Wild Dogs Molest Cattle near Wayne

Cattle owners northwest of Wayne are being plagued by a new type of marauder. Farmers five miles northwest of Wayne have reported wild dogs, have been raising cattle in that vicinity during the night for the past two weeks. Farmers reported at least four of the animals but searches of the area have failed to disclose any hideout of the dogs. Cattle belonging to the Ho-feldt brothers were chased out of the pasture twice, once two miles beyond their home pasture. The cattle were so terrified following the attacks, they began to stampede when dogs from the home place began to bark. Thursday at 4 a. m., Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Florine were awakened by the barking of their dogs. After investigating, they found their cattle being chased around the pasture. The four animals disappeared while Florine drove to the field in his car.

Safety Agent Will Visit City Airport

One or more aviation safety agents representing the Civil Aeronautics administration from Lincoln will visit the Wayne airport Thursday, July 12. The purpose of the visit is to serve the needs of persons in the communities who are interested in civil aviation. In addition to administering written, flight and practical examinations to applicants who have been awaiting the Federal Airman Certificates of various types, they will, upon request, conduct inspections of aircraft, airports and ground and flying school facilities. They are available for discussion of any and all aviation problems which will be glad during their stay, to consult with groups of individuals interested. Normally if no business is presented by eleven o'clock they will leave for other points in the territory where work is waiting. However, arrangements can be made for discussions, inspections or for any matter pertaining to aviation by calling before that time as these agents are vitally interested in the development of civil aviation, and are in a position to offer information on the subject. Taken to Bentback hospital for examination, Hattermann was found to be unhurt. He returned to work shortly after the accident.

4,000 Local Calls Daily They Have Your Number

Have you ever wondered what is behind the voice that says "Number, please." That could be any one of the 11 telephone operators who are employed at the local office. These include Olive Siemens, chief operator, Elsie Novak, Gloria Brammer, Mrs. Morris Backstrom, Mrs. Keith Boughn, Ardith Heitold, Mrs. Harold Gathie, Mrs. Marvina Dransiska, Mary Ann Dolezal, Jean Racco and Marilyn Gamble. Neva Wieland is the office girl, and Wilbur Tonjes and Harvey Grosse are the two linemen. William Schulz is of course, the office manager in Wayne.

Next time you become disturbed with your idea of the service, remember that are 400 long distance calls and 4,000 or 5,000 local calls going through the office every day. During storms in recent years there have been as high as 7,000 local calls in a day. The average shifts for an operator are 11 p.m. to 7 a.m., 7 a.m. to 4 p.m., 12 to 4 p.m., but there are various changes due to the season or just due to the load of that particular day. During the spring the busiest period is between 7 and 8 a.m., probably because people rise earlier in spring and summer. In the winter season the rush-hour interval is later due to the rising and setting of the sun. **Creases, Calif.**

City Parking Projects Get Under Way

Projects and plans are going ahead in Wayne to solve parking problems this week. The city has started a project to widen Pearl St. between first and third streets. The plan is to help traffic and parking in that area which includes location of the post office building and auditorium. Drivers will soon find more parking space in the heart of town at Second and Main where a parking lot will be maintained on the southeast corner. The space has been donated to the city for parking purposes by Rollie Ley. The city plans to gravel the lot after it has been completely filled in with dirt. Different parking angle lines may be used on Main street between First and Fourth to eliminate parking problems. Tentative plans are to increase the angle to make parking easier and to eliminate danger from backing far out into Main street.

Sweet Clover Good Nitrogen Source

Sweet clover planted with small areas on good land can be expected to add as much as 150 pounds or more of available nitrogen to soil per acre in the first year of growth, according to Extension Agronomist D. L. Gross, University of Nebraska.

He says a comparatively small amount of nitrogen fixation comes in the second year of growth. That nitrogen, says Gross, would be expensive if the farmer had to buy it. It would cost about 12 cents per pound or \$18 per acre. That would be \$720 for 40 acres.

Dixon Co. SCS Working on Erosion Control Projects

Soil conservationists in Dixon county are concentrating their efforts on stock water and erosion control dams. It was reported this week by Howard S. Gillaspie, Ponce, agricultural extension agent.

Personnel of the SCS and PMA offices are investigating applications for dams through observation of the proposed sites. These efforts will continue until after the harvest season, Mr. Gillaspie stated.

