## OBITUARY

### Charles Edwin Denesia

Charles Edwin Denesia, born August 14, 1878, died Feb. 9, 1951, age 72 years, five months and 23 days. He was born on a farm near Creston, Neb., and lived there until 1900. He then moved with his parents to West Point. In 1909 they moved to a farm located seven miles west of Wayne. There he grew to manhood.

On June 8, 1916 he was married to Clara Helen Heyer at St. Mary's Catholic church at Wayne. He farmed for one year on a farm northeast of Wayne, then moved to a farm northeast of Carroll.

In 1928 he quit farming and went to Colorado for the benefit of his health. He came back in 1929 and farmed until 1937.

He moved to Wayne in January 1938 and purchased the Electric Shoe Shop. This business he operated until August 1950.

### Ola P. Lundstrom

Ola P. Lundstrom was born in Uggurup, Kopings, Sweden June 29, 1852. He was baptized in the Lutheran faith. In 1879 he married Karna Jonson in Sweden. To this union were born two daughters, Sigrid (Mrs. Carl Johnson, who passed away in 1946, and Hil-da.

He and his family immigrated to this country in 1879, where he settled for a few years in Red Oak, Ia. In 1888, Mr. Lundstrom moved to his farm east of Concord, residing there until he retired in 1910.

Mrs. Lundstrom preceded her husband in death in 1937.

He was the oldest living member of Concordia Lutheran church.

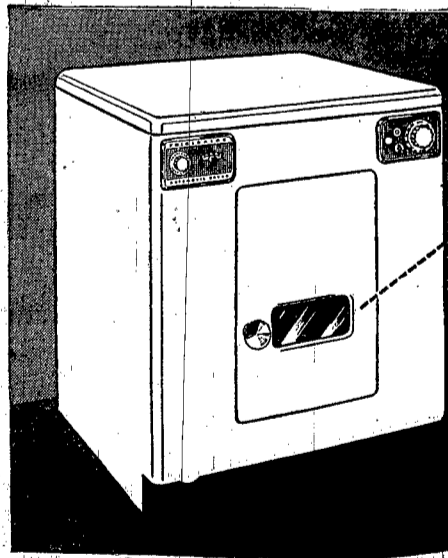

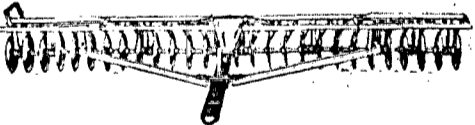

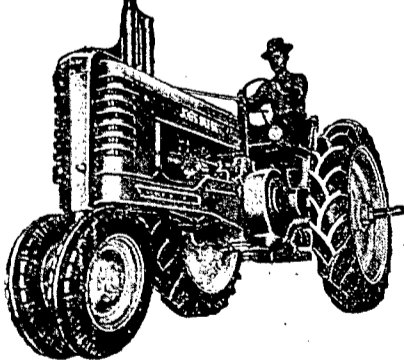

# AS ONE FARMER ... TO ANOTHER

## Get Set Now For The Rush Season!

You'll Sleep Better Next Spring If You Put Your Machinery In Shape In February. A Few Hours Now May Save Days When The Big Push Is On



### "Fix It In February"

That might well be the slogan tacked up in every farm shop throughout the land.

It's a good enough idea any year, but in 1951 it's better than just good. This spring and summer—when you're going to do a high-pressure job of farming again, and when you'll have fewer sons and hired men around to help—it's going to be a mighty sweet feeling to have the equipment start out right—and keep going until you've finished.

Now, if you haven't done it already, is the time to check every implement over, and get your tractor, car, and truck in tip-top shape.

Why? Because:

**You've got more time now.**

**Repair men have more time now.**

**Your equipment has more time.**

One Minnesota farmer figures that it costs

him \$25 an hour to stop and fix equipment during the rush season. And there's nothing more exasperating.

All of this is going to dawn on a lot of people along about March 1. The first warm day they're going to go out, sniff the air, and say: "Guess I'd better run the tractor in to town for an overhaul."

When they get there they're going to find a dozen other fellows lined up ahead of them. And the service shop man (who's probably just lost a mechanic or two to the armed services or a defense industry) will be just about "nuts" trying to handle the work.

So better let the people who repair your equipment know right now what you need in the way of parts and work. This being laid up for parts doesn't hurt nearly as much now as it will in March or April.

Already, there are reports of slow deliveries on parts. So it's a good idea to stock up on what you need. Don't over-do, of course. It's one thing to be prepared, and another thing to hoard parts that your neighbor needs worse than you do.

There will probably be less new equipment this year, too. If you're going to need any, get your order in quick.

