## County Farm Value Is Up \$10,000

Wayne county had 1,475 farms as of census time last year, a census bureau report disclosed this week, as compared with 1,410 farms in 1945.

The average value of land and building on each farm increased from \$17,926 in 1945 to \$27,982 in 1950, an increase of \$10,056.

Of the 1950 farms, 1,187 had telephones (1,067 in 1945), 1,394 had electricity (771 in 1945), 1,288 had electric washing machines, 135 had milking machines, 240 had grain combines and 789 had corn pickers.

There were 593 farms with motor trucks (230 in 1945), 1,259 with tractors (1,183 in 1945) and 1,368 with automobiles (1,327 in 1945).

The total value of farm products sold in Wayne county increased from \$9,498,875 in 1944 to \$15,609,996 in 1949. There were 412 farms in the county whose net marketing in 1949 amounted to more than \$10,000. Sale of live stock and livestock products accounted for \$13,681,103 of the total farm product sales.

The average distance from the farm to the usual trading center was seven miles, of which 2.1 miles represented dirt or unimproved roads.

## Calf Sales Here Bring Good Results

A crowd estimated to be the largest ever assembled in the series attended the annual Wisconsin dairy calf sale at Wayne sale barn Thursday night.

Eighty animals consisting of Holsteins, Guernseys, Shorthorns and Swiss were included in the sale. Top price was brought by a Brown Swiss at \$150.

All calves carried a guarantee against death for 21 days. According to sales records, half of the buyers at Thursday night's auction had previously purchased calves at the annual sale.

The event is sponsored by Wayne Chamber of Commerce. Members of the committee went to Wisconsin to purchase the stock.

## Dr. Morey Is 'Improving' After Suffering Stroke

Dr. Victor P. Morey, president of Wayne State Teachers college has shown "marked improvement" up to noon Wednesday, according to the attending physician. His condition, however, is listed as "serious."

Dr. Morey was stricken Monday evening at Wakefield while he was addressing a Brotherhood meeting at Salem Lutheran church. He suffered a cerebral hemorrhage and was in "serious" condition until late Tuesday when he was reported "resting quietly."

The attack came when Dr. Morey was nearing the end of his address. He was taken immediately to a Wakefield hospital, where he regained consciousness early Tuesday morning.

Mrs. Morey and three children, Barbara, Vern and Lawrence, Wayne State students, were taken to Wakefield Monday night. Members of the college faculty were also able to see Dr. Morey late Monday.

The address at Wakefield was one of several Dr. Morey was scheduled to give this week. He planned to speak to high school commencement groups and at a Memorial Day ceremony next week.

Dr. Morey has been president of Wayne State college since 1946. He received Bachelor of Science and Master of Science degrees at Kansas State college and Doctor of Philosophy at University of Nebraska.

He was appointed vice president of the Nebraska council on teacher education last week in Lincoln and was elected president of Nebraska Schoolmasters association.

## Kiwanis Speaker Monday Calls Beef Roll-Back "Absolutely Unnecessary"

Effect of the government's roll-back order to the beef industry was the subject of a talk by Fred Scherer, president of the Nebraska division of the Kiwanis Feeders' association, before the Wayne Kiwanis club Monday afternoon at Hotel Morrison.

Mr. Scherer, former of Lincoln, a member of the U.S. House of Representatives in 1911, an advisor to the U.S. Navy in the past six weeks while the roll-back order has been under discussion.

As a member of the feeders' association, Mr. Scherer protested the roll-back order.

"The order means a reduction of 15 per cent of the beef's properties," he declared. "It cannot be put in lower prices, but rather transfers the price squeeze from the packer to the feeder."

Mr. Scherer pointed out that the government restriction particularly hits the feeder who has restocked his farm since last December when the first controls were laid down. He cited the meat industry's lack of preparation for so severe a government action.

"Controls in the beef industry are absolutely unnecessary," the speaker emphasized. "Mr. DeSalle bypassed authority and the recommendations of his advisory board in securing the authorization of the order from President Truman."

Results of the roll-back will not be evident for two or three years, Mr. Scherer stated. He then predicted a shortage of meat for the consumer because of the well-planned program necessary for proper beef production. He believes that the order will force feeders to re-equip their herds and thus wipe out any increased production which the government has hoped for.

Mr. Scherer argued that with meat production at an all-time high government might have been better off by leaving the industry to take its own course.

"The law of supply and demand would take care of prices," he concluded. He added that prices will not drop for the consumer under the roll-back order. He predicted that "black market" activities would eventually leave the small income families with a severe meat shortage.

In discussing activities of the feeders groups, Mr. Scherer said that hearings before congressional committees are now being sought in an effort to secure a more positive solution to the problem.

Increased public interest in government and restoration of democracy to its real meaning were also urged by the speaker. He cited the general confusion of the country as a basis for the need of such policies.
