Gov. Val Peterson to Address Lions Charter Banquet Here Monday Night

Pender Club To Sponsor Presentation



Governor Val Peterson will be honor guest and speaker at Wayne Lions club charter night banquet Monday. He will be made an honorary member of Lions club. The governor will arrive in Wayne at 6:30 p.m., and take part in an open-car procession up Main street.

Nebraska's Governor Val Peterson has accepted the Wayne Lions club's invitation to be honor guest and speaker at the club's charter night banquet at Wayne city auditorium Monday night.

The governor will be made an honorary member of the Lions club at the event. It is the first time a state governor has attended a Lions charter night. Over 300 Lions and their ladies are expected to take part.

Guests at the banquet from Wayne will be Victor H. Morey, president of Wayne State college and president of local Kiwanis club; Glen Houdersheldt, mayor; and William A. Kosher, president of the chamber of commerce.

Music by Band
Governor Peterson and his guests will be met by the Wayne and Pender clubs south of Wayne at 4:30 p.m. The group will form a procession of open cars, meet the Wayne High school band at the depot, and proceed up Main street to the auditorium.

Lions attending the banquet will represent clubs from Norfolk, Wayne, Pender, Stanton, Carroll, Winfield, West Point, Blair, Fremont, Wakefield and Tekamah. E. A. Ernst, Lions district governor, Nebraska City, will be on hand to present the charter to the Wayne club.

This banquet is sponsored by Pender Lions club. C. F. Young, district governor, Pender, will act as toastmaster. William Busch, Ben Zehner, Tom Ryan and Stanford Diers, Pender, will take part in the program.

Governor Peterson will be on "home" grounds when he arrives in Wayne. The governor's family moved to Wayne from Oakland in 1919. He was graduated from Wayne high school and attended Wayne State Teachers college where he received his bachelor of arts degree in education in 1927.

Music for the procession and ceremony at the auditorium will be furnished by the 85-piece Wayne high school band under the direction of A. J. Atkins.

County Expenditures Audited; Financial Condition Is Stable
Wayne county government is in good shape financially as indicated by the auditor's report published in this week's Herald.

According to Ray C. Johnson, auditor of public accounts, all offices, departments and activities operated within the amounts appropriated.

In addition the county has maintained its established reserve, in spite of rising costs.

A percentage breakdown of all receipts handled by the county treasurer during the nine-month period shows where county funds are spent. The largest amount 29.6 per cent went to county schools.

Everything Is 'On The Record' For County Clerk And Staff

(This is the first in a special series of articles written to acquaint people of Wayne county with the duties and functions of their county officials.)

Wayne county clerk's office serves as the center of the county's business. Among the hundreds of functions carried on by the clerk and his staff are jobs that require filing, recording, issuing, supervising, preparing, mailing, canvassing, computing, listing, keeping inventory, writing, signing and registering—to name a few.

It is the clerk's responsibility to record and keep in order thousands of statistics and figures for efficient running of the county government. He and his staff must have ready and up-to-date all records concerning the business and proceedings of the county.

In addition the clerk must be ready to carry on duties such as supervisor of election, secretary of county board of commissioners and ex-officio county judge and county sheriff in case of vacancy.

C. A. Bard recently acted as county judge for a period of one month during the absence of Judge W. A. Crossland.)

The county clerk is elected by the people for a term of four years. Deputy county clerk, Izora Laughlin, is an appointed official serving by the clerk's office. Her appointment is subject to approval of county board of commissioners on recommendation of the county clerk.

Miss Laughlin primarily takes care of filing and recording deeds, mortgages, etc. She is available for other duties when necessary. Such as serving as clerk for the board of commissioners, etc.

Assistants
The clerk often requires the assistance of competent help to handle the many routine tasks in his office. C. A. Bard has two assistants besides Miss Laughlin. Amy Barnes is essentially the bookkeeper of the office. Among the records she handles are distribution records, warrant records, individual claim records, automobile titles, etc.

Mrs. Helen Ellis works as a part-time assistant in the office. She aids in taking care of forms and records such as chattel mortgages, releases, recordings and proof recording.

Much of the county clerk's work is routine, complicated routine that requires too many separate procedures to list here. In order to gain some idea of operations involved in much of the work carried on by the clerk's office staff, steps taken in handling one claim against the county for money or services are listed as follows:

1. Claim is notarized.
2. It is filed.
3. Board of commissioners passes judgment on it.
4. It is

sented for various offices and funds. 5. Numbered. 6. Withholding taxes are figured. 7. Minutes are written up for publication. 8. Minutes written up for recording. 9. Warrant (check) is written. 10. Entered in warrant register. 11. Entered in distribution record. 12. It is entered in individual claim register. 13. Record is made of total amount spent and remaining. 14. Claim is filed in permanent file.

This procedure must be done twice each month for every claim. Approximately 175 to 200 claims are handled by the office every month. This is only one of many functions involved in normal business of the clerk's office. Similar action is necessary for other forms

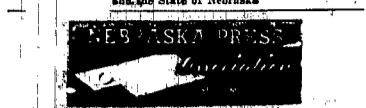

County Record

According to recent audit of Wayne county business for the past nine months, our local government has not only operated within stable financial limits, but has managed to maintain a substantial reserve. The results are highly commendable—and indicate an efficient staff of county officials.

