Nephew of Carroll Residents Listed as Killed in Action

Carroll, First Lt. Kenneth G. Stautler, nephew of Owen, John and George Owens, Carroll, has been listed by the War Department as killed in action in Korea April 18, 1951.

Stautler was the son of Mrs. Frank M. Stautler, the former Jennie Owens, Houston, Tex. He served in World War II and followed the army to service in Korea since July 1950.

He died April 18 after having been wounded by enemy fire. Silver Star and Gold Star medals for bravery were awarded him by the army.

Surviving are his wife and two children, Kay 3 and Kevin, 15 months, Shreveport, La.

Wayne GI Returns To Japan After Five-year Absence

Sgt. Tom Jones, son of John D. Jones, Wayne, is now stationed in Matsushima, Japan (Honsiu). In a letter dated April 22 he writes as follows:

"I have been in Japan a week now; it has been a very busy week for me. I have a very tough job as first sergeant of a large company. I have had to work many long hours getting the men settled and on their jobs.

"I have been able to call John two times (Lt. Col. John Jones stationed in Tokyo). I am about 250 miles north of him. He will be up here next weekend with me. He tells me he is very well and doesn't mind his work, but like many of us he misses his family.

"I got off the boat in Yokohama, just where I left five years ago. The change that has taken place in that length of time is nothing short of a miracle. The Japs have done a wonderful job of rebuilding their country. Of course the whole country is very poor yet, but in the whole they are better off than ever before. The people are very friendly and I don't expect to have any more trouble with them, but I do know that the Communies have a game plan in mind.

"If you can find a map of Japan you can see about where I am stationed. It is on the island of Honsiu. We are about 250 miles north of Tokyo. The closest large town is Sendai; I think it is about 30 miles south of us. There is a small town of Yonotomi near the camp.

"This camp was an old Jap air base. Many of the buildings still show the results of our fighter strafing. I am in a large building that holds about 300 men. I have a nice room with two other men. It makes it very nice living.

"The weather is much like Nebraska this time of the year, or a little colder as we get the wind off the Pacific, which we are very close to.

"The food here is far above the average for the army. I expect to gain some weight and should get in good shape. The climate is good and I will have regular hours and plenty of exercise.

"When you can pass this letter on to the folks around there, I would be happy to hear from any of them."

Wayne State Will Graduate 277 Seniors at May Exercises

Wayne State college will graduate 277 students at commencement exercises to be held at the Willow Bowl Friday morning, May 25.

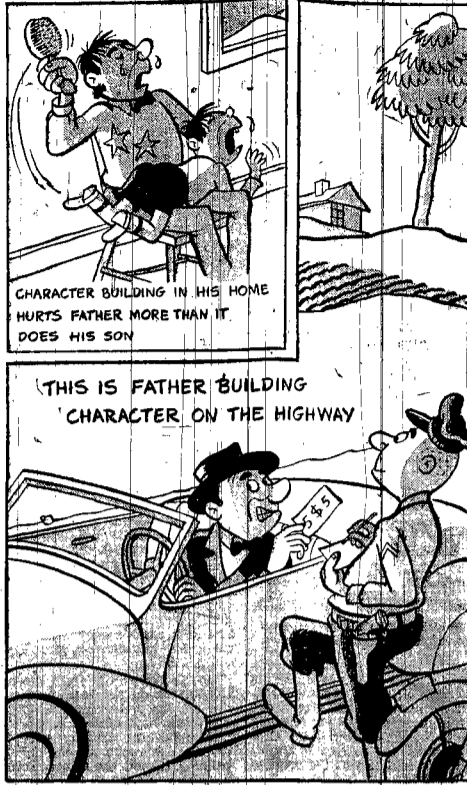

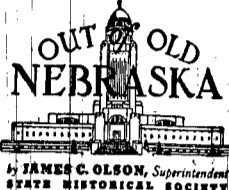

south out of Gering to the foot of Wild Cat Hills, turning west and following the road leading to Wild Cat Ranch. The monument, erected in 1938 by the American Pioneer Trails Association and the DAR, is just west of the road after you cross the cattle gate.

