Wayne State Debate Students Capture Second Place Honors

Second-place honors went to Wayne State's debate squad at the Nebraska Intercollegiate Forensic Association tournament held in McCook last Friday and Saturday. Nebraska Wesleyan speakers took first.

In the discussion competition, Joan Hooker, Sioux City, won first in the Women's "B" division and Dick Halama, Wayne, tied for first in the Men's B division. Mildred Hish, Wayne, tied for third in the Women's A.

In debate, Joan Hooker and Mildred Hish tied for first in the Women's B. Carolyn Olson, Hartington, and Donna Sala, Wayne, tied for second in the Women's A, and Halama and Don Reed, Norfolk, tied for third in the Men's A.

In peace oratory Joan Hooker won second place. In old-time oratory, Carolyn Olson took second place for women, and Loy Elser, Peterson, Ia., took fourth place for men.

In the extemporaneous speaking competition, Reed won second in the Men's B. Mildred Hish took third in the Women's B, and Donna Sala and Halama won fourth in the A divisions.

Ten Competitors
The Wayne debaters competed with nine other schools at the meet: Wesleyan, Hastings, Midland, Doane, Kearney, Fort, Omaha university, Creighton and McCook. They were accompanied to McCook by James McCarthy, and Lenore Ramsey, instructors in speech at the college.

Sunday the group will leave for Stillwater, Okla., to participate in the national Phi Delta Kappa tournament at Oklahoma A. and M.

Approximately 180,000 Nebraska school children will take part in a state-wide drive to collect 150,000 pounds of good used clothing to aid victims of war in Korea, Western Europe and underprivileged children on the western Indian reservation and handicapped areas of the south. F. B. Decker, state superintendent of public instruction announced today. The drive will begin Monday and last one week.

Wayne county rural schools plan to participate in the drive, according to county superintendent Marie Wright. Students are arranging to bring their used clothing to the county schools next week.

Cooperating in the school child relief drive is the Nebraska Motor Carriers association whose members are providing free transportation for the clothing collected. Paul Halpine, secretary of the association today reported that more than 2,000 trucks will be available for the transportation of the clothing.

The clothing will be distributed by Save the Children Federation, a national child service organization which does extensive child service work in rural American and war devastated areas overseas.

Family Cooperation

Every family in Nebraska is being asked to send at least one bundle of good clothing to school any day of the week of March 26-31.

Mr. Halpine reported that trucks of the motor carrier's association would begin picking up clothing at schools on Saturday, March 31, and would continue as rapidly as local school superintendents notified their local carriers that the clothing was ready.

Bad Weather Is Obstructing Red Cross Drive--Morrison

Wayne county people are showing their cooperation in mobilizing for defense by their response to the county Red Cross chapter's fund campaign, according to J. H. Morrison, campaign chairman.

"Those who have made their contributions to help in the critical job of mobilization facing our nation have given state and federal authorities the task we now face, in order to bring the campaign quickly to a successful end, is that of giving more people the opportunity to give their support. Volunteer solicitors have done a good job in the face of weather, personal obligations and other obstacles, but that remains to be done. Concentrated effort must be made to call upon those persons who have not been contacted."

Blood Still Needed
"The armed forces have asked the Red Cross to use its resources to collect blood to save the lives of battle wounded servicemen," Morrison added. "This is in addition to providing blood centers here at home. Red Cross disaster service is collecting state and federal authorities in their civil defense planning for mass feeding and shelter, a field in which the Red Cross usually gets first call."

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Savings Bonds Total Higher For February

Elmer A. Meyer, chairman of the savings bond committee, announced today that sales for the month of February in Wayne county totaled \$38,881.75.

Meyer also announced that sales for other counties in this area were: Cumming, \$59,250.00; Dixon, \$28,731.25; and Cedar, \$28,462.50.

At the same time, Leland R. Hall, state director, announced that total sales in Nebraska for the month were \$6,369,266.31, of which 67 1/2% was in series "E" bonds.

Hall took issue with those who criticize the savings bond program because the value of the dollar has declined. "That is true," Hall said, "but so has the value of the dollar in any other form of savings. An investment in bonds takes just that much money out of circulation, and is just that much of a check on inflation. In order to combat this danger, we need a tough and thorough anti-inflation program, and defense bonds are a very necessary part of that program." "Wide acceptance of the huge public debt is an absolute necessity," he added.

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Mail Service Gets Back To Normal

With Spring officially here yesterday, residents of Wayne county were finding things getting back to normal after the second blizzard in two weeks had hit the area.

Most rural roads are open and passable again today, or at least, the mail routes are open, and they cover a good cross-section of the county roads.

Rural carrier, Al Bahe, on route 3, completed his entire route for the first time Tuesday. He did not get back from the job, however, until 7 p.m.

Carrier F. A. Mildner on route 1, and William Theiman of route 2, could not quite cover their complete routes by Tuesday. But both carriers were able to restore regular mail service beginning yesterday.

Many of those who attended the state basketball tournament in Lincoln from here were unable to return until late Sunday or Monday. Although Highway 275 was held open, the road was icy and driftings made necessary one-way traffic in many places. It took one car almost seven hours to make the drive from Lincoln.

Snow clearing operations were almost completed yesterday after high winds Sunday and Monday kept whipping the snow into the roads as fast as plows could dig it out. Although highway maintenance crews were at work constantly, many towns became isolated again after having been opened Monday.