Approval of many dams has been denied in some cases Mr. Gillaspie reported. He gave the following reasons for most of the denials:

1. Gully can be shaped into a waterway.
2. Watershed too big.
3. Dam too big and too expensive for the farmer.
4. Reason for dam not practical.

Speaking of actual dam construction, the agent pointed out that most dams will require a tube, ranging in size from 18 to 42 inches to handle all average rains. Use of the spillway is confined to emergencies only he added. Size of the tubes will depend upon the watershed characteristics.

Mr. Gillaspie urged detailed planning before seeking approval for a dam. "This is important," he stated, "when a farmer spends money on a dam, he wants it to stay in operation for many years. A dam that will sit fall in one or two years is a poor investment."

He pointed out the need for good pasture management or crop rotation in the planning of a dam. Use of terraces, grassed waterways and contour farming are an important element in the planning, he added.

In conclusion, Mr. Gillaspie said "A dam should be the last thing in a conservation plan. Other practices will keep the soil, manure and fertilizer up on the hills instead of filling the dam with silt. This will give the dam a chance to operate as it should for a longer period of time."

Warn Farmers About Danger Of Blackleg

The danger season for blackleg now here, farmers were cautioned to be on the alert for this serious hazard to cattle profits.

A bulletin from the American Foundation for Animal Health points out that this disease strikes swiftly, with a high death rate.

"If young cattle develop a high fever, lose appetite, become lame and show depression, blackleg may be the cause," the bulletin says. "Typical swellings caused by the disease have a crinkling, tissue-paper feeling if they are touched."

Since the disease is highly infectious among young cattle, and usually fatal, the Foundation urged owners to have the animals checked over immediately if they suspect blackleg.

Blackleg is caused by a spore-forming germ which can live for years in the soil. It may enter an animal's body through small cuts and punctures in the skin, or through grazing.

If blackleg losses have occurred before in the locality, it is wise to have calves vaccinated, the Foundation suggests.

It's also important to burn or bury deeply under lime the carcasses of animals which have died from the disease. Otherwise, the carcass may be a means of spreading the infection to other animals.

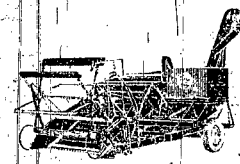

Feeders' Tour Attracts 50-Car Caravan

Operations of five different Wayne and Dixon county farms provided an all-day educational show Thursday for approximately 200 spectators who made the two-county tour. Fifty cars made up the caravan for the tours.

The event was sponsored by Wayne county feeders association, Marvin Dunklau, president; and Dixon county Feeders association, Joe Beckenhauer, president. Under the guidance of Harold Ingalls, Wayne county extension agent, the group left Wayne at 10 a. m. and proceeded to the Marvins Dunklau farm west of Wayne for the first stop.

William W. Derrick, livestock specialist, U of N college of agriculture, served as chief commentator over the portable loud speaking system that permitted discussion of outstanding points of each project.

Dunklau's Farm
At Dunklau's farm the group were shown heifers self-fed on rolled corn while on brome alfalfa pasture. His heifers were bought Feb. 15 and held a weight of 528 lbs. Dunklau has 200 mixed steers on brome pasture while he hand feeds rolled corn plus 1/4 lb. 37% protein per head. He also has cattle on dry lot. He farms 400 acres, about 1/2 in alfalfa and grass. Dunklau put alfalfa in trench silage for the first time this year. Spectators were also shown his grain elevator.

Henry Barellman
The tour proceeded to the farm of Henry Barellman, south of Wakefield, where they were shown his impressive heavy-fat steers in dry lot. Barellman's feeding program makes use of new hay.

Dinner for the group was held in Wakefield park and served by the Salem Lutheran Dorcas society ladies. Frederick Shearer, Coleridge, president of Nebraska Livestock Feeders association, spoke to the gathering concerning status of OPS rollback. Hjord Hyllose, Danish farm exchange student who is working near Wakefield, addressed the group about differences between conditions here and in his country.

Visitors on the tour included Robert Ashby, marketing specialist Morningside college; Lloyd Franstrum, Sioux City stockyards; Mark Cox, farm editor Sioux City Journal and Max Coffey, farm editor Omaha World Herald.

