Center-Line Striping Is Now Started

The center-line striping program of the state highway department is now underway and J. E. Johnston, traffic engineer of the department, asks that motorists cooperate by avoiding the striping paint while it is fresh.

Johnston said that wherever striping is done advance warning signs are put up to caution motorists. He requested drivers to keep to the right of the highway and to go slow after passing such signs.

The traffic engineer declared that center-line striping and no-passing zone striping are necessary for safety sake. He said that it costs the taxpayers nearly \$30 a mile for such striping and that the cost would be lower if a few motorists didn't intentionally cross the lines while the paint is wet.

Not a Gamble

A resident of York, Neb., takes issue with the often repeated statement that "farming is a gamble." In a recent letter to the press, Nat R. Simmons writes: "Because the results of farm operations seem to depend upon the fickleness of weather, this element of uncertainty has been used to compare it with a reprehensible occupation without considering the vital difference in principle between the reward of honest achievement which benefits the farmer by supplying the needs of all, and gambling which not only deprives others of all it gets, but supports by its profits all other forms of organized crime. Moreover, the element of uncertainty in farming, which is only temporary and local, disappears over a long period of time and over a world wide area. Since the beginning of history the earth never has failed to supply the food and clothing necessary to preserve its inhabitants."

Need for Change

"The internal malady of the Truman administration goes deep. It is partly the rot resulting from one party's being too long in power. It is fostered by the fact that the Democratic power rests too largely in the North on court city machines and in the South on courthouse coteries and one-party traditionalism. Mr. Truman is vulnerable to the influences of both groups. But he has an obligation to rise above such things in this crisis to lift the whole moral tone of Washington." Thus the Christian Science Monitor, a non-partisan newspaper, writes editorially.

Unfortunately for our country's welfare, Mr. Truman has thus far not risen above such things. His allegiance to party groups and patronage, his stubborn disregard for suggestions and criticisms of Republicans and even members of his own party reveal in him a lack of the qualities necessary for sound leadership. Americans do not want a president immune to human feelings and frailties, but emotional outbursts and petty quarrels have no place in the White House. There have been times when the president's actions have shown higher ideals than political grandstanding, but in these times all decisions must be made with sound judgement and diplomacy. Indications are that Mr. Truman is not big enough to rise above the detrimental influences surrounding him. The moral tone of Washington and the nation will not be lifted until changes have been made either in the caliber of our leadership or in the leadership itself.

More or Less

Those new luminous house markers being sold in Wayne by Boy and Girl Scouts should eliminate a lot of night flashlight prowling and unnecessary inquiries. Not many houses have good clear numbers, and it proves quite a nuisance to persons looking for an unfamiliar address. It's especially a handicap to doctors and firemen, who are often in a hurry to find particular homes. . . . Home extension clubs in Lancaster county have started a project to improve the appearance of farmers' mail boxes with new paint, re-lettering and solid posts. Wouldn't it be a bad idea for every farm to have a neat and legible mail box to let people know who lives there. . . . It's pretty discouraging to see people in southeastern Nebraska have to dig out from disastrous floods again. There's a rugged persistence about those people, though, that keeps them going in spite of such setbacks. They start right in clearing up the mess, salvage what they can and hope that next year won't be so bad. . . . Wayne has been chosen for a great many district and area meetings, banquets and shows in recent months. A lot of people believe it's just a coincidence that so many groups decided to come here—actually it has required a good deal of enthusiastic promotion and hospitality on the part of Wayne business and professional people, to make Wayne attractive to these groups. They will come again because they are receiving the right kind of reception and treatment. It all helps to make the city better known and well liked.

No More Scalps

As though government taxes are not taking enough from the income of the people, the state of Pennsylvania is now considering another method to dig deeper into the pockets of its citizens. A bill in the Pennsylvania house of representatives last week called for repeal of the existing law providing for "payment of bounties for Indian scalps by the commonwealth or any political subdivision."

Wayne Extension Agent Aids Agricultural Groups in County

Fortified with a college degree in agriculture and an extensive background of agricultural experience, the county extension agent acts as an instructor and educator for people in the county. In the field of agriculture his office is the center of national and state information and instruction. As a representative of the college of agriculture, he is instructed with bringing to the people of the county facts concerning latest developments and progress involving all phases of agricultural work.

The county agent works with persons in all age groups; his job is a family affair and he has information of value to all members of the family, which includes extensive help to homemakers (Wayne county will have a Home Extension Agent soon, who will be associated with the county extension office.)

Most of the county agent's service takes in working with various organizations in the county such as livestock breed associations, weed control districts, crop improvement associations, 4-H clubs and women's project clubs. His work is not confined just to the giving of information; the extension agent works with these people on practical and workable projects, such as tours, field days, demonstration plots, etc. Although he has an office in the court house, a great deal

of his important work is done in the field. Latest bulletins The agent is regularly supplied with bulletins from the state college of agriculture giving information covering all fields of agriculture and homemaking. This up-to-

date information is available for free distribution by the agent to all persons interested. The agent's office secretary keeps accurate files of all such material for immediate reference. According to Mr. Ingalls, a great deal of these bulletins apply to this area and age of current

interest to many people in the county.

