Dr. Price Selected to Head Morey Scholarship Committee Group Named Will Select Recipients

Dr. Arthur H. Price, dean of student personnel at Wayne State has been selected to head the permanent committee to administer the Morey Memorial scholarship. The name of the chairman, together with the selection of members of the permanent committee, was made at the final meeting of the temporary fund-raising committee last week.

The permanent committee is composed of Price, Henry Ley, Leonard P. Ramsey, Dorothy Huse Nyberg and George S. Criswell. The permanent committee also designated \$2000 to be invested in government bonds and postal savings to finance part of the yearly scholarships for tuition and fees. The scholarships will be of a general nature rather than for restricted fields.

The permanent committee was instructed to draw up an eligibility policy and name the first recipients of the scholarship for the year 1951-52.

Money in the fund over the amount invested will be used to finance the scholarships during the coming year and until sufficient interest accrues from the bonds. Additional money contributed to the fund will be invested to maintain the scholarships.

The committee is very much satisfied by the manner in which students, alumni and friends of the college have responded to this project. Eugene Beeman, chairman of the retiring committee, said, "This response has made possible the honoring of Dr. Morey in a particularly worthy fashion."

Two New Ag Instructors To Join WSTC Faculty

Wayne State's faculty will include two additional vocational agriculture instructors when school starts this fall, it was announced this week. Both will handle institutional on-farm veteran's training at the college.

Ervin E. Morris, who joined the staff at the beginning of the summer, will continue with the program this fall. Clarence Vieux, who arrived on the campus last week, will work with him.

Morris is a graduate of Oklahoma A. & M. and has been working on an advanced degree there during the past year. Vieux graduated from Oklahoma A. & M. last January and has been working on an advanced degree since then.

Fifty-three veterans are enrolled in on-farm training at the present time. Classes meet for two hours two nights a week. During the entire program, trainees receive 200 hours of classroom instruction and 100 hours of on-farm supervision. Trainees are selected by a Veterans Administration advisory committee.

"The purpose of the program is to aid qualified veterans to become established and proficient in farming," Morris said. "The program is designed to cover a four-year course in general agriculture."

Wayne REA Earns Safety Recognition

A plaque honoring Wayne county Rural public power district for completing 30,000 consecutive man hours without a lost time accident was presented to employees and directors at a dinner here Thursday.

About 30 REA members and wives and husbands attended the dinner. LeRoy Griesch, line foreman, received the plaque from L. E. Orchard, Omaha, representing Employers' Mutual Insurance company.

The proposed project would cover about 13 miles and would facilitate better electric service, according to Robert Haas, director.

Art Students Hold Exhibit At College

The talent of approximately 80 art students was displayed Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday at the exhibit from the art essentials, painting and composition, and design classes of Wayne State Teachers college.

Wilbur Ahlvers, assistant art instructor at the college the last two summers, sponsored and set up the show.

Abstract and realistic work in leather, plastic and clay, oil and tempera painting and pasted work were featured in the exhibit which was held in the student union ballroom. Still lifes and landscapes were featured in charcoal, pastel and oil painting.

Wilma Furcher's late summer scene in oil was fresh in brush technique with its lush green and light rust coloring, tinted with blues and water. A single sapling with autumn leaves contrasted with the bright greens and blues. In the same category was Joseph Shreck's simple oil containing a lone half felled tree. The heavy brush and pale technique accentuated the texture needed in so simple a landscape.

Emma Brezina's landscape was pleasing with its summer trees and shallow stream, as was that of Elaine Peterson. Miss Peterson's picture was outstanding with the shell pink rock and the cool water. Helen Aiken brought forth a cool summer scene framed with the setting by tall strong trees.

The design class worked with abstract and realistic forms in abstract composition. Jo Knott worked diligently in tempera with semi-abstract form in the shape of coral reef and rock formations in water. Darlene Lindquist's abstract in blues was outstanding in design.

Wayne County Shows 2.53% Population Gain

Wayne county is one of four counties in northeast Nebraska to show a population gain over the past 10 years. Wayne county's population gained 2.53 percent from a total of 9,880 in 1940 to 10,129 in 1950.

The comparisons are based on figures released by the census bureau this week.

