LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 470 RELATING TO FEDERAL OLD AGE AND SURVIVORS INSURANCE

An ordinance relating to the Federal Old Age and Survivors Insurance System established by Title II of the Social Security Act and designated Public Law 734 (8133 Congress, 2nd Session) cited as the "Social Security Act Amendments of 1950" and accepting on behalf of the city of Wayne, Nebraska, its officers, appointees and employees, except as specifically excluded herein, their dependents and survivors, the provisions, benefits and protection of such act and subsequent amendments thereto; authorizing the Mayor of this city to make and enter into the required agreements with the administrator of said system for the State of Nebraska, or such other state agency for the purpose as may be hereafter designated or created, to bring such eligibles within the provisions and benefits of said system; providing that such agreement shall be retroactive to January 1, 1951; providing for withholdings from the salaries and wages of eligible officials, appointees and employees of the Social Security Fund herein created; providing for the segregation of such fund, contributions thereto by the municipality and the payment of such fund from time to time to the state administrator as may be required by state or federal law or pertinent regulations; excluding from the provisions of this act such officials, appointees or employees as are covered by other municipal retirement or pension plans to the extent required by state or federal law; providing for the levy of a tax in addition to all other taxes in order to defray the cost of this city in meeting the obligation arising by reason of the agreement or agreements aforesaid; providing a saving clause in case of the invalidity of any section or portion of this ordinance; repealing all ordinances in conflict herewith and providing an effective date for this act.

determined to be within and entitled to the benefits and protection of said system.

Section 4: The following employees are hereby determined to be excluded by the terms of this ordinance from participation in said system:

(a) Any employee whose services on the effective date hereof are covered by an existing municipal retirement or pension system, or authorized to be so covered by general law.

(b) Any employee with respect to any position not authorized for coverage by applicable state or federal laws or regulations of the federal administrative agency.

Section 5: Withholdings from the compensation of eligible employees of this city as found and determined by Sections 3 and 4 hereof are hereby authorized, and the city shall impose upon such employees as to services covered by this ordinance such withholdings to be made in amounts and at such times as may be required by general law, state or federal, and applicable regulations promulgated by the federal administrative agency.

Section 6: There is hereby created, and the city treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to set up an account to be known as the "Social Security Fund", into which the withholdings authorized by Section 5 hereof shall be paid; also the proceeds from the tax levy as hereinafter authorized, together with any appropriations from available funds that might be made from time to time by municipal authority for the benefit of said fund. Said fund shall be kept segregated and shall be used for no other purposes than the provisions and obligations of this act as hereinafter provided to be accomplished by such fund.

Section 7: The moneys in the

Federal Security Fund addressed shall be paid over to the Tax Commission designated by law as the administrator of the Social Security Act for the State of Nebraska, as authorized and provided by regulations promulgated by that body by such administrator.

Section 8: The city treasurer and this city shall keep such records and make such reports relevant to the administration of the Social Security Act as may be required by general law, state or federal, or as provided by regulations promulgated by either the state or federal administrator of the system.

Section 9: The Mayor and Council shall levy a tax in addition to all other taxes, not to exceed 1.00 mills upon the dollar of the actual value of real and personal property in this city in order to defray the cost of the city in meeting the obligations arising by reason of the contracts, agreements or stipulations authorized under Section 2 hereof; provided the revenue raised by such special levy shall be used for no other purpose.

Section 10: If any provision of this ordinance, or any section or portion thereof, or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held to be invalid, the remainder of the ordinance and the application of such provisions, section or sections to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

Section 11: Any ordinances or parts of ordinances, or contracts heretofore authorized, together with any appropriations from available funds that might be made from time to time by municipal authority for the benefit of said fund, shall be null and void, and shall be deemed to have been repealed and annulled by this ordinance, effective as of the date of its passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

Plenty of Headaches

One grave defect of the government's present price control program is that the Office of Price Stabilization has so far failed to authorize the appointment of an advisory committee composed of retail representatives. The OPS appears to believe retailers are too insignificant to justify such a committee.

What this amounts to is that, so far as price control is concerned, we have government without representation of the governed. There are more than 3,000,000 retail outlets in this country—Wayne and the surrounding communities have a small part of this number. They are all kinds and sizes, from the biggest chain to the smallest one-man shop.

It seems inconceivable that the retailers have no official method of making their problems known to price control officials. Unless the retailers can and do obey the regulations the whole program is doomed to failure.

