and English from the works of the classic composers. These numbers were handled with that restraint and dignity so characteristic of the musical literature of that period. Breath control and excellent diction were particularly outstanding in their rendition. The balance of the program was selected from among the works of the Romantics followed by representative works chosen from among contemporary composers.

The high point of the evening was perhaps reached with the rendition of the aria "L'air de l'opéra" from "Faust" by Gounod. In this number the performer revealed his capability in handling difficult operatic roles as well as his skill in showmanship.

Mr. Harbour was ably assisted by his accompanist, Raymond Sachse who presented a group of piano solos from the works of Beethoven, Chopin, Liszt and Schubert.

The final number on the current series will feature violinist Ricardo Odoposoff on April 8 at 3 p.m.

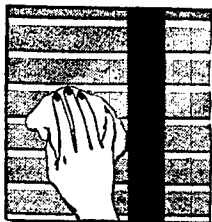

United Nations

The endless debate and indecision going on in the United Nations discourage most of us, and condemnation for the world organization is coming from many sources.

At a time when the United States is demanding that Communist China be branded an aggressor, the UN halls are filled with advocates of appeasement. Its effectiveness as an organization to solve the world's problems seems to be losing strength, and some advisers suggest that the United States by-pass the UN in dealing with the Chinese situation. It is tempting to support this idea in view of the immediate need for constructive action.

By-passing the UN now, however, will mean an end to the organization's influence regarding international decisions. In a sense, the UN is fighting for its own life as well as for answers to world problems. If United States support is taken away, the UN might well cease to exist as a world organization.

In a world that is growing steadily smaller, the need for a community of nations is critical. The UN is faced with the task of bringing many diverse nations into a harmonious group that will work constructively for world peace. Certain obstructionists within the UN can make the organization appear undesirable. But the UN itself is an instrument for the settlement of international differences, whether it is effective at this time or not, and as such it should be preserved.

It is worth remembering that our country in its early beginnings faced the problem of organizing many autonomous-minded states into a union which depended upon a united effort for survival.

How It Works

What can only be described as the "dam craze" has been rampant in America for many years. It is characterized by campaigns to put some sort of a dam across practically every bit of running water in the country. This is almost always justified on the grounds that the dams are necessary to soil conservation, reclamation, or some other worthy purpose.

Actually, in a great many cases, the prime objective of these schemes is the creation of new federal power projects, unregulated, untaxed and publicly subsidized, whose cost is far out of proportion to any present or potential value, and which simply advance the march of state socialism.

Naturally the eager socialists within the government support the "dam craze" with a passionate devotion. After all, their motives are ideological—to transform America into a socialist state based pretty much on the British pattern. However, strange as it may seem, perfectly good citizens, who assert their opposition to socialism and the destruction of the free enterprise system, unconsciously promote the aims of the socialists—out of the hope of personal gain.

The way it works is well expressed by Frank Motz, a Hays, Kan., editor, who questions a multi-billion dollar dam being built near his town—tells how dams, or any other kind of government projects, for that matter, get started with the typical Chamber of Commerce:

"The bureaucrats come," he says, "and head straight for the chamber."
"Look," they say, "we're ready to drop a million-dollar payroll in this community, but it's nothing to what we'll spend after we get going." So the chamber goes down Main street, whipping the businessmen into line.

"Pretty soon the merchants wire their congressmen to get back of this project. The congressmen in turn prod the bureaucrats to move faster or expand the project. Before we know it, the people have become the lobby of the government."
The moral is plain: the people unwittingly promote socialism. And only the people can prevent socialism.

"Nothing was ever achieved without enthusiasm."—Emerson.