Density of population within Wayne county is 22.9 persons per square mile.

Wayne was the only county in the immediate area to show a sizeable gain. Other counties and their comparisons are as follows:

Wayne Camera Enthusiasts Enjoy Photography Pastime

"Photography is like poor relations—it takes every penny you have," quoted John Parke, Earl Echtenkamp and R. H. Banister, photography enthusiasts in Wayne. Mr. Banister overcame this factor by making almost all of his equipment which he nurtured the hobby from 1938 into the early 40's.

Banister washed the pictures through the ringer and built a homemade drier over the kitchen stove. His Scotch inventive instinct provoked him to using amber and green pop bottles over a light to protect the light on his dark room. The other two men began in March, 1950, by putting blankets over windows in the basement, by using Christmas candles for safe lights; instead of the developing tanks and trays, they used cooking utensils.

All three men started with cheap cameras, and after getting a few good pictures, graduated to larger cameras until they were commercially incorporated. Photography became a growing hobby, and from contact prints they worked up to larger and better styles. Banister discontinued the pastime in the early 40's because of the shortage of materials needed for defense work. He has done very little since, but although his hobby was short-lived, it was productive.

He had a picture published in Life magazine, one of a grasshopper supposedly eating a piece out of a large steel file. It took him several days to work the picture up because his efforts to freeze the grasshopper were futile, and finally he resorted to killing the creature with chloroform. The first picture that won a first prize was a chance shot of a lad peering through a hole in the wooden fence by the stadium at the college. Several others won prizes in photography sections of the daily papers.

Echtenkamp and Parke have not submitted their pictures to professional competition as yet. They belong to a camera club which meets weekly in Norfolk.

Parke became interested in photography because he had two cameras which he did not know how to operate. Soon the two young men invested in an enlarger and a print drier, and their hobby was launched. Banister's older brother had done much work in photography and had transferred the art to him.

Dark Room. With the help of K. N. Parke, the other two photographers built a dark room in the basement of the Parke residence. They used 2x4's and composition board, with the final cost of the four-foot-by-five room being \$12. They do both color and neutrals, and within the past year have accumulated a collection of 700 colored slides taken on trips and around Wayne. They enjoy portraiture, landscapes and still-lives.

Mr. Banister does much work in mechanical appliance repairing also. He is fond of anything "that has to do with wrenches, acetylene torches and ill-smelling grease."

All three men enjoy the relaxing hobby for its challenge. It even has taught them how to cure warts; the glacial acetic acid used in the processing magically makes the disfigurement disappear.

Whole vs. Ground Grain As a Cattle Ration

Cattle feeders are divided in their opinion about the subject of whole versus ground grain. It is generally agreed, however, that the most rapid gains are made with whole shelled corn, considering all grades of cattle on feed, and the varying length of the feeding period, providing, of course, a high follow-up program is also followed.

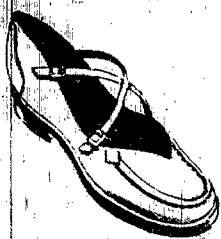
If whole corn is fed, the hog follow-up program must be practiced because of the undigested grain passing through the animals.

On the other hand, a feeder has grinding facilities and his own ear-corn, it will often pay him to feed the ground ear-corn rather than shell it. It has been found that cattle finish faster on shelled corn so one practical method to follow is to feed ground ear-corn during the early part of the feeding period, and then change over to whole or ground shelled corn during the remainder of the feeding period.

Cattle fed ground ear-corn and supplement usually can be packed faster at the start of the feeding period than those fed ground shelled corn. This would be another advantage for starting with ground ear-corn and later changing to ground shelled corn.

Barley is used in some areas as the sole grain, and it should be rolled for best results. Care must be exercised when feeding barley, however, because full feeding of barley may bring on bloat.

