Council Planning City Fogging Project

Wayne city council agreed Tuesday to go ahead with plans for insect spraying of Wayne.

In response to many complaints about troublesome insects in the community, the city will make use of the same spraying methods employed last year.

The unusually wet spring has brought about the insect nuisance. A fogging machine used by the city makes use of DDT chemicals for slow, sure killing of insects and a faster-acting ingredient for immediate knock-out action.

The machines work on the same principle as some of the smoke screen equipment used by the army. A bottle-gas burner heats the vaporized insect killing chemical, the chemical expands, then it is mixed with the truck exhaust and blows out the exhaust pipe.

Ideal times to spray are when there is high humidity, light breezes and no rising air-currents.

No specific days as yet have been scheduled for the spraying.

In other action of the evening the council granted a building permit to M. B. Street and passed city ordinance 471 having to do with this year's tax levy. Total levy will be approximately the same as that of last year.

Weather Has Checked Crop Insect Loss

Farmers in the Wayne area won't be bothered more than normally by insect pests this year, University of Nebraska Entomologist Dr. Harold Ball reported this week.

He offered the following information on the present insect situation.

Corn Borers—Corn generally is not tall enough for borers to thrive. This presents a better outlook than last season. Infestation will depend upon weather.

Corn Rootworm—Damage hard to predict because infestation appears late in summer. No reason to believe damage will be worse than last year.

Grasshopper—Freezing and cold weather killed a lot of hoppers. The hatching area—where they did develop—development of pest in hay crops, but better weather could result in decided advance.

Alfalfa Insects—Surveys and checks reveal number about normal, possibly a little below.

Council Planning City Fogging Project

Wayne city council agreed Tuesday to go ahead with plans for insect spraying of Wayne.

In response to many complaints about troublesome insects in the community, the city will make use of the same spraying methods employed last year.

The unusually wet spring has brought about the insect nuisance. A fogging machine used by the city makes use of DDT chemicals for slow, sure killing of insects and a faster-acting ingredient for immediate knock-out action.

The machine works on the same principle as some of the smoke screens used by the army. A bottle-gas burner heats the vaporized insect killing chemical, the chemical expands, then it is mixed with the truck exhaust and blows out the exhaust pipe.

Ideal times to spray are when there is high humidity, light breezes and no rising air-currents.

No specific days as yet have been scheduled for the spraying.

In other action of the evening the council granted a building permit to M. B. Street and passed city ordinance 471 having to do with this year's tax levy. Total levy will be approximately the same as that of last year.

Weather Has Checked Crop Insect Loss

Farmers in the Wayne area won't be bothered more than normally by insect pests this year. University of Nebraska Entomologist Dr. Harold Ball reported this week.

He offered the following information on the present insect situation:

Corn Borer. Corn generally is not tall enough for borers to thrive. This presents a better outlook than last season. Infestation will depend upon weather.

Corn Rootworm. Damage hard to predict because infestation appears late in summer. No reason to believe damage will be worse than last year.

Grasshopper—Freezing and cold weather killed a lot of hoppers in the hatching area. Weather held up development of pest in hay areas, but better weather could result in decided advance.

alfalfa insects — Surveys and checks reveal number about normal, possibly a little below.

Must Apply For School Deferment

Collection Includes Shoe Styles From All Corners Of World

Most people have only two feet to walk on; Mrs. L. W. McNatt would have 450 if she wore all the shoes in her collection. And almost everyone of them is different, some unique and ingeniously crafted.

For instance, there is a 3-inch black metal boot and there are inch-long wedge bedroom slippers besides a tiny pair of high-heeled green reptile pumps. Several pairs of tiny, doekien Indian moccasins have intricate bead work as do the pony-skin Eskimo boots, no higher than two inches.

The late daughter of Mrs. McNatt, Delores, who was Mrs. Roy Boswell, began the collection for her mother at the start of World War II. While Mrs. Boswell was in the woman's marine corps, she collected every novel shoe she found, the first ones being a Mr. and Mrs. knee-high button variety worn 30 years ago, and a delicate china slipper with lace ruffling around the top.

During the war while the caddies were stationed in Wayne, the McNatts became acquainted with and entertained many of the fellows. The lady apparently showed their appreciation for hospitality by sending Mrs. McNatt many additions to her hobby. In this group is a large Persian-type blue and green slipper from Iran, and also a dark blue china one from Virginia Beach.

Another pair which she prizes are the small gold silk satin slippers owned by the woman who wrote the popular song "The Rosary." The 100-year-old glass slipper in the daisy and button pattern is a detailed antique as is the blue hobnail glass slipper with the V-throat and French heel. The English slipper from England has the typical coat of arms on the toe and the clever Christmas shoes have wreaths and poinsettia berries running around the circumference.

A porcelain shoe bank rattles with one penny and there is even a pocket book shoe from Mexico which zips to the top from the toe. There are small red glass slippers and some of plain glass with blue trimming. Several Dutch shoes fill the spacious shelves, those of myrtle wood and hand-carved ones in walnut by C. L. Pickett, Wayne. There is a wooden boot in fine detail which Mrs. Boswell watched being made and there's a Mexican cowboy boot with small hand painting.

In the collection is a humorous pair of black boots from Florida. Besides a blue glass boot also from Florida. The 3-inch pink mountain climber boots contrast with the china one from France with feminine flowers in hand painting. Two cats play around a baby boot, and a mouse peeks out of the top of another while a cat dozes on the side.



There is a toeless pump of pink sandals.

The many sandals are huarachas, Indian moccasins, Japanese sandals, and one with a foot in it, with painted toenails. There are copper and bronze booties, and a Chinese lacquered all-metal shoe. The typical zoot suiter shoe has a turned up toe, and there are others with toes up and toes down. The tiny sandal type bedroom slipper has flowers on the wedge sole.

There is a white boot with a patch on the toe. Around the shoe peeks a cat. One of these with the most finite detail is a small pair of red typical Russian boots complete with socks. The design in the heavy leather sole is fine and the shape is authentic.

Feeders Are Alerted For New Disease

Cattle owners should be on the alert for a dangerous new cattle disease which first appeared in this country seven years ago and appears to be spreading, veterinary authorities said today.

"The disease, leptospirosis, was first diagnosed in Connecticut in 1944, and has now invaded the majority of our best cattle producing states," reports the American Foundation for Animal Health.

One case of the disease was diagnosed by Dr. John Edenburn, Wayne veterinarian, in May. He reported the infected cow has apparently recovered. The case was discovered through analysis of the cows milk.

"Control efforts have been handicapped because symptoms of the disease vary so widely. Sometimes cows may be stricken without the owner knowing it. Sudden illness, loss of appetite, fever, depression and thick milk are all suspicious signs.

"Owners may think that some light cases are only indigestion, since the cow may recover without serious illness. In other cases, however, the disease strikes hard, killing many animals."

Recovered animals may act as disease carriers for a considerable length of time, the report says. Also, owners may confuse the disease with mastitis or anaplasmosis. The only sure way of determining if leptospirosis is present in a herd is through blood tests and isolation of the disease-causing organism.

"If cattle owners suspect an outbreak of the disease, they should obtain a diagnosis immediately. The sooner medical treatment is started, the better the chance of saving the affected animals and preventing the disease from spreading," the Foundation advised.
