54 Students Take Part In Program

Wayne State's concert band will present the annual spring concert next Sunday in the college auditorium.

The program which is composed of 31 students from the college will begin at 3 p.m. and is open to the public. No admission will be charged.

Under the direction of Eugene A. Beaman, the concert will include selections by Bach, Wagner, Tchaikovsky and John Philip Sousa.

Special numbers on the program will be a march "Salute to Wayne State," composed and conducted by Clifford Dyck, Wayne State music student from Avon, S. D., and "Cubana Rhapsody for Violin" for which Benjamin Bernstein, music instructor at the college, will play the solo part.

The music is dedicated to the spirit of Wayne State "with the hope that it will ever be reflected by those who proclaim their Alma Mater."

With the concert band are 11 students from Wayne.

Conservation Sign-up Dates Set by PMA

Wayne county Production and Marketing Administration has announced a series of sign-up meetings for farmers who want to carry out Group I and II conservation practices this year.

A meetings will start at 9 a. m. and will take place on the following dates and places: Wayne, March 10, PMA office; Wakefield, March 8, Recreational center; Hoskins, March 8, Town Hall; Carroll, March 9, State Bank; Sholes, March 10, Matson hall and Winslow, March 12, Floor cafe.

The closing date for 1951 sign-up is April 15. All farm plans must be signed on or before this date in order for approvals to be sent to producers, according to Thomas Roberts, county chairman.

Assessment For County Gets Start

Wayne county assessment will begin Saturday and last through April 20 according to Henry Arp, county assessor. Instructions and information for filing are included in the assessor's notice in this week's Herald.

Due to error or misunderstanding many people in the county who are subject to assessment, have not been filing, according to Arp. He asks that those persons fill out the designated work sheets in order for the county to get an accurate record of personal property.

The county assessor is entrusted with the job of recording all taxable personal property in order to collect revenue for county finances.

Henry Arp was appointed county assessor Jan. 9 to replace Alex Jeffrey who resigned. Arp was appointed by the county board of commissioners to fill the assessor post until the vacancy can be filled by voters at the next general election in 1952. He served as assessor's assistant for three years before taking office.

Governor Val Peterson today announced the appointment of Paul F. Wagner, editor and publisher of the Dakota County Star at South Sioux City, as administrative assistant succeeding James S. Pittenger who was appointed secretary of state upon the death of Frank Marsh.

Wagner comes from a long-time Nebraska newspaper family, his parents having owned the Homer Star. He has published the Dakota County Star since the close of World War II. He was bureau manager for the United Press at Lincoln. As a student at the University of Nebraska, he worked for the Nebraska State Journal.

During World War II, Wagner was a Naval aviator for 42 months. He is a former president of the South Sioux City Chamber of Commerce and is presently a member of the board of directors of the Nebraska Press Association.

He is 33, married, and has two children. He will continue his ownership of the Star.

ASSESSOR'S NOTICE

Wayne County Assessment Begins MARCH 10

All Personal Property Owners and Those 21 to 50 Subject to Old Age Assistance or Poll Tax Are Required to File!

Nebraska Revenue Laws:

- 77-409
- 77-1229
- 77-1235

County assessor shall examine and check all returns of personal property for taxation. He shall have the power to examine under oath the person making the return to determine that all personal property of the taxpayer is listed for taxation at its actual value.

Every person owning personal property is required to make out and verify a statement of all such property, which shall be delivered by the person to the county assessor on or before April 20.

Where any person fails, neglects, or refuses to make out and deliver the statement required, the county assessor shall evaluate the articles of property belonging to that person and shall add fifty per cent to the value returned.

Work sheets have been sent to persons in the county and should be completed and brought to the assessor's office at Wayne county court house. Personal property owners who have not received such work sheets may obtain one by coming or writing to the assessor's office. Business establishments will be called on by the assessor or his assistants. The assessor asks for the conscientious cooperation of all persons in the county.
