





Moral Resistance

Moral Resistance During national Brotherhood week most Americans renewed their pledge to follow the Christian principles of tolerance to-ward all men. We in this country are in-deed fortunate to have retained our sense of fair play and consideration for others. Wars and threats of war have instilled in the minds of Europeans and Asiatics poisoning suspicions and cynicism toward their neighbors. From experience they have learned to distrust their fellowman; from a sense of fear they cannot enjoy the confidences of friendship and brotherhood that we accept as a natural thing.

that we accept as natural thing. Hear, however, is a disease that spreads even among healthy minds. Unless our re-sistance is strong we may be caught by the germ of distrust that is nourished by self-appointed judges who would decide for us who are our enemies. We are in danger from within, it is true, but the danger lies more in how we attack the problem than in the problem itself. Our principles of de-mocracy and fairness are too high to be undermined by a few exponents of false philosophy. And our institutions of justice are too valuable to be usurped by com-mittees or groups passing out character references.

A strong abiding faith in the merits of our way of life is necessary to maintain what we have. Of equal importance is a sense of friendship and brotherhood to-ward other men. This means accepting the principle that every man is innocent of any charge until proved guilty.

Citizen's Burden

These is no under a solution of the solution o

preciable dent in our tax dollar. There is no immediate solution to our tax problem. We must accept the responsi-bility of paying more and more of the cost of national existence. Waste and ineffi-ciency may anger us but they inevitably exist as a part of any democratic form of government and must be paid for also. It remains for the American taxpayer to adopt a more conciliatory attitude toward this sacrifice he is called upon to make. It isn't an easy attitude to have—especially for the person which has lost confidence in his government—but the hardship involved is hardly comparable to the sacrifice of the G.I called upon to risk his life for the same cause.

The war in Korea seems very remote to many Americans who go on complaining about the cost of government as if gichange in leadership would bring about national economy. As long as we are forced to arm against figression we will have the burden of extreme taxation. As long as we main-tain our democratic form of government— the wart always to stay strong—we which we want always to stay strong—we must bear the expenses incurred by poli-ticians. The future of our nation is far from hopeless. We still have the highest stan-dard of living in the world, and we are bet-ter equipped to fight now than we have be been at the start of any war in our history. The difference between our country's mili-tary effort now, however, and what it was during World War II is that we must pay the expenses as they occur rather than will require more effort on the part of the home front than was ever demanded be-fore. It is up to us to accept the burden as an inevitable part of our struggle for survival.