Third stop on the program was the farm of Will Peters and sons near Wakefield. Having farrowed 70 litters, Peters has 450 pigs started four years ago with Chester White sows crossed with farmers hybrid boars that were all black. Resulting pig crop is multi-colored. Peters has 71 mixed cattle, mostly home raised—wintered on silage and grain; now on brome grass, shelled corn. He is growing some soybeans.

Lawrence Hansen
At the Lawrence Hansen farm, west of Wakefield, the group saw

156 cattle on 48 acres of brome and alfalfa. They are receiving ground ear corn; thirty bushels daily in bins. Hanson's cattle were bought in October and carried a weight of 400 lbs. They were wintered on silage and light grain feed. They will be marketed Oct. 1 after 30 days dry lot.

Hansen has farrowed 15 litters. Chester White, on clean ground. His son, Del, carries out a FFA litter project. Hanson acquired his farm a few years ago with buildings and fences in bad repair. Since that time he has constructed a new house, new fences and planted a large windbreak. He sows brome with a fertilizer spreader.

The last stop on the extensive tour was at Leland Herman's poll-d Hereford farm near Wayne. The group viewed Herman's herd of 150 Herefords on brome grass and in bays. Herman makes use of field chopper and has 300 acres in alfalfa and brome. He has made alfalfa and grass silage two years. A point of interest was his hay drier in which he dries chopped hay with forced air. Almost all of the farming carried out on Herman's farm is done by two men.

During his commentary on the tour William Derrick stressed the importance of dry roughage to fattening animals on grass or succulent feed and the value of grass silage particularly with first cutting hay which is frequently spoiled by weather.

Derrick maintains that so called "tobacco brown" hay retains most protein but loses vitamins and minerals. He recommends molasses only to add taste appeal, or dehydrated molasses to preserve ensilage. He prefers ground ear corn as silage preservative.

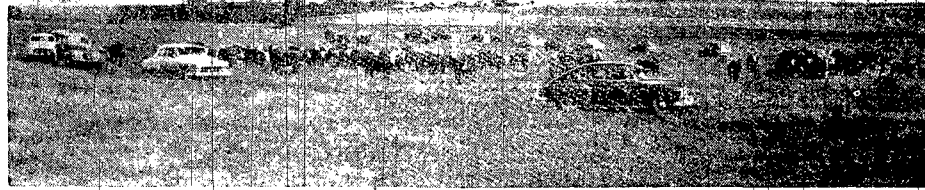

Life Here Calm After Amazon Trip

All it takes to make us appreciate the calm and peaceful life we live here in Wayne is a trip up the Amazon river dodging alligators and avoiding spear-wielding natives. Our community looks pretty good to a man who has tried both and has come back to tell about it.

Robert Armstrong of Sioux City, grandson of Mrs. A. A. Welch, Wayne, spent two years in Brazil's Amazon valley, working with the geology council of the Brazilian government. He worked with the geology crew as computer the first year examining the structure of the ground for a drilling location and the second year running a geophysical survey looking for crystalline complex which is in layman's language granite. The work includes determining the composition of the ground and approximating how it lies; by this modern method, oil is easily spotted.

According to Armstrong the Amazon valley is the largest unexplored geological area in the world, excepting remote parts of Siberia. The river runs east and west across the heart of Brazil and it is 1,000 miles up the river to the first town, Manaus. Civilized people are slowly moving

up the valley along the river due to influence of the more uncivilized tribes of Indians.

"There are actually wild Indians there," Armstrong said. "Some of the uncivilized tribes will kill all strangers; all tribes resent and resist infiltration of any aliens. Many missionary groups have disappeared including the Englishman, Faucet, who has been lost for 30 years. Recently there has been much publicity leading from discoveries pertinent to his so-called removal. Tribes are unfriendly among themselves and often carry on inter-tribal warfare.

Geography books may lead one into believing the tribes are pacified, yet during the past years many men have been murdered. In one case intruders abused the Indians in disrupting their normal life and in felling timber within the limits of the camp. The natives liquidated the aliens, needless to say. Lost Arts

"Seemingly," said the Iowan, "civilization has tended to wipe out the ancient arts of the people." The arts have been commercialized and in some cases lost completely. Industries in Brazil include hides, alligator in particular, wild rubber production, heavy wood industry, and, of course, the mass production of the Brazil nut.

The 50,000,000 population of people in Brazil, which is larger than the United States, is a mixture of Indian, European and negro prevalence. The Brazilian is darker and much more negro than the olive Portuguese. The language spoken by the masses is Portuguese.

