Formation of Permanent Red Cross Unit Aim of Chairman

"If an emergency or disaster occurs in our area that requires Red Cross aid, only a closely-knit organization can do the job right," says J. H. Morrison, chairman of Wayne county Red Cross.

Mr. Morrison asserted that his primary objective in the forthcoming Red Cross membership drive is formation of a permanent county organization that will be ready for any emergency.

The backbone of the Red Cross organization, according to Morrison, is the "home services." He cited many examples where voluntary members in various communities were able to extend helping hands when it was critically needed.

Recalling that during the last war Red Cross workers in this county were bonded in a trusted few patriotic persons, Mr. Morrison hopes to establish a strong organization now in the county, for great amount of work that may have to be accomplished.

It is especially interested at this time in finding persons to pledge their blood to the Red Cross mobile blood unit which will be available here and it is hoped that people will cooperate in answering the need.

"We have been fortunate here in not having had many emergencies or disasters in the past, according to the chairman, but it is well worth our time and effort to be ready. An efficiently working Red Cross organization is the best and most economical way to meet any emergency."

Wayne county campaign begins Feb. 28 with a buffet supper at Hotel Morrison. All volunteer workers and their wives and husbands will be present to receive plans and materials for the drive. The county's goal is \$1,800.

Berry then started hitting to lead the Blue Devils ahead at the end of the third quarter, 47-41. In that torrid period, Wayne outscored Schuyler 19 points to 7.





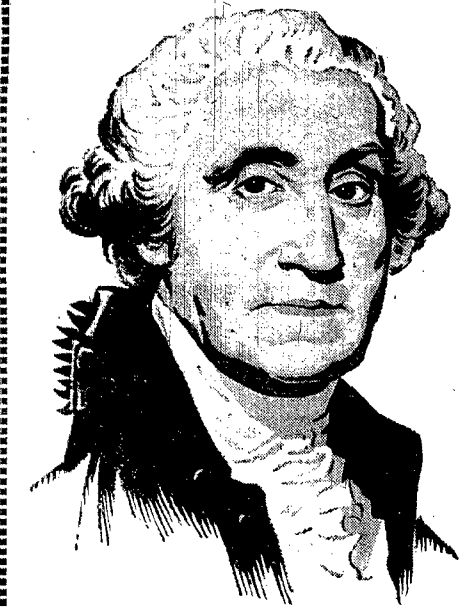

Foreign Policy

The state department seems reluctant to reveal a great deal about its foreign policy. In view of the confusion surrounding the issue, the American people deserve to know just what specific policies the United States is pursuing. We hope the administration officials are not as uncertain about it as they appear to be. We trust they know what action will be taken in the event Russia or her satellites make another aggressive move. We are certainly looking forward to a positive policy regarding the war in Korea.

Mistakes have been made in our foreign policy and they have proved costly in both lives and money. (Those who shout the loudest about those errors probably would have made similar decisions had it been up to them—since few experts could prophesy accurately what Joe Stalin's real intentions were in the immediate post war years.)

Blame for our country's dilemma is being placed directly upon Secretary of State Dean Acheson. Since he managed our foreign policy which failed to halt Communist domination of China, this comes as a natural reaction. His personal friendship with convicted Communist Alger Hiss has earned for him the title, "Coddler of Communists."

These condemnations of Mr. Acheson are based on apparent facts. But to refer to the secretary as the "Pink Dean," as one Nebraska newspaper did last week, is carrying things too far. Popular usage of the word "pink" today connotes pro-Communism. Name calling seems to be very popular these days, but no conscientious thinking American is so rash as to consider Mr. Acheson an enemy of the United States, in spite of what they may think of his management of foreign affairs.

A doctor friend commented a long time ago that more people seemed to die of worry than were killed by hard work. We couldn't figure out why this should be until a communication this week pointed out that the reason why worry kills more people than work is because more people worry than work.

All the restlessness and pessimism of today are counteracted by the calm and sensible philosophy of the old-timers in the community. In and around Wayne you can find many of the solid citizens who have seen the worst and best of everything nature and man have to offer. They wonder what all the excitement is about and why this age prefers to view the future with alarm. Their ideas of hard work, belief in God and love thy neighbor have carried them through many trials and hardships that would make our problems seem like pleasure. There is a great optimism in these people who believe that any individual through faith and confidence in himself can overcome all obstacles.

One is reminded of the story in which a little boy was given a jig-saw puzzle by his father. On one side of the puzzle was a picture of the globe and on the other side a picture of the giant Paul Bunyan. The boy tried for a long time to put the pieces together to form the picture of the world but the scene was unfamiliar to him and he failed. Finally he turned the puzzle over and began to fit the pieces together to form the picture of Paul Bunyan. This was more familiar to him and in a short time it was completed. The boy called to his father and said, "Look, I put the man together and the world came out all right."

Prominent tavern signs warn minors of the penalties if found guilty of mistating their age to purchase beer. "Sworn Statements of Age," supplied taverns by the brewing industry, are used in doubtful cases.

You Have A Responsibility

First, never ask the retailer to sell beer illegally. Second, never object should you be asked to supply proof of age. Third, notify the owner immediately if you see a minor attempt to obtain beer unlawfully. Let's all help to make this good law fully effective.

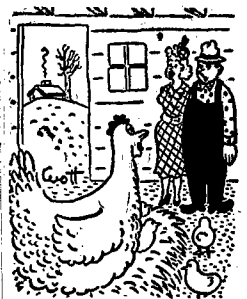

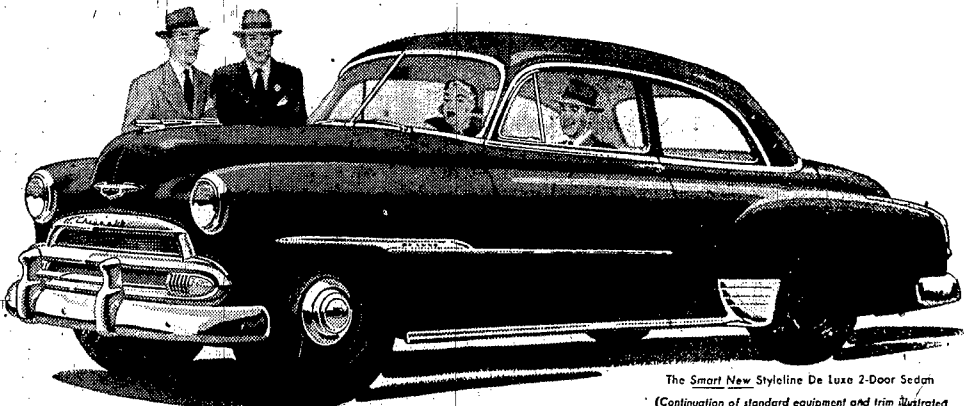