It is significant that expenditures in the county for relief during the period were higher than expenses involved in running the county government, including salaries, supplies, equipment and repair on the court house building.

It is common knowledge that county officials work under an extreme low-salary handicap. Many of them have to supplement their regular wages with other sources of income in order to meet present living costs. Yet, they maintain an active and conscientious interest in their responsibilities to the county.

One of the most serious results of inflation is the effect upon local government workers who have their salaries dependent upon state legislation—which is a slow process at its best. The fact that wages lag behind prices applies to these people even more than to the average worker.

The Federal government added 60,594 employees to the payroll in January—more than 2,000 per day. It doesn't seem to add up to a program of economy in government spending.

A Good Buy

Too often we suspiciously look a gift horse in the mouth. It's easy to do that to the bargains advertised by Wayne merchants for tomorrow and Saturday—Wayne Dollar Days.

When Wayne shoppers go home this weekend with special purchases, they will have found what they wanted at a price they considered right. In this country we take a "good buy" for granted. It is always available.

And the reason we have it is that we live in a free economy in which competition is intense, where awards go to the merchant who gives us the lowest price, or the best service, or the greatest quality, or the most appealing advertising—or some other business inducement.

Visitors from other countries, where business is usually wound tight in governmental red tape and obsolete practices, are amazed when they see American stores. They can hardly believe such abundance exists.

What they are seeing, whether they realize it or not, is one of the best examples of free enterprise at work.

The Time Has Come

In this era of greater clamor for greater governmental control of everything, the following little piece, printed in a Minnesota newspaper, seems appropriate: "The story of the creation of the world is told in Genesis in 400 words. The world's greatest moral code, the Ten Commandments, contains only 297 words. Lincoln's Gettysburg Address is but 266 words in length. The Declaration of Independence required only 1,321 words to set up a new concept of freedom. The Office of Price Administration uses 2,500 words to announce a reduction in the price of cabbage seed." No comment needed.

Randolph Methodist Church Marks 65th Anniversary

The first Methodist church here celebrated the 65th anniversary of the beginning of Methodism in Randolph.

At the morning service Dr. E. E. Jackman preached the sermon, "The youth choir sang, 'O Gates of the Temple,' and Gail Lamborg, accompanied by Silve Louthan, sang 'The Holy City.' A greeting from the Bishop Dana Dawson of Topeka, Kan., was read by the pastor, Rev. R. O. Louthan.

The afternoon service was devoted to the reading of greetings and messages from former pastors and members. A choir of 12 members, led by the late Mrs. D. A. McCullough, presented special music. Those present in the choir were Jeanette and Marilyn Sherwood, Florence Schaefer, Harriet Anderson, Mrs. L. W. Taylor, who was the former Ruth Ellen Collier and Mrs. Dean Collier, who was the former Pauline Andrew. Marvin Weber played "The Holy City" on the trumpet and Mrs. W. T. Fisher read a poem, "Little Old White Church," which had been written by the late Estlin Wentworth in memory of the first church building which had been built here.

Mayor H. H. Sherwood gave a few words of welcome in behalf of the church and of the city.

One former pastor's wife, Mrs. W. L. Schout, was present for the day and gave words of greetings, as did a former member, Mrs. Ivor Morris of Carroll.

Among those who wrote greetings to the church were Rev. J. W. Kivall, Omaha, former district superintendent; the following pastors: Rev. W. C. Kelly, Marionville, Mo.; Rev. F. A. Carmony, Joplin, Mo.; Rev. and Mrs. H. G. Wilcox, Kearney, Rev. and Mrs. E. N. Littrell, Arnold, Rev. and Mrs. J. A. Moorman, Omaha, Rev. and Mrs. McCullough, Pierre, and a former pastor's wife, Mrs. C. T. Connelley, Blair. Several greetings were read from former members.

Rev. David Simpson of Ashland, a former pastor, gave the message in the evening on the subject, "The Prisoners of the East." Rev. Simpson recalled many incidents during his pastorate here which was during the depression and dust storms.

The choir sang "Peace at Evening." Mimmie Pitman was organist for all of the services. Miss Pitman has been with the music department since 1914 and was congratulated by both Rev. Simpson and the pastor, Rev. Louthan for her faithfulness.

There were 17 persons present in the afternoon who had worshipped in the first church which had been erected in 1831.

The Randolph Methodist church was organized in 1836 following the building of the Omaha railroad through the country and the subsequent beginning of the village of Randolph. It was the first and for a number of years the only religious organization in the Randolph community.

The first services were held in the Omaha depot and later moved to the office of the Edwards and Bradford Lumber company. When the first public school was built they were moved to the school house until the first church was built.

When the church became inadequate for the growing congregation, a new building was erected in 1912.

Saturday night, Sept. 23, 1916, the church was struck by lightning and resulting fire destroyed all but the outer walls of the building only three and a half years old. An insurance settlement made possible the immediate rebuilding. In general the plan and interior were the same as the one destroyed.
