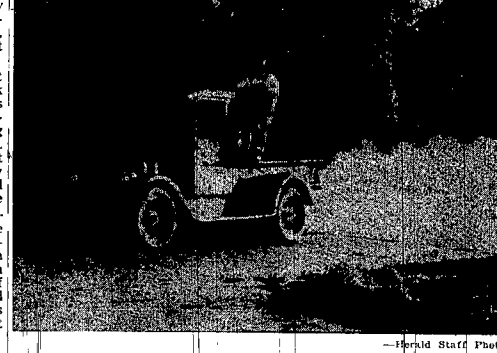

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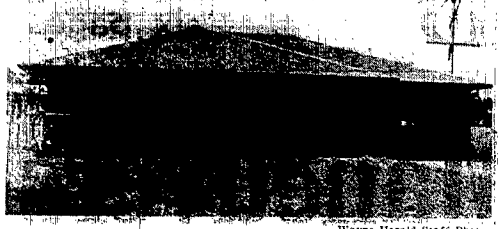

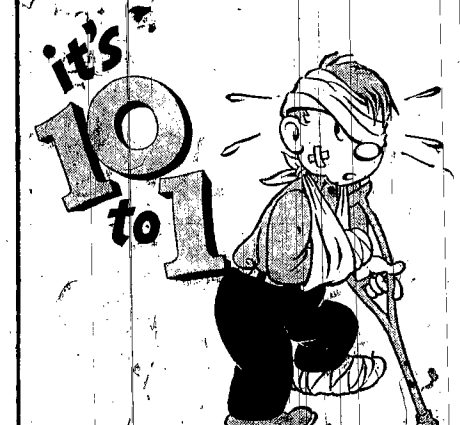

Wayne County Court was created by provision of the Nebraska constitution. County Judge William A. Crossland, is a constitutional officer. He is a judicial officer, in the same class with other judicial officers of the state.



The county court has the power to hear and determine both civil and criminal controversies within limited jurisdiction as prescribed by the state legislature.

The criminal jurisdiction of the court is limited to cases where the fine cannot exceed \$500, or the imprisonment six months, or both.

The county court, within the limits of Wayne county, has concurrent jurisdiction with the district court of civil cases where the demand does not exceed \$1000.

Controversies involving higher offenses or amounts are heard by the district court. If the county judge, without jurisdiction to render and enforce final judgment in criminal cases, he acts as examining magistrate with power to hold the accused to the district court for trial.

In most counties of the state, trials of minor cases such as traffic violations and misdemeanors are handled by justice of the peace courts. In Wayne county, the small courts have been eliminated and the county judge exercises such powers and jurisdiction as well as police magistrate for the city of Wayne.

Recordings of guardianships and probates.

The county judge keeps a fee book as a part of the records of his office which covers fees from such transactions as issuing marriage licenses, birth certificates, certified copies of judicial documents, probating estates, etc. Total fees earned by the county office this far in 1951 are \$1,235.

A native of Wayne county, Judge Crossland was graduated from Wayne High school and received his M.A. degree from Nebraska Wesleyan university. He was graduated with M.A. degree from Washington university, St. Louis, and received his law degree from University of Nebraska.



Bonnie Otte is shown at her desk in the county court office. Mrs. Otte serves as the county judge's secretary. She acts as receptionist, typist and fee collector, at times with other routine work involved in managing the business of the office. A native of Wayne, she has been employed by the county judge for one year.

Marriage Licenses

The county judge has exclusive authority to issue marriage licenses when the ceremony is to be performed in Wayne county. According to marriage records in the county court office 56 licenses have been issued thus far in 1951 as compared to 66 licenses for the complete year in 1950.

The county court has exclusive original jurisdiction on all matters pertaining to guardianships and estates in the county. As a court of record, it keeps complete files and records of all proceedings.

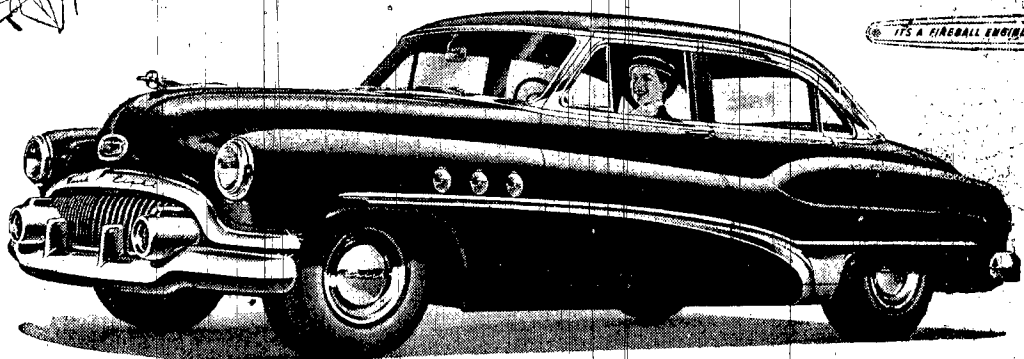

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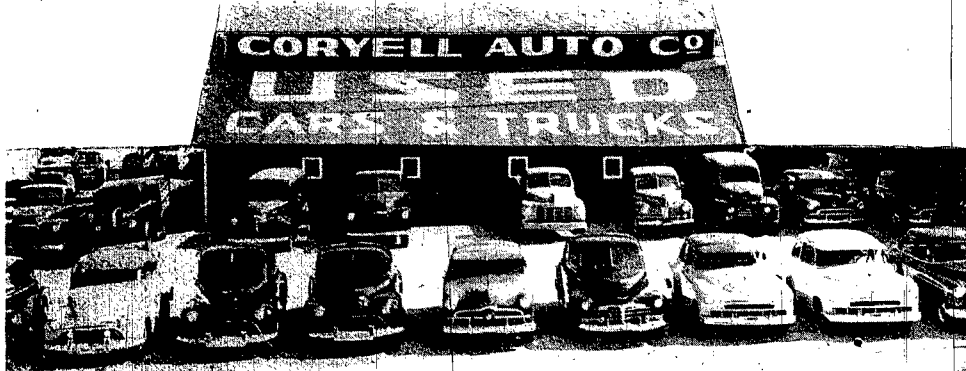

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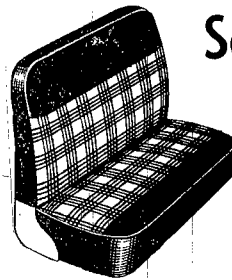