Armstrong described a typical tribe of a somewhat wild Indian chief as having large wooden hoops through his disfigured ears. Through his bottom lip is a large hole made in the skin when

the person was an infant. The chief was at least six feet tall and had characteristics of many tribes; even the tribes intermingled and become mixed.

Although alligators are plentiful in the country not many snakes are seen. There is a small fish, Piranha, which eats and kills anything with which it comes in contact. Armstrong said that at the faintest odor of blood or perspiration the fish is attracted and obliterates almost instantly that object.

A determined "no" answered the question was he going back. Living expenses are low; the best hotel,

the only American one, has hot water and room may be obtained for \$3 a day. The food is cheap but very poor. Armstrong stated that there was either meat or a fruit which could be anything "flesh" is eaten, always boiled and never sauteed.

The young man described the Samba as the dance the Brazilians do best; "it is," he stated, "the only place in the world where the dance is done correctly." After all, every travelogue must have color and dash. Mr. Armstrong and your reporter left the shores of Brazil with that final determined splash of description.

Wayne Boy, 9, Finds Stamp Collecting Instructive Hobby

Some of the most renowned people began their careers collecting stamps; perhaps that is Johnny Kessler's fate. Johnny, 9, son of Mr. and Mrs. Yale Kessler, began his studious avocation two years ago when spurred on by his sister Linda, 13. Linda started collecting foreign stamps four years ago and is still in the process.

Johnny's ambition began to show when fourth grade teacher, Coral Stoddard, gave him various semi-rare stamps. He has at least 400 in his heavy stamp book and refers to them through an authorized booklet always beside him. He specializes in United States stamps.

The Wayne boy is proud of a few of his stamps and states that his oldest stamp is a 3c 1841 dull rose, came-looking one with Washington's profile on it. That which is worth the most money is a light green inconspicuous appearing 1913 3c stamp now worth 40c.

Franklin appears on this one. George Washington's inauguration is illustrated on a 1939 purple 3c stamp which is worth 15c unused.

An especially scarce one is the red 1925 2c Norse American worth 40c. The stamp on it reads "The sloop 'Restauration' At the top in white printing reads 'Norse American,' at the bottom is a curved ribbon with 'Centennial' in dark letters. A group which is 1934 1c national park series. The navy blue 1933 3c bird expedition and mint block of four thoma brown 3c pony express are also important in Johnny's eyes.

A favorite set includes the 31 15 stamps in the famous American group. This includes the collectors, poets, educators, scientists, musicians, artists, sculptors and inventors from American stock. There are three other stamps relating to American heritage, two of which Johnny has. The 1920 1c

spotted this one he vowed to do more and he certainly has. His porie presidential stamps are a green one, with Harding and a blue one with Coolidge featured. These were issued in 1938. Another one of his favorites is the block of six, plate number 21841 in green 40c. The 2c carnation Arbor Day flag series is pertinent to the history of Nebraska, said Johnny. On it two men are in the process of planting a tree.

The first United States stamp which especially appealed to Johnny was the 3c violet Olympic stamp show a man sprinting in a Los Angeles athletic meet. After he

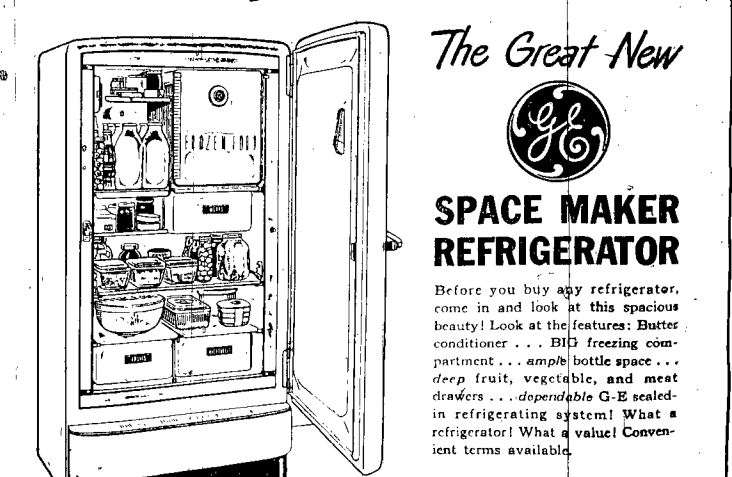