Any price control program should invite the official participation of all concerned—and that means producers, manufacturers, retailers and consumers.

The retail merchant who wants to be a law-abiding citizen has been suffering from a series of headaches in recent months. These are the result of various OPS orders which have been next to impossible to follow.

OPS, faced with a wave of protests from retailers, has changed some of its orders, and additional changes will be made. But the situation is one more example of the confusion and waste which is inevitable when government dictates to business.

In some instances, OPS policies have been definitely unfair to retailing, in that they do not permit retailers to add to their selling prices increases in wholesale and operating costs.

OPS has a great deal to learn. It is to be hoped it learns the lessons, fast and applies them without delay. Otherwise the national economy will be seriously weakened.

Proud Father

General MacArthur best expressed the sentiment of Father's Day when he said: "By profession, I am a soldier and take pride in that fact. But I am prouder, infinitely prouder, to be a father. A soldier destroys in order to build. The father only builds, never destroys. The father only creates and life. And while the hordes of death are mighty, the battalions of life are mightier still."

The two-party system is a great thing in a democracy, but there are times when the two-party principle can be carried too far. That is the sorry circumstance today.

Treasurer's Job Is to Collect, Distribute and Disburse Taxes

As we have seen, the county assessor is responsible for compiling and recording list of taxable property in the county. After such tax lists are completed by the assessor they are certified to the county treasurer for collection.

The county treasurer, then, is responsible for collection, distribution and disbursement of all personal, real estate, motor vehicle and special taxes in Wayne county.

He is liable for all amounts certified to him on the tax lists. He must collect these taxes and take measures to see that all amounts are accounted for. On all delinquent personal taxes the treasurer issues distress warrants in accordance with the statutes. These warrants are served by the county sheriff. On delinquent real estate the treasurer puts the property up for sale by advertising in the legal newspaper. The property is then sold and funds are applied for taxes due.

The treasurer's distribution job consists of dividing tax collections and crediting various state, county and municipal funds.
After a tax receipt has been written the treasurer's office must carry out more than 20 separate major tasks in each receipt before its amount is credited to its funds. Since there are more than 6,000 taxpayers in the county, a great deal of the office work is routine of this kind.

Special taxes collected at the treasurer's office collect all special taxes for cities and villages and credits their funds. It is worth noting that fees earned by the treasurer's office in caring for special records more than cover the combined annual salaries of the county treasurer and his office staff.

As agent for the state, the treasurer issues all Wayne county motor vehicle and drivers licenses for Nebraska. During the license period more than 500 individual licenses were issued by the office in one day.
All fees from various county offices are remitted to the treasurer's office together with state assistance funds. Miscellaneous receipts are issued and their funds credited by the treasurer.

Accurate records must be maintained of each fund and all balances must be exact to the penny.
The treasurer is responsible for all school district fund collections in the county. At present there are 85 separate school districts.

The treasurer's duty of disbursement consists in paying out moneys from various funds by approval of the county board of commissioners on warrants issued from the office of the county clerk. No money can be disbursed by the treasurer without official warrant or school order.

This office has charge of payment of bond and interest on any bonded indebtedness in Wayne county.
The treasurer is personally liable for all funds in his possession and is under a surety bond. He must designate bank depositories by approval of the county board. Depository banks must deposit government bonds in the Federal Reserve banks for protection of the county's money. It is the duty of the treasurer to keep all bank balances in proportion to their pledged securities.

The county treasurer must work in close cooperation with other county officials such as the county clerk, commissioners, sheriff and assessor.
Wayne county treasurer, Jean Boyd, is currently serving his third term in the office. He has lived in Wayne county for 25 years.

His office staff comprise Leona Bahde, deputy; Doris Meyer and Cleo Shufelt, clerks.
Miss Bahde was appointed to her position by the treasurer on approval by the county commissioners. She works under a surety bond and has charge of the treasurer's office during his absence. Some of her duties include posting all receipts on cash book, posting all disbursements, posting auto licenses and caring for bond payments.
Miss Meyer, among other duties, has charge of checking all tax receipts and crediting tax lists. Miss Shufelt performs such tasks as caring for motor vehicle and drivers license files.

All members of the office staff are trained to carry out routine functions involved in regular office business.

