ASSESSOR'S NOTICE

Wayne County Assessment Begins **MARCH 10**

All Personal Property Owners and Those 21 to 50 Subject to Old Age Assistance or Poll Tax Are Required to File!

Nebraska Revenue Laws:

77-409

County assessor shall examine and check all returns of personal property for taxation. He shall have the power to examine under oath the person making the return to determine that all personal property of the taxpayer is listed for taxation at its actual value.

77-1229

out and verify a statement of all such property, which shall be delivered by the person to the county assessor on or before April 20.

77-1235

Where any person fails, neglects, or refuses to make out and deliver the statement required, the county assessor shall evaluate the articles of property belonging to that person and shall add fifty per cent to the value returned.

Work sheets have been sent to persons in the county and should be completed and brought to the assessor's office at Wayne county court house. Personal property owners who have not received such work sheets may obtain one by coming or writing to the assessor's office. Business establishments will be called on by the assessor or his assistants. The assessor asks for the conscientious cooperation of all persons in the county.