T. L. Green of Scottsbluff, a member of the State Historical Society's executive board and a leading authority on the history of the region, did much of the basic research required to bring the old fort to light. His reports, published some time ago in Nebraska History, are fascinating examples of historical detective work.

Fort John was a child of Fort Laramie, the West's most important fur trading and military center. The latter, established in 1834 on the Laramie River, not far from its junction with the North Platte, was sold to the government for use as a military post in 1849.

After the American Fur Company had disposed of Fort Laramie, Major Andrew Driggs, one of its principal agents, though not the one who negotiated the sale, spent the winter of 1849-50 in Robidoux Pass, down the Platte.

The new site was well chosen. As Mr. Green points out, Robidoux Pass was thronged each year by thousands of emigrants, and "this continuous encampment of great numbers of emigrants with the pass, with their numerous draft stock consuming all pasturage, must have made a more retired but still accessible location greatly to be desired."

Though the profits from the establishment did not seem to have been all the American Fur Company might have desired, it was the most important trading post in Western Nebraska in the 1850s.

Father DeSmet, the famed Jesuit missionary, visited it, and baptized the half-breed children living in the

vicinity. Prince Paul of Wurttemberg, a widely-known European traveler, spent several days at the post.

We do not know just when Fort John was abandoned. It probably passed out of existence as the bulk of overland emigration shifted from Robidoux to Mitchell Pass, thus leaving the Helvas Canyon site completely out of the mainstream of western traffic.

