Small Grain Crop Hit By Weather

Wayne State Summer Session Begins Tuesday; Registration Remains High Full Program Is Scheduled

Summer session at Wayne State Teachers college will get underway Monday, June 4, with the registration of new students and former students who were not enrolled last semester. Students in school during the spring pre-registered early in May.

Classes will convene on Tuesday, and the daily schedule will start at 7:00 a.m. instead of 8:00 a.m. during the regular year.

On the basis of the number of room reservations and the pre-arrangements it appears that this summer's enrollment may be greater than last year's total of 821, Milton B. Childs, registrar of the college, said.

A series of conferences and workshops are slated for the summer program, including special study in school law, health education, problems in guidance, school public relations, and rural sociology.

Alice Lillegren, speech specialist of the Dr. Louis School for handicapped children, Omaha, will direct the annual clinic for diagnosis and treatment of children with speech defects, August 6 to 22. A camp will be run again this summer for children who attend the clinic and can not stay at home.

The annual Music Camp will be held on the campus from August 5 to 11 under the direction of Russel Anderson, professor of music, and members of his staff. The camp will feature Gerhard Schroth, conductor of the St. Louis Symphony, as guest director. High school students from northeastern Nebraska will gather at Wayne State to participate in individual and group band, orchestral and choral work.

A public concert will be presented by the Music Camp students in the Wayne City auditorium Sunday afternoon, August 12.

The special programs committee of the college, under the chairmanship of Maude Joseph Smith, professor of English, has announced a full summer schedule of visiting artists. Among the programs slated are the Metropolitan Male Quartet, Rounds and Bogart in "Comedy Through the Ages," the Aeolian String Trio, and the Tatterman Marionettes.

The comedy team, Round and Bogart, open the series Thursday evening, June 14, at the college auditorium.

Draft Test Given To 32 College Men

Thirty-two draft-age college men took the selective service college qualification test at Wayne State Saturday, according to Dr. A. H. Price, dean of student personnel at the college and supervisor of the draft test.

The three-hour examination was given at the college administration building, and was open to any man who had made application at his draft board for the test and had indicated that he wished to take it at Wayne State, provided, of course, that he had received the authorizing "ticket of admission" from his draft board.

The tests were mailed to the education testing service at Princeton, N. J., and the results of the tests will be sent to the home draft boards of the men taking the tests.

Tests were given at 17 other schools and colleges throughout Nebraska, and are scheduled to be given again June 16, June 30 and July 13.

Decisions will be granted by the local draft boards to students who, in the opinion of the board, will serve best in the college classroom. Action by the boards will not begin until all students in the county receive their test marks. Students can check results of their tests at local draft boards.

Despite the late season, Wayne county farmers are generally ahead by the rest of the state according to reported received by The Herald Tuesday night. County farmers said about 90 per cent of the corn in the county was in by that time. This is nearly twice as high as the 45 per cent reported for the state as a whole.

Small grain crops in the north half of the county were the hardest hit by the inclement weather. Farmers north of Wayne in Dixon county reported they were forced to cut the intended acreage on oats and other small grains because of the late season. In the south, most farms succeeded in planting the amount planned.

Generally, farmers were scheduled to be busy Memorial day finishing the corn planting throughout the county. All of the work should be done by the end of the week if the favorable weather continues.

Here are some on-the-spot reports from Wayne county farmers: One Corbit, Hunter township, Mr. Corbit finished his corn planting Tuesday. Most farmers in the area were nearly through. Remaining 10 per cent should be finished this week.

Albert Watson, Wilbur township—Some farmers in this area already done. Mr. Watson planned to finish this week on his two farms, one of them in Cedar county.

Don Beckenbauer, Dixon county—About 90 per cent of planting in area completed. Mr. Beckenbauer was one of the first to finish. He got the job done a week ago.

Keith Reed, Wilbur township—Just finished 190 acres of corn Tuesday. This compares with 110 acres in 1950. Most farmers in the area done. Some got small grain in but not as much as usual.

Wayne Gilliland, Strahan township—Most farmers in this area got in their planned small grain although the bottoms were too wet for anything but corn. About 80 per cent of the work is completed. The remaining bottom land should be finished this week.

Henry Hoffman, Wilbur township—Mr. Hoffman is finished with his corn planting. He got down 50 acres in corn and about 45 acres in small grain. About 90 percent of farmers in area have completed planting.