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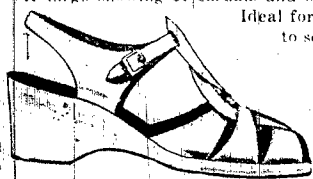
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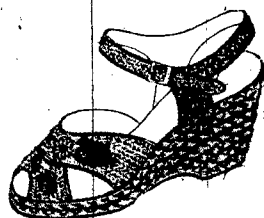

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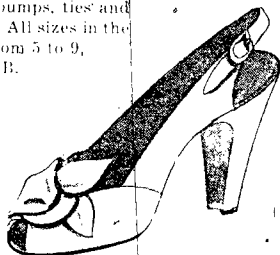

What, then, is the answer? There is only one—and that is the sharpest possible cut in government spending to the point where the budget can be balanced without further tax boosts.

Attorney Serves As Counselor And County Legal Prosecutor

Wayne county attorney, Charles McDermott, serves many functions with regard to legal proceedings in the county—the two most important being (1) legal counselor for county officials and (2) prosecuting attorney in cases involving offenses against the county.

As legal counselor for the county Board of Commissioners and keeps them informed concerning new laws and legal aspects of county government. He is also available to give legal advice to other county officials when they request it.

He is attorney for all criminal and civil cases in which the county is involved. In such cases he represents the state of Nebraska and the county of Wayne. He attends all county court and police cases being tried by the county judge.

In his role as county attorney he does not serve as legal attorney for the people, but for the county. Thus he is not available for free legal advice to individuals concerning personal problems. In Wayne county, as in most others, the county attorney does not normally maintain a separate legal practice. In most cases the county attorney does not file the complaint unless he is certain that sufficient evidence is available to proceed against the county. Usually the county sheriff or other arresting officer investigates possible violations and enters complaints. The attorney then assumes the role of prosecuting attorney.

In Wayne county are prosecuted in either the county or district court depending on the nature of offense. The county court is the lesser court and handles civil cases involving settlements up to \$100 or criminal cases up to \$500 and sentences up to six months. Cases involving higher offenses are held in the district court. In both courts the county attorney represents the county except in cases relating to his private practice. Many legal aspects of county government and functions come under the scrutiny of the county attorney.

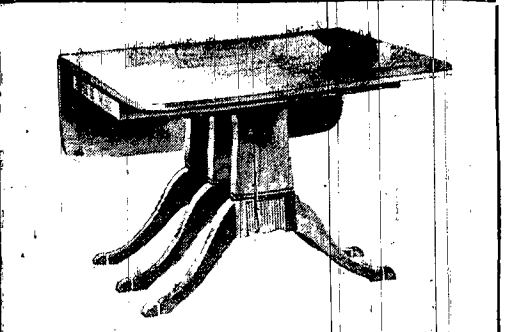

NEBRASKA FARM OUTLOOK



Economic Situation

Many prices have temporarily leveled off. This is primarily due to bulging warehouses and the easing of scare "buying". Prices have risen 22% since the beginning of the Korean War June, 1950, because costs have risen relatively slower, the parity ratio has risen by 10 points.

If the present truce talks materialize, farmers can expect their prices to drop some. The drop may be sharp but it is expected that they will rally and return up near the present level. Farm prices are not expected to decrease much if the defense program continues at its present level. For the fiscal year 1950-1951 defense expenditures amounted to about \$25 billions. With no change in the defense effort military expenditures are expected to amount to about \$50 billions—favorable factor for good prices—and inflation. As long as the nation is fully employed, farmers can expect good profits. Caution: Price declines are expected to come this fall about the time of heavy marketing. Watch your costs and selling dates.

Further beef roll-backs have been scuttled by Congress. Peace talks may kill them for sure.

Cattle

"Prices Steady"

Marketing about seasonal trends; trend may weaken prices. If War truce declared may have price dip. Demand is greater than supply. Watch feeding cost.

Poultry & Egg Situation

The advantages of producing eggs becomes more apparent as the summer season advances. The price of Grade A eggs is advancing, while that for farm run eggs remains stable. As the effect of heat begins to show more prominently on farm run egg quality, the price spread between them and Grade A quality eggs will become wider. Some decrease in the price of farm run eggs can be anticipated later this summer.

Dairying . . .

Beginning of seasonal decline in production. Demand will continue strong. Butter and cheese production increasing. Wholesale milk use and prices up. Prospects for year good.

