

At a time when the United States is demanding that Communist China be branded an aggressor, the UN halls are filled with advocates of appeasement. Its effectiveness as an organization to solve the world's problems seems to be losing strength, and some advisers suggest that the United States by-pass the UN in dealing with the Chinese situation. It is tempting to support this idea in view of the immediate near an end to the organization's influence regarding international decisions. In a sense, the UN is fighting for its own life as well as for answers to world problems, if United States support is taken away, the UN might well cease to exist as a world organization.

In a world that is growing steadily smaller, the need for a community of nations is critical. The UN is faced with the task of bringing many diverse nations into a harmonious group that will work constructively for world peace. Certain obstructionists within the UN can make the organization appear undesirable. But the UN itself is an instrument for the settlement of international differences, whether it is effective at this time or not, and as such it should be preserved.