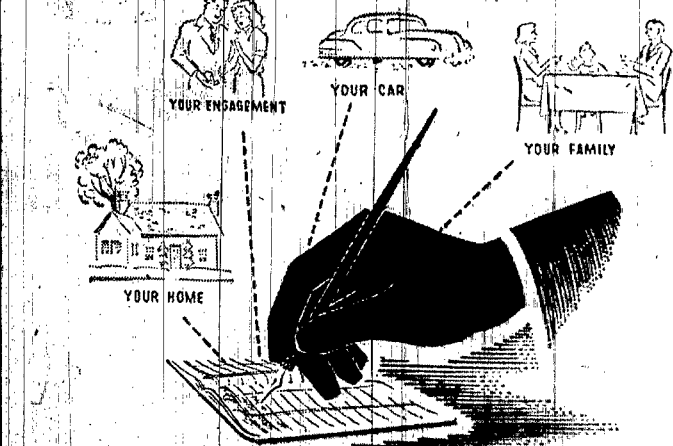

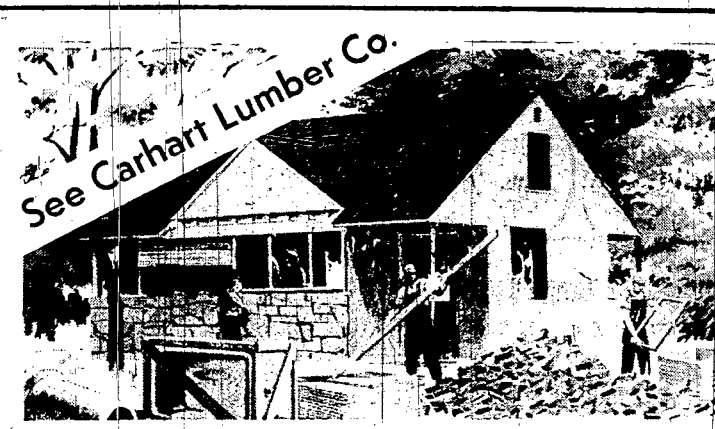

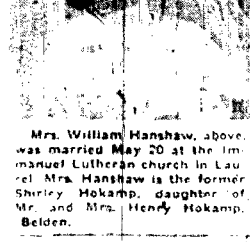

That is the way it reads in his Kiwanis classification. To men on the outside that is all it means, but to us on the inside, the name of Dr. Morey means much more. Much more in fact, than those who know him best can say.

We respect him as a good man, we use "good" not in a general sense, but in the specific it implies. His ideals were lofty. He had a high sense of the worth of man and of the nobility of good conduct. This he inculcated and exemplified. He was lenient with the wayward and the unfortunate, but he was unyielding in the inigate and was a transgressor. He stood for things of worth and preached to all with a gospel of honesty, industry and independence.

He was a large man, not merely in his physique, but in his spirit. While his presence commanded our attention, his demeanor demanded our respect and his kindness won our affections. He was a valued citizen. He loved his home, his church and his college. He took a keen interest in civic and community affairs. He weighed carefully every issue that might affect his college. He supported the cause of the common man against the counting and the unscrupulous. He served his country in the hour of its greatest war in such a position where his talents would count most.

He was an excellent educator. He had an open mind. He loved to go on quest for a new idea. He had the discretion to sift grains of learning for a mass of inconsequential chaff. He was at home with good books. He was a patron of the fine arts. He was an expert in educational techniques. He was a leader in administration. He made his decisions slowly. His judgment was refined.

Wayne county is in the 9th judicial district which has two district judges and in each county a clerk of the district court. The district court is a higher court than the county court and offers people of the county a type of justice not obtainable in lesser courts, such as divorces, real estate partition actions, quiet title actions, equity (justice) cases involving settlements of over \$1,000, and criminal cases.

The clerk of the district court in Wayne county handles the business of that court and keeps custody of all files and records having to do with district court proceedings.

He is entrusted with keeping records of all cases that are tried in the district court. Among the clerk's duties is that of keeping up-to-date records of available jurors to be notified for jury duty. The clerk and the county sheriff select a list of 24 prospective jury men and women from 80 names submitted by the county board of commissioners. These are kept in readiness and the persons are notified of pending jury duty by the clerk, when so instructed by the district judge.

Clerk of the district court acts as treasurer of all fees involved in carrying out the court's business and proceedings. He is responsible for issuing all processes of the court such as summons, subpoenas etc., which are usually served by the county sheriff.

A great deal of the clerk's duties are routine tasks that involve keeping accurate records and files. As an example, he is entrusted with recording quiet title actions which are cases for the purpose of eliminating questions as to the validity of certain property titles. These records are lengthy and require extensive research and paper work, they must be accurate and as complete as possible.

In addition to his many recording responsibilities, the clerk serves as ex-officio member of the insanity board. As such he is responsible for carrying out investigations and prosecution proceedings concerning insanity cases. Other members of the insanity board are the physician, Dr. Roy Madsen and the attorney of the board of health, L. W. Ellis.

Dave Hamer has lived in Wayne county since coming here from Wales in 1913. He has served in the office of clerk of the district court since 1943. He is presently serving a third term in the office.

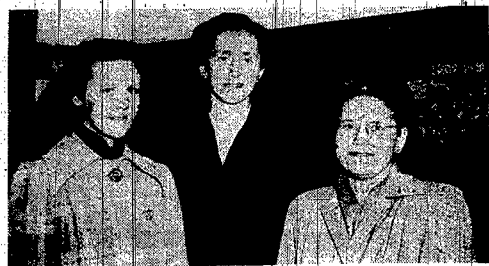