Higher Fall Egg Prices

Fall egg prices will probably be higher than a year ago. This is especially true for early fall eggs. Fewer chicks for flock replacement were hatched during the early part of hatching season (Jan., Feb., March), than were hatched during the same period in 1950. Poultrymen with early pullets should strive for heavy production in early fall. It may be desirable to retain those old hens that continue to lay and adopt summer management practices that will encourage a high rate of fall production in the hen flock.

Broiler Prices Uncertain

The commercial broiler price continues a slow advance. The price outlook for broilers depends to a large extent on the price of competing meat products, and inflationary forces that affect the general price level. Sales of broiler chicks in the United States are 40% above those of one year

ago, which indicates a very liberal supply of chickens. A drop in consumer purchasing power could have a very depressing effect on commercial broiler prices.

Farm Production Discouraging

Farm raised spring chickens, due to small unit production and variable quality, have not commanded a price that would encourage their production. High feed prices to the small unit producer is also a major factor that will increase the demand among farmers for pullet chicks only.

Hen Prices Up

The price level for hens is considerably higher than a year ago. A larger volume, usually accompanied by poorer quality, will be marketed in the next three months. The price is usually depressed during this period of heavy fowl marketing.

Off-setting the above factors is the fact that frozen stocks of poultry are in short supply (9% less than last year), and more hens may be retained on farms as a result of egg price advances.



Poultry

"Eggs Rising"

Price level for hens higher than a year ago. Prices may fall with heavy marketing in next three months. Grade A egg prices rising, farm run remains stable. Spread in prices will increase as effect of heat begins to show more prominently on farm run egg quality.

Fowl prices are expected to remain above those of 1950, and may advance later this summer.

Turkey Prices Favorable This Fall

Even though the 1951 turkey crop may exceed the record crop of 1950, the outlook for turkey prices appears favorable. The supply of turkey meat in frozen storage on June 1 was 20% smaller than one year ago. With increasing military purchases and defense expenditures, high prices of red meats is expected to result in a favorable outlook for the turkey grower. Every effort should be made by the producer to keep feed costs to a minimum for this is the highest cost factor in turkey production.

Wheat . . .

Winter crop down 2 million bushels from June estimates to 73 million bushels.

Farm Labor and Wages

Labor: At the present time as Nebraska farmers are beginning to harvest summer grains, the supply of farm labor seems to be adequate. As farm work picks up with more warm weather, farmers will probably be able to use a great deal more labor than is available. Farming operations have been delayed this year by wet weather in many parts of the state which may cause several jobs to compete with each other. In a normal year, most operations would be fitted together to make better use of the available supply throughout the rush season.

Half-Million Fewer Farm Workers

There are, however, a half million fewer farm workers in the United States this year than a year ago. This has been caused by the drain of the armed forces on the labor supply, growing demands of industry for labor, and the adoption of more labor-saving machinery since the war. Farm operators in Nebraska worked 12.7 hours per day in 1951 as compared with 12.2 hours per day in 1950. The hired labor averaged slightly fewer hours per day than last year—10.3 hours in 1951 to 10.4 hours in 1950.

Cost of Accidents to Nebraska Farmers

When Your Farm Needs a Friend

(The MONTHLY FARM OUTLOOK is reprinted from Notes on Nebraska Farm Business, a monthly publication of the Department of Agricultural Economics, Agricultural Extension Service, College of Agriculture, University of Nebraska, Lincoln. This authoritative report is reprinted each month by the State National Bank of Wayne as a service to our customers and friends of this area.)

Farm east of town while he was stacking hay. The mishap occurred when the stacker cable lock came loose and let the stacker fall and hit Mr. B. . . Mr. B will be hospitalized for two weeks and he won't be able to work for another two months. He will have doctor and hospital bills amounting to \$500. He will pay out in extra wages to farm labor about \$200 and probably more with harvest coming on. \$700 is a conservative estimate of the total cash cost of this mishap.

Accidents Cost 1/10 of Farm Incomes

It is estimated by the USDA that farm accidents cause a loss equal to one-tenth of farm incomes. On that basis, Nebraska farmers can be assumed to have lost in 1950, as a result of mishaps, the appalling sum of \$100,000,000. This can be broken down as \$933 for every farm in the state. Can you afford \$933 for accidents on your farm?

