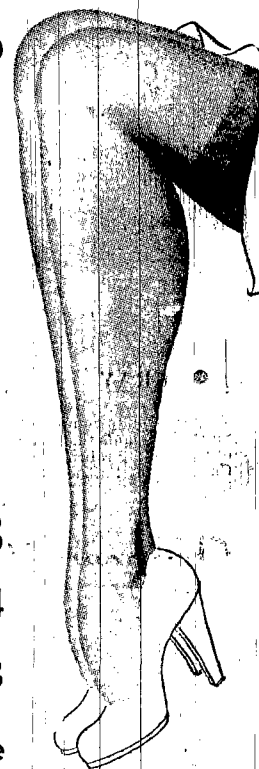

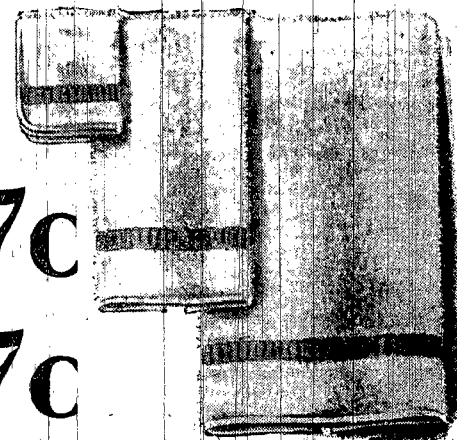

Readers' Decision

At the recent press meeting in Wayne Governor Peterson expressed alarm at the great amount of sensationalism which dominates daily newspapers and radio.

The editor of a daily newspaper is faced with the problem of supplying his readers with the kind of news they want and demand.

How well were Americans informed about events in Korea before the Communist invasion was launched last year? Few in this country were concerned or even interested in that small country until friends or loved ones were sent to fight there.

When the majority of Americans subordinate their interest in sensational type news to their desire for informative news—when they read and listen more to be enlightened than entertained—the press will become primarily a medium of education.

Reds Don't Want War

Stalin does not want war—and he does not want peace. That is the theme of an unusually interesting feature article in U. S. News & World Report called "Stalin's Master Plan."

The broad basis of this plan is described in a subhead, which says: "A triple threat combination is being used by Stalin. Here's the way it works: 1. Keep Russia strong and ready. 2. Let others fight on the fringes. 3. Use Communist parties to soften non-Communist countries."

As the magazine points out, this master plan has been working extraordinarily well so far. Six years ago the Soviet dictatorship was confined to the 193,000,000 people who live within the USSR.

The master plan has its roots in the relatively new concept of power called geopolitics. Russia sprawls astride the vast European land mass. As U. S. News puts it, "On this land mass are concentrated nearly four-fifths of the world's population and the greater part of the world's raw materials. Stalin seeks to dominate this land mass and, thus, to dominate the world."

Looking at the situation logically, there is every reason to believe that Stalin does not want a war directly involving Russia's armies—even as he does want "little wars" involving his satellites and the Western nations. Korea, obviously, is the perfect example. It is the Chinese Communists who have fought and died, not Russian Communists. It is the Chinese Communists who have tied down the bulk of our military force and who have inflicted terrible casualties on our army. Russia herself has not been weakened by the total contribution to the war has been confined to a relatively modest amount of military equipment, much of it obsolete. And Korea finds its reflection in Indo-China and other places where native Communists are fighting troops of the Western powers.

What is our counterplan to all this? According to U. S. News, it "does not exist. There is arms aid to U. S. allies abroad. The United States itself is remaining. But the U. S. and allies find it hard to agree on strategy. And neutrals like India leave big gaps in Western defense lines."

Eventually, the magazine also points out, the Western countries may take initiative, and try to break up the satellite empire. Events and policies are definitely turning in that direction. In the meantime, Stalin is exploiting his master plan to the absolute limit. He has not been incredibly successful.