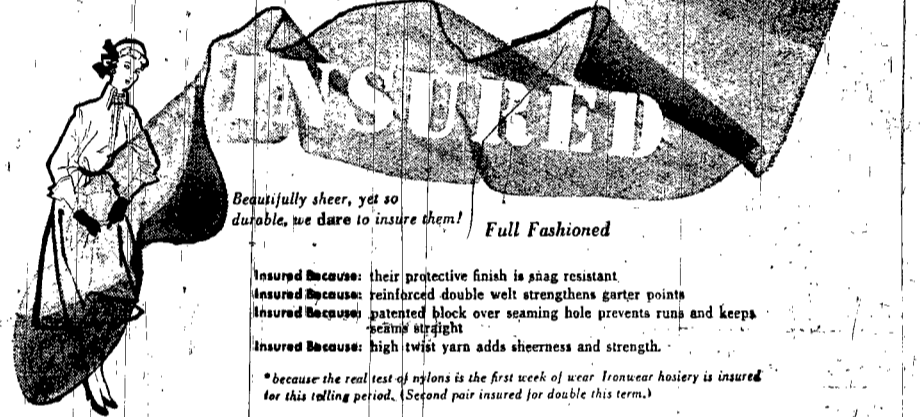

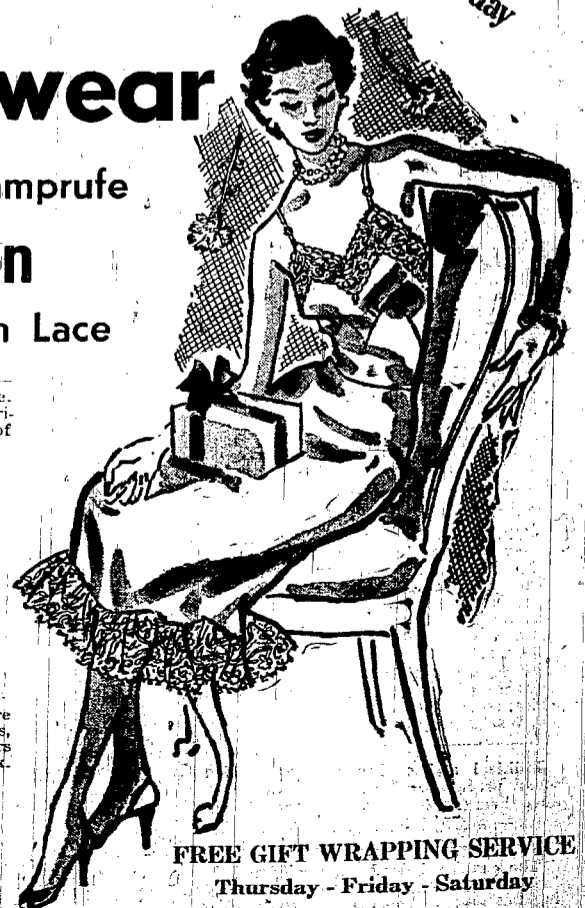

Individual Courage

General MacArthur's testimony to congressional members last week lashed out at foreign policy theories in both political parties. Although directing his attack to the general administration policies, the general denounced the plan advocated by Herbert Hoover which would withdraw our defenses to our own shores.

MacArthur has a specific cause and he is solidly supporting his cause without sparing individual feelings or aligning himself with one particular side of the political battle. By his stand, the general has revealed great courage.

MacArthur is obviously sincere in his disavowal of political ambitions. This fact enables him to state his views without first asking himself "will this offend my colleagues or harm my political career?"

One of the most precious things about this country is every man's right to express his own personal opinion on any subject without fear of punishment or retribution.

Community Efforts

The annual clean-up, paint-up, fix-up campaign in Wayne is intended as an organized effort on the part of all residents to assist in maintaining the city's reputation for cleanliness.

The overall appearance of the community depends on how well individual homes and buildings are kept looking good. It takes only a few lax people to offset the conscientious efforts of many townspeople.

People who have a pride in their homes and community also are proud of their nation, which in these days is extremely important. Although keeping a city clean seems a small task in comparison to the world-wide struggle against Communism.

Mr. Jefferson was a strong supporter of republican government. He championed the sovereignty of the people. He believed in freedom of thought and speech. He preached economy in government and small public debt.

The country indeed faces a dismal future. The program is not to curtail spending but only to choose between whether to get the money by borrowing or by taxation.

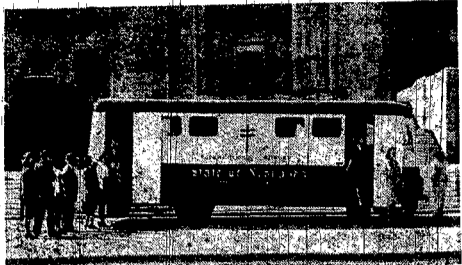

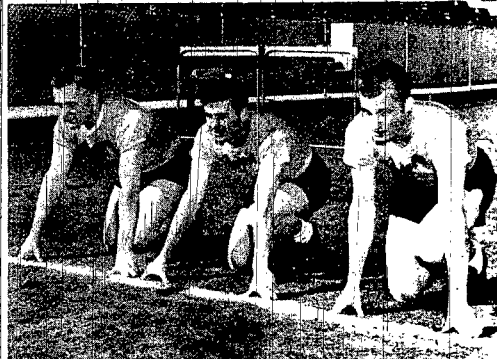

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Eight Records Broken at Husker Conference Meet

Records fell with abandon Monday as Wisner copped the annual Husker conference track meet at Norfolk. Eight league marks were broken. Wayne High cindermen finished fourth in the meet with Wakefield in the fifth spot.

Marvin Goshorn of Wayne set one record by running the mile in 4:59.1. This bettered the old mark of 5:05.2 set by Neidig of Madison in 1948. Victor Knesche of Wayne copped the discus title with a toss of 125 feet, 7 1/2 inches. Warren Price won the low hurdles in 22.5. This bettered the old record of 22.6 set by Onlund of Stanton in 1950 but Swoboda of Pender had run his preliminary heat in 22.4 earlier in the day.

Ratko of Wisner set another mark in the 10 when he toured the quarter mile in 54.4. Peterson of Neb. set a record in the half-mile standard in a 2:46.6 performance. Orr of Lyons bested the 120-yard high hurdle marks with a 16.5 effort. He cracked the mark he had held jointly with Don Tietgen of Wayne.

Shawn of Wisner tied the 100-yard dash record at 17.1. Kinsch of Wayne was third in the shot put.