The county extension agent, as a representative-instructor of the college of agriculture, is not an elected county official. His selection is made by a Wayne county Extension Service Board from a number of voluntary candidates chosen by the college of agriculture extension director's office. The county extension service board consists of a member from each of 13 precincts, chairman of women's extension clubs and chairman of 4-H county committee.

Federal and state funds, allotted to the college are used for the agent's salary. The county is obligated to supply the agent with an office, clerical help, supplies and traveling expenses, and may voluntarily supplement his wages.

The extension agent chosen for Wayne county is required to have had previous experience in extension work. Mr. Ingalls previously served as extension agent at Greeley for two years and at Harrison for five years.

The agent takes active interest in 4-H members in the county. To date the county has 22 clubs with 250 active members. The youths are helped to choose constructive projects and carry them out. There are 12 women's project clubs in the county with which the extension agent works. Active members number 165.

His work is not confined to farm people, however. According to Mr. Ingalls, persons living in towns who have need of information of help concerning horticulture problems or homemaking may avail themselves of the instruction his office has to offer.

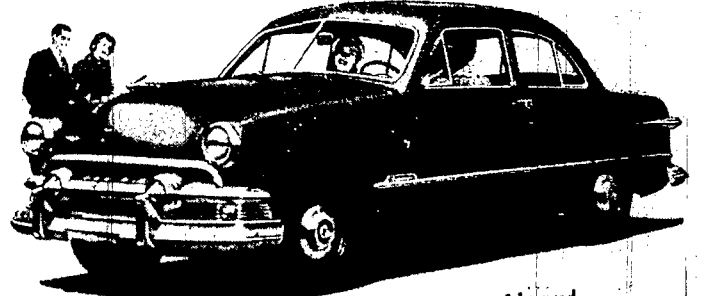

State X-ray Unit To Give Free Chest Examination June 8

The X-ray unit of the Nebraska State Health department will be in Concord June 8 and Dixon June 11 to give free chest X-rays to residents.

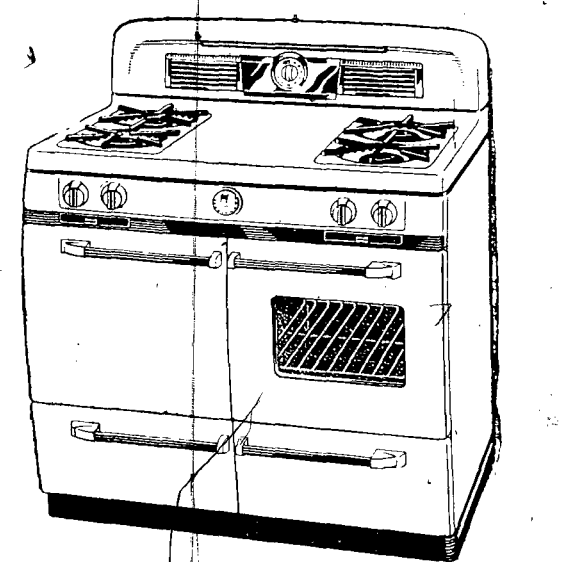

Plastic Hose Can Aid Farm Water Works

Easily portable plastic tubing or hose is being suggested this spring by agricultural engineers as a means of getting water out to temporary waterers for livestock on pasture and for poultry on range.
 The plastic material is more durable than garden hose and much more portable than galvanized steel pipe. Since it is expected to be more readily available this spring than galvanized pipe, the plastic tubing could solve watering problems for a good many livestock and poultry raisers.
 The tubing of hose may be left on top of the ground or buried. Freezing won't damage it, although adapters for connecting the hose to a waterer might not stand freezing. Sunlight and heat have little effect on it.
 The best bet is to leave it on top of the ground, if protected, where the tubing crosses farm roads. A good way is to lay it alongside a fence where it will be out of the way and shaded by grass growing along the fence row. It's much more portable when left on top of the ground and requires less labor for installing it than if buried in a furrow.
 The plastic hose or tubing has special advantages for farm tenants. They can lay it down in the spring, roll it up in the fall and take it with them if they have to move.
 The material comes in different diameter sizes with 1-2 or 3-4 inch most practical for farm use. The material can be cut to any length desired. Joints and couplings are available as are adapters for hooking it onto waterers and water systems.
 Made by several manufacturers, the tubing will withstand pressures up around 200 pounds per square inch, depending on the wall thickness. Most farm water systems maintain around 40 pounds pressure.

Treated Oats Not Safe To Feed Animals

The late spring has probably resulted in many farmers having seed oats left in their barns. The late planting forced many to sow these seed oats, according to veterinarians. Treated oats should not be fed to livestock.
 The treating compound contains about four percent of available metallic mercury. Continuous feeding of this to livestock may result in enough mercury accumulating in the animal's body to cause poisoning.
 Cattle are the most sensitive to mercury, but hogs and sheep may also be affected. Common symptoms of poisoning are marked depression, refusal to eat, scouring and weakness with eventual paralysis.
 If farmers do not wish to carry treated oats over for seeding next year and want to take a chance on feeding them, it is recommended they be mixed with untreated ones. A reasonably safe mixture is one bushel of treated oats to five bushels of untreated ones.
 Farmers should keep a watchful eye on livestock receiving this mixture, though, and the feed should be discontinued if any signs of poisoning appear. The local veterinarian should be called to prescribe treatment for affected animals.