This is also the best time of year to talk trade-ins. If your dealer gets your old tractor or implement into his shop now, he'll have time to work it over and sell it this spring. He'll give you less for it later on, because he'll probably have to carry over the trade-in until next fall or spring.

So get set now! Go out in the machine shed while you think of it, and look over your equipment. Study the check list below.

### Reminders . . . So Break-Downs Won't Sneak Up On You

**DISK HARROWS.** A good job of disking makes plowing and seeding easier; kills crop pests, too. Sharpen blades if they've lost their edge. Clean out the bearings and replace any missing or broken scrapers.

**PLOWS.** Dull, worn shares take extra power, extra gas. Get them sharpened, and order an extra set so that you won't be caught short later on. Rolling coulters that are dull or worn too small can't cut trash—they cause clogging.

Check the furrow, land, and tail wheels for loose bearings and worn collars. If your plow has a mechanical lift, look over the springs and moving parts in the clutch. On hydraulically-controlled plows, check gaskets, pump diaphragms, and hoses for leaks.

**DRILLS and PLANTERS.** Pet and pamper these precision machines. They're built to do an accurate job, but a loose bushing or a worn clutch will throw them off considerably.

On your grain drill, look for such things as weak furrow opener springs. When these "helper" springs don't have enough tension, the opener jumps the high spots and skips the low places. Put the fertilizer attachment in shape to do an accurate job, too.

Don't guess about your planter. Jack up the wheels, put seed in the hoppers, and test to make sure it drops accurately and adjusts for the right depth. Hunt for cracked castings, bent braces, and worn "shoes."

**HAY-MAKING MACHINERY.** A break-down can ruin a cutting. If you don't have

room in the shed for the mower, at least remove the cutter bar and store it inside. It will be easier to work on, too. Replace guard plates if notched edges are worn smooth. Keep extra guards, knife clips, sickle sections, and pitman bushings on hand.

Give the rake a going over. Remember that your forage chopper is going to be a year older this summer. Bear in mind that such things as chopper knives are made from special steel—the kind that's going to be increasingly hard to get.

It's foolish to let your baler die of a broken part just when you need it most. Make sure the tying mechanism is working properly.

**MANURE SPREADERS.** No vacation for this implement—it's always on the go.

Your spreader will unload easier and spread more evenly if you load from front to rear.

Broken or missing teeth make the beaters run in jerks. Turning around with the spreader in gear also puts terrific pressure on chains and sprockets.

**CULTIVATORS.** Weeds won't wait for you to order new shovels and get old ones sharpened. Now is also the time to check closely for sprung beams. Fix the lift if it's slow or jerky.

If shanks are equipped with safety springs, make sure they're loose enough to "kick off" when you hit something.

**HARVESTING EQUIPMENT.** Harvest sneaks up on you, once work starts. Right

now, you have time to go over binders, wind-rowers, combines, corn pickers, and other harvesting machines.

You know some parts need replacing. There may be others. If you weren't the last one to run the machine, try to get a report from the man who was.

There's no getting around it—you need more than a cold chisel and a ball peen hammer to keep harvesting machines in tip-top shape. You may want to talk to your dealer about having his mechanics handle these tough machines.

**WAGONS, ELEVATORS, GRINDERS.** It's easy to forget about wagons, the feed grinder, grain elevator, sprayer and forage blower. But a balky elevator will stop the combine almost as quickly as a broken reel. A laid-up hammer mill can give your whole herd a setback. Keep spare parts on hand.

**ENGINES.** Unless you're a first-class mechanic and have a shop full of equipment, it pays to have professional mechanics overhaul your engines. They have the tools to do the job, and machines to tell them when the work is done right.

**PAINT TO PROTECT.** Most shops have steam cleaners that make quick work of grease and dirt. Once cleaned, it's a simple matter to spray on a coat of paint that makes equipment last longer and worth more when you trade it in. Then, too, you feel more like taking care of equipment if it's spruced up with a flashy paint job. And it's care that "keeps 'em rolling!"

Wayne State's Wildcats broke even in a two-game series last weekend by dropping a tight 62-60 tilt to the Eagles from Chadron State Friday night and coming back to top the visitors 61-55 Saturday night.

The double-header against Chadron provided spectators with the type of game they can expect only from very evenly matched teams.

The Wildcats took the initial lead in Friday night's game when Carl Johnson hooked in the first score less than 30 seconds after the tip-off. From then on the game seemed with the lead changing 13 times in the first quarter and nine times in the second. Chadron had the edge at the half, 35-33.

The Eagles came back from the mid-time break to build up a substantial lead of 10 points at 50-40 by the middle of the third quarter. A scoring streak by Wayne forward Don Tietgen brought the Wildcats back into the game, and they caught the westerners at 56-44.