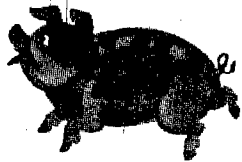

**FEEDER'S NOTEBOOK**  
**Feeding Common Cattle at a Profit**  
The feeder who feeds common cattle on a short period, has three important factors to consider in his operation.

The first is in initial cost of buying the common cattle, the second is the market condition when he is ready to sell, and the third is the cost of getting the 200-pound gain he wants.

While he can buy 600 to 800-pound steers when the market appears to him, there is not too much he can do about the market when his cattle are ready for sale. So of the three factors, the only one over which he has any direct control is feeding to get a 200-pound gain at the most economical cost per pound.

Many of the feeders of this type of cattle use a common grade hay and silage for roughage and cottonseed or soybean oil meal as the supplement. Since the steers have already gained most of their growth, the supplement need not be too high in protein content.

A ready-prepared commercial steer ration, while not high in protein, can usually be used more economically and efficiently than either cottonseed meal or soybean oil meal.

The price of the commercial supplement is usually the first consideration of "yellowhammer" feeders, but actually it costs only about \$10 more per ton and a steer need gain only 1/2 ounce more per day to offset this additional cost.

However, the length of the feeding period enters the picture here. With the proper commercial supplement, the feeder can reasonably expect his cattle to make their 200 pounds gain in 100 days as compared to a period that may run 125 days longer if no supplemental ration of this quality is fed.

Such a saving in amount of feed is augmented by the saving of labor and also in taking advantage of more favorable market conditions.

**Small Vases**  
Mrs. Roe has a 4-inch silver bronze wall vase and zebell vase to match from China. The two-inch clear glass vase from China is intricately hand-painted. There are two matching cut-glass ones which were given to Mrs. Roe on her wedding day by her bridesmaid.

Mrs. Annie Roe, who died three years ago at 87, gave Mrs. Roe four vase vases which the former received on her 16th birthday. There is a large white opaline rose bowl which resembles the antique globular lamps and besides this Mrs. Roe has several clear glass bowls. She has a silver vase which she received 25 years ago, and a small golden one used as a place card at the golden wedding anniversary of her parents.

Mrs. Roe's mother gave her the pair of tall fireplace vases, and she has those of hobnail, frosted glass, and of many different shapes and sizes, readers: a blue star, a pink fan, a chartreuse swan. There is a white vase, with the school from which she graduated. Her husband high, and one of a modern pottery variety of large green leaves. The wooden vase from Wisconsin is quite different, the blue plan painted Indian. The New Mexican state flower is painted on the pot-



tery vase from there, and on another is a sculptured scene of a tree and castle inserted into the side. The 20-year-old coral glass vase is edged with a lacy design.

Besides her vase collection she has over 500 match books. When she has saved eight or more from each state in the union, she plans to make a map of the United States of them.

Because of her enthusiasm for such a pastime, her granddaughters, Judy and Janet Bressler, have begun collections with their grandmother's assistance. Judy collects salt and pepper shakers and Mrs. Roe has many pottery birds.

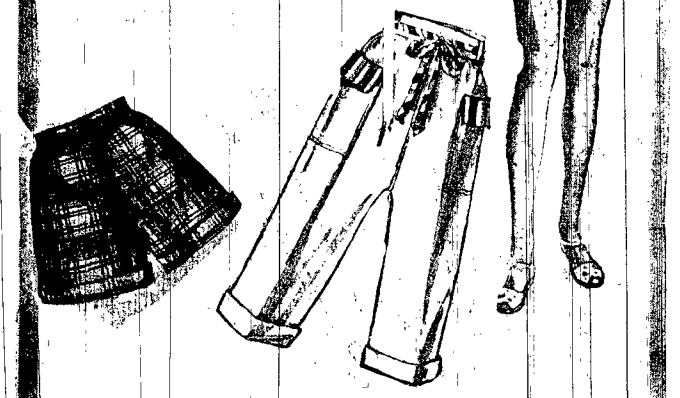
