Wayne Voters Go to Polls Tuesday; Will Elect Three City Councilmen, Two Members to Board of Education

Dan Sherry Is Candidate For 2nd Ward

Wayne voters will have a chance to cast ballots for three councilmen and two members of the board of education Tuesday in the general city election.

According to the official ballots all candidates listed for office are nominees of Wayne citizen's party. Spaces are included on the ballots for write-in candidates if voters so desire.

Schoolboard members available for reelection are Edward Seymour and Paul Mipes. City council members listed for election are William Piell, incumbent First ward; Wilard Witse, incumbent Third ward and Dan Sherry, nominal candidate for the Second ward.

Sherry is the only candidate not an incumbent; he was nominated for councilman at a citizen's party caucus Feb. 28, having defeated councilman Elmer Meyer.

1950 Total High

According to last year's voting totals 668 Wayne citizens went to the polls and cast the largest number of votes in many years. Although only one party exists in Wayne and nomination usually assures election, it has occurred in the past that write-in candidates have gained the election.

Last year W. C. Swanson, write-in candidate, received 80 votes for the mayor's spot, following a brisk last minute campaign which failed to defeat the Citizen's party.

The total vote of 666 last year compares with 263 total votes in 1949 and 150 in 1948. Figures showed a very great increase of women voters last year, reflecting the influence of Women Voters club organized in Wayne.

Although there is no evident opposition to the candidates nominated by the citizen's party, indications are that voting should be high this year.

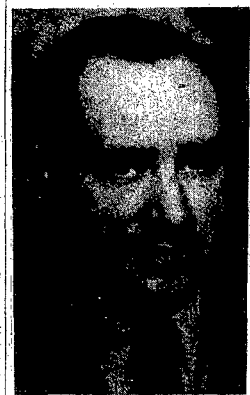
The boys participated in judging contest held in conjunction with Angus Breeders show and sale. The results from the contest are not yet available.

State Marriage Trend Increasing; County Is Level

There were 66 marriages performed in Wayne county last year and seven divorces granted according to state bureau of Vital Statistics. This compares to the same number of marriages in 1949 with only two divorces granted during the entire year. The number of marriages in 1949 was 87 and six divorces were granted.

The total marriages in Nebraska during 1950 was 13,828. This is a jump of more than a thousand marriages over the 1949 total of 12,743. The number of divorces granted in the state during both years remained approximately equal with a slight drop last year, 1950, 2,471; and 1949, 2,521.

[With the great increase in marriages last year and the decrease in divorces the number of married people in the state has been substantially increasing.

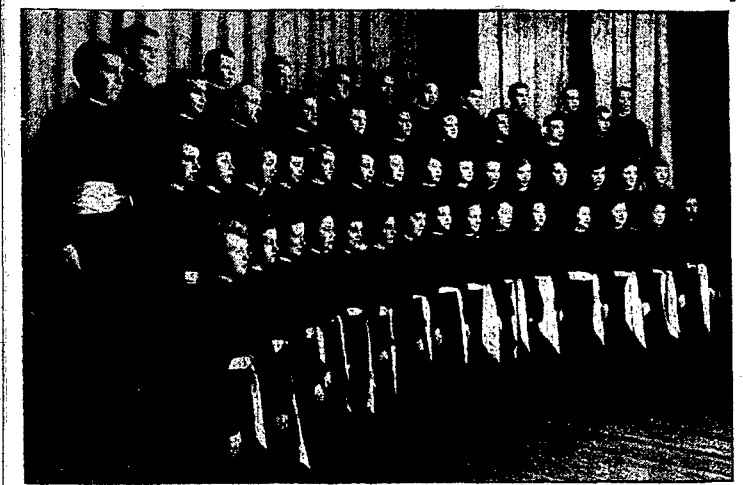

Wayne Airport Rotary Beacon OK'd by Council

Wayne city council agreed Tuesday to carry out plans for installing a rotary beacon at Wayne airport.

The Nebraska Aeronautics commission has considered Wayne as a "good site" for location of one of the Federal Airway beacons that have been decommissioned and made available to the commission.

The municipality is required to pay only the costs of removing the beacon, tower switches, etc., from the present location, transportation and installation at the local airport. In view of the high costs of originally installing the beacons, a great saving is possible under this program.

The beacon will show 12 to 15 clear flashes per minute indicating the airport at which field lighting is not operated continuously during hours of darkness.

Finds Body Of Drowned Boy Tuesday

Fifty-five members of Wayne national guard company took part in the search Tuesday for seven-year-old Robert Lindahl, Randolph, who was drowned Sunday afternoon in a creek near Randolph. The 388th field artillery battalion at 3:58 p.m. was alerted for flood control Monday night on orders from the state adjutant general's office.

The body of the boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Lindahl, was found at 8:10 Tuesday morning by Sgt. Norman Ellis in a tributary of the creek about a mile from where the boy was drowned.

Finding the body climaxed a long search since Sunday by firemen and townspeople of Randolph and surrounding areas. The body was found less than two hours after the guard unit arrived in Randolph to begin search.

Wayne guard members received word of pending orders at their regular meeting in Wayne Monday evening. The group was later ordered to be ready at 5 a.m. Tuesday.

The group left Wayne at 5:30 a.m., in their trucks and jeep. Advertisement left by Captain Robert Nelson and Warrant Officer Orville Sherry left before the main group.

The battalion was divided into two searching groups after arriving in Randolph and proceeded an organized search down stream from the point of drowning. Townspeople who had been searching the area previously aided the guardsmen.

The tributary leading into the creek had not been investigated because searchers thought there was not enough water to carry the body. Sgt. Shirley Erikson advised Sgt. Ellis to check the tributary and Ellis discovered the body almost completely submerged.

The guard was commended for its efficient organization during the search. Efforts to attempt to find the boy were not made out on a systematic basis, and most of the guard's quick accomplishment was attributed to its ability to organize members in covering the whole searching area.

The Lindahl youth was drowned at 4:30 p.m., Sunday while playing with his sister, Loydean. Robert apparently was drinking the water and was carried away by the swift current. Rescuers summoned by the girl did not arrive in time to pull the boy from the creek.

Survivors include the parents, one sister and the boy's grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Nitz, Randolph.

The Wayne guardsmen were relieved from the emergency orders at 12 pm, Tuesday.