Bus service to Wayne was near normal during the storm, but residents of the town did not get their Sunday newspapers until Monday.

Snow in the area, which started early Saturday morning, ranged up to 16 inches, according to R. C. Ayres, Nebraska highway department.

Peter Clyde Oman
Peter Clyde Oman, son of Peter White Oman and Martha Everett Oman was born in Light Street, Pa., Aug. 8, 1879, and passed away at the Bridgeport Memorial hospital after an extended illness on March 14, 1951 at the age of 80 years, seven months and six days. When he was a year old his family moved to Vicksburg, Mich., and resided there for four years when they moved to Malvern, Ia. In 1882 the family moved to Wayne county, soon after the village of Wayne had been established. After finishing his elementary education Clyde attended a Methodist college at Central City for one year. Upon returning to Wayne county he proceeded to gather livestock and machinery together to establish himself as a farmer. On Jan. 3, 1894, he was married to Mabel Olive Prescott at her home 11 miles southwest of Wayne. After farming five years in Brenna precinct, they moved to their own farm four and a half miles southwest of Wayne, leaving there to move to Wayne in September, 1910. To this union were born three children, Prescott Clyde, who died at the age of two weeks, Mabel Fern (Mrs. J. L. Gors) and Frances Olive (Mrs. Lynn Tuttle).

Mr. Oman was actively interested in community and civic affairs, having served on the rural school board, the office boards of Grace church and later the Methodist church of Wayne for many years. He served in the Liberty Bond drive of World War I in Wayne county and on the ration board of Merrill county in World War II. He was Wayne County Assessor for eight years. He did considerable work as auctioneer during his younger years and was an agent for the Farmer's Mutual Insurance company for some years. He was actively engaged in farming or the managing of his farms all his life. In May of 1942, after residing in Wayne county for 60 years he and his wife moved to Bridgeport to be near their daughter, Mrs. Gors and family and to facilitate the management of their land in Cheyenne county. There being no Methodist church in Bridgeport, Mr. and Mrs. Oman joined the First Presbyterian church there. Mr. Oman was for many years a member of the V. O. Lodge. He was preceded in death by his wife who passed away May 27, 1946 his parents and three brothers and one sister.

Conrad Schwarz
Conrad Schwarz was born north of Waver, Feb. 4, 1874 and passed away March 15, 1951 following a heart attack at his home in Beemer. He was elder of the Congregational church and held offices in the Woodmen lodge, Masonic lodge, Eastern Star and Royal Neighbor lodges.

On Aug. 5, 1903 he was married to Ida Pruss in Beemer. They lived in Pilger and later moved to Beemer. Here, Mr. Schwarz operated a cafe. He was Justice of Peace and from 1918 to Dec. 1950, a school custodian, after which time he retired.

Mrs. Ann Richards, 82, a resident near Carroll since 1909 passed away Feb. 16 in a hospital at Washington, Ia. She was making her home with her daughter, Mrs. Maud Peters of Columbus Junction, Ia.

Prep's Panthers turned on the steam in the second half to defeat Primrose 43-29 in their first game of the tournament Thursday night.

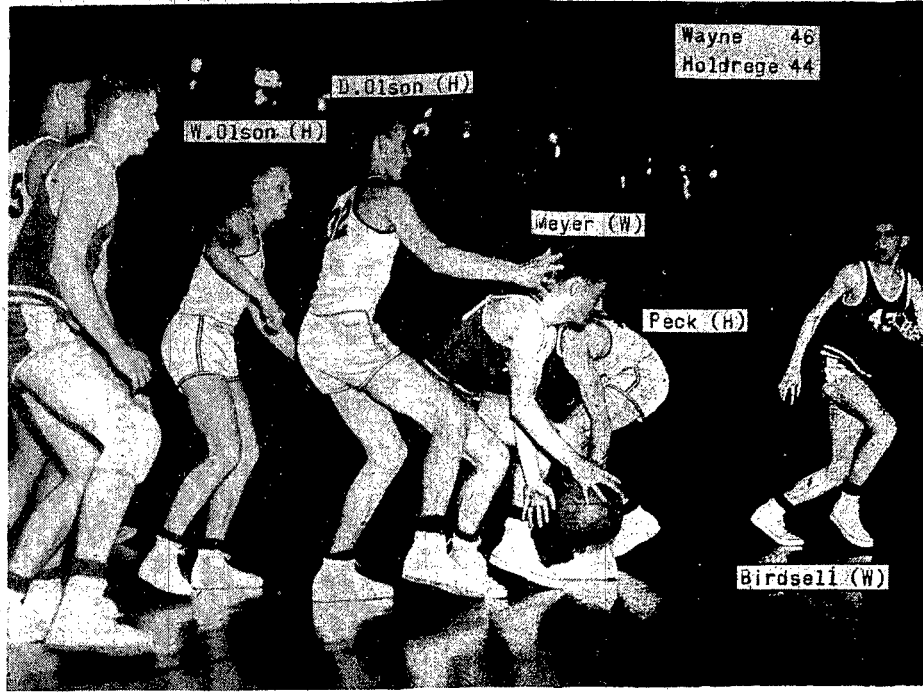
The Primrose cagers started strong and looked good into the second quarter until the Panthers started a scoring spree that sent them ahead and kept them there.