Still more appalling was the loss of life and limb. Another Nebraska newspaper carried this item: "Carl A. . . landowner, was killed Saturday when a tractor he was driving upset and plunged into a shallow ditch on a county road south of town." This farmer and his family paid the supreme price.

Can You Spare an Eye or a Finger?

A study by the Nebraska Farm Safety Committee gleaned from newspaper accounts figures that listed 388 farm accidents in six months during 1950. These accidents took a toll of 58 lives, 194 fingers, 18 hands, 10 arms, 1 leg, 2 feet, 4 toes and 7 eye. Which of these are you willing to give up as your share of the accident cost in the State?

Too many people really believe that accidents "just happen." And they are likely to think that they can't happen to them or to their family . . . so they leave off the safety shield on the power take-off; they smoke in the haymow; they trust the bull; they make machinery adjustments with the machine running; they drop pitchforks where last used; in other words, they tempt or dare accidents to happen to them. These acts of carelessness make the obituary notices in our papers. These acts of carelessness lead to tragedy. Are you guilty of any one of them?

Accidents don't just happen; they are caused. The tragedy in the accident situation is that most of the causes are preventable. Give a man a horse to help with the work, and his accident hazard is doubled. Give him a machine powered by 30 gasoline horses, and his accident potential is increased almost a hundred-fold. Make that man careless, or a fool—you can finish the sentence. The machinery on the modern farm is one of the reasons why farming is the most hazardous occupation in our country.

A Little Care May Save Your Life

Here are ten rules which if followed will prevent most farm accidents:

1. Never grease, oil, unplug or adjust a machine that is in gear.
2. Don't wear floppy clothing that can catch in machinery.



Sheep

Sheep, lambs and wool prices continue downwards. Feeders scarce. Meat prices to rise.

3. Keep tools in a safe place.
4. Keep ladders and stairways in good repair.
5. Apply first aid promptly, even to minor injuries.
6. Don't smoke around the barn.
7. Keep all safety devices in place.
8. Be careful not to startle animals.
9. Use a staff when leading a bull.
10. Teach others safe practices.

Learn the rules of safety. Follow them. See that accidents don't happen on your farm. You will be wiser and wealthier.

The Fertilizer Situation

The purchase of commercial fertilizers for use on Nebraska farms in 1951 have been made for the most part. Additional purchases may still be made if available for application this fall.

Demand Exceeding Supply

Fertilizer production in the United States will doubtless exceed that of 1950, but increased demand is expected to be in excess of the increased production. Very limited quantities of nitrogen fertilizers are still available at scattered locations within the state in the form of ammonium sulphate and anhydrous ammonia. Fertilizer prices are expected to be about 10% higher than a year ago.

Hogs

"Prices Strengthening"



Controls may be only \$0.40 away. OPS has control written. Larger season shipments this fall won't let prices rise much above legal minimum.

Prices of farm products are expected to be sufficiently high to return a substantial profit on fertilizers used. Indications are that farmers in 1951 will apply 10% more plant nutrients to their soil in the form of commercial fertilizers than they did in 1950. In many cases much more could profitably be used.

Oats . . .

Down 1/2 million bushels to 59 million bushels. On good land good yields. Weeds a menace. Local farmers expect fair to good yields with harvesting expected to be near completion by next week.

More Fertilizer Possible

Fertilizers can be used profitably on acres heretofore unfertilized and the rate of application could be increased on land where fertilizers have already been used. Defense production will compete for some of the essential plant food elements found in commercial fertilizers. As a result there will be some limitation on the quantities of different types of fertilizers that will be available in the months ahead. The development of more irrigation in Nebraska has stimulated the demand for the use of more fertilizers. Crops are more responsive to fertilizers when irrigated. Following the depression years of the thirties there has been an increasing quantity of commercial fertilizers used on the nation's farms, though supply has not kept pace with demand.

Who Wanted Beef Price Controls?

Regardless of what we read and hear now, it is an established fact on official records. (April 19, 1951) that packer demanded that the OPS Agency release its dollar-and-cents selling prices for wholesale beef as soon as possible. Just preceding the release of the beef price orders, the packers sent wires to OPS saying to the effect that unless Michael DiSalle issued the beef order immediately, they would publicly denounce OPS and fight against price controls.
