Six Draftees from Wayne County Leave Monday for Military Service

Call for April Upped to Nine

Six men from Wayne county will leave Monday for military induction at Fort Omaha. Four of the draftees are from Wayne, one is from Winside and one is from Wakefield.

They are: Ernest Swanson, Wayne; Jack Brockman, Winside; James Snahr, Wayne; Eddie Baier, Wayne; Harland Korth, Wakefield; Donald Caauwe, Wayne.

The six men will fill the county quota for March. Last month's quota took eight men and January draftees numbered 11.

April Call Higher

April draft quota will take nine men from the county it was announced yesterday. The men will leave April 26.

On April 27 men going for their physical examinations will number 16 from the county.

The number of men going for physical examinations has been higher each month because the draft board must maintain a reserve of men subject to call. Also, many of the men are attending school and will be exempted until they graduate.

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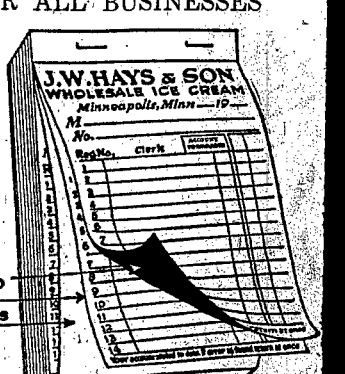

Wayne County Government

Every year high school students of the county receive instruction and practice in county government. The youths have been showing a real interest in the affairs of their local government, and they are becoming better citizens in the process.

As one becomes more acquainted with the operation of county government as it exists in Wayne and other Nebraska counties, he realizes that the county offices form an integrated and complete organization. Each office is part of a whole governmental structure, as well as an individual unit, and could not be eliminated or fail to function without upsetting the operation of other offices.

Each county official has certain duties to perform and must bear the corresponding responsibilities that go with carrying out these duties.

An organized in Wayne county, the offices comprise two operating branches—administrative and judicial. Within the administrative branch are the county clerk, county commissioner, county assessor, county treasurer, county clerk and county superintendent. Comprising the judicial branch are district judge, clerk of district court, county judge, county attorney and county clerk.

Inter-related Functions

The interdependence of county offices becomes clear when we examine their functions. Board of commissioners entrusted with care and management of the county, rely on the county clerk for property to be gathered and recorded by the county assessor. Responsibility for collecting money to finance county business rests with the county treasurer. The county clerk's jobs to manage the many forms and papers that pass daily through the office. Careful for proper functioning of county schools is the task of the county superintendent.

On the judicial side the county judge handles such matters as the settlement of estates, appointment of executors and administrators, and cases not serious enough to be tried by the district court. The county attorney prosecutes criminals and acts as legal advisor to the county offices, and the sheriff acts as chief police officer of the county, as well as in matters of district court when called in session.

The district court handles term cases that are more serious than

those in the county court. There are two district judges having jurisdiction over seven counties. Each term the judges alternate their duties in Wayne county. The clerk of the district court records all the proceedings and judgments of that court and is keeper of the records and papers of that court. He also acts as ex-officio member and clerk of the insanity commission.

These brief descriptions do not cover the many detailed services performed by each office. People should become acquainted with the officials and their duties.

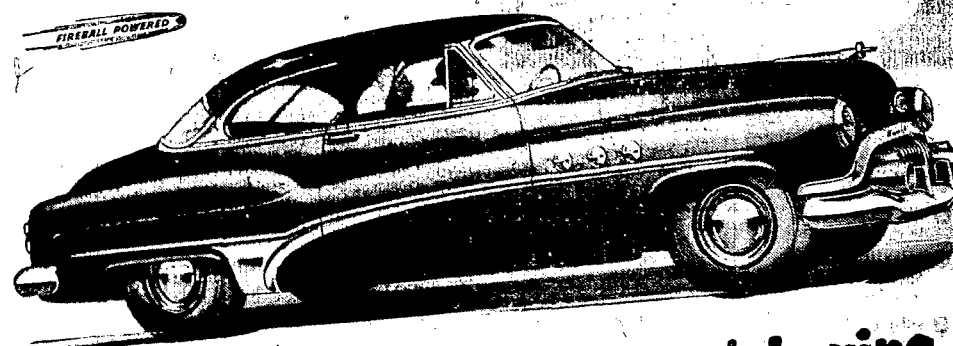