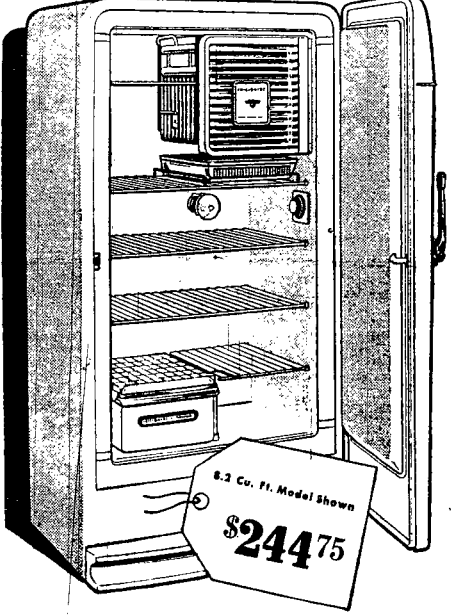

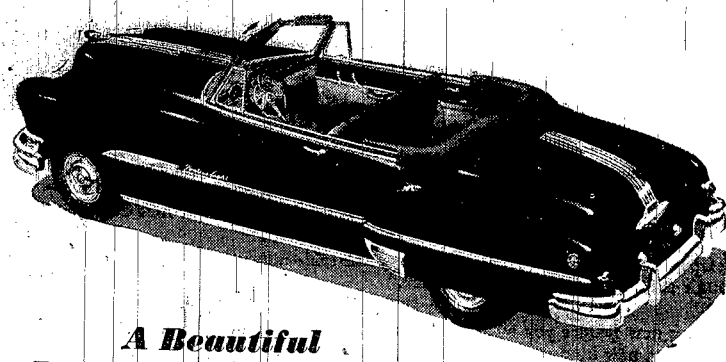

Ask Drivers To Help Curb Highway Kill

State drivers have been asked to "Give Wildlife the Brake" by the Nebraska game commission in an effort to curb the increase of accidental highway kill of game birds and animals throughout most of the state.

Conservation officer Sam Gracknick reported counting 50 dead pheasant on highway 6 between Minden and Holdrege, a distance of only 23 miles. With the appearance of hen pheasants and their broods the kill is expected to climb. Broods will appear along Nebraska highways until late September.

Actually, when a hen pheasant is accidentally killed, the toll doesn't stand at one but more often at five, six or even seven birds. A hen pheasant raises one brood a year averaging about six pheasants.

So slow down and "Give Wildlife the Brake." Who knows, the bird you might have avoided killing might have helped to fill your bag this fall.

Too Many Weeds Planted with Grain

Farmers are planting too many weed seeds with their small grain without realizing it, say agronomists at the University of Nebraska.

Out of 110 samples of oats taken from farmer's grain drills in the field 71 per cent contained primary or secondary noxious weed seeds. Bindweed is an example of a primary noxious weed and penny cress is an example of a secondary variety.

The crop experts who made the survey said the average number of weed seeds in the uncertified samples of oats was 79 per pound. In the certified seed samples there was an average of only two weed seeds per pound.

Cooperating on the survey were the Nebraska Crop Improvement association, the Nebraska Grain Improvement association, the state division of noxious weeds and the University agriculture Extension Service.

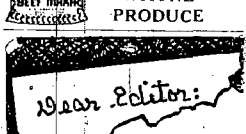
Grass Run-offs Help Preserve Soil

This spring has brought much moisture and several of the rains have come in quantities to give run-off according to Dixon county soil conservation office. Water that has to run off usually carries away the good soil with it unless it is filtered and caused to travel slowly by means of a good heavy stand of grass like bromo grass.

Run-off water seeks to congregate and form a run-off channel. This channel may become a deep gully or an unsightly scarred piece of wasteland. The sad part is, if this run-off is permitted or helped by plowing in the waterway, the time may come when the inconvenience of farming around gullies will be necessary.

But by properly preparing for run-off water by making a wide, shallow waterway where the water wants to run, and grassing this basin or channel with a grass like bromo grass, which develops a heavy root system, many gullies can be guarded against or prevented.

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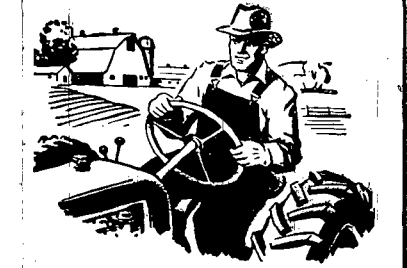
