# Wayne County Tax Levies Remain Stable

## Wayne Farms Rank Fourth in Nebraska for Income per Acre

### County Farm Sales Total \$15 Million

Wayne county's farmers are among the champions in the state, it was revealed today in a report by the census bureau.

A gross return of \$54.73 per acre from the 285,218 farm acres in Wayne county was realized in 1949. This figure ranks fourth among the counties of the state. Only Douglas, Sarra and Cuming county surpassed Wayne.

Douglas and Sarra were aided by the great amount of cattle feeding carried out near the Omaha stockyards. Cuming county's return was raised considerably by the cattle herds of Herman Dinklage, recognized as one of the largest feeders in the county.

Wayne county's farm revenue in 1949 was \$15,609,996, an increase of more than six million over that reported in the 1945 census of agriculture.

Of that amount, \$13,681,108 came from livestock and livestock products. The 1,478 farms in Wayne county had an average value of \$27,992, over \$10,000 above the value reported in 1945.

Cuming county ranked third in the state with sales equal to \$75.09 per acre. Other counties around Wayne were also among the leaders.

## County School Expenses Show Increase; Total Hits \$332,899 Enrollment Tops 1500

With over 1500 public school children requiring educational facilities and care in Wayne county each year, expenses incurred in running the county's schools are necessarily high. According to the auditor's financial report in May, county schools required more than \$332,899, an increase of 12.6% over the \$295,400 spent in 1950.

Total operating expenses of all elementary and high school districts in the county for the school year 1950-1951 amounted to \$332,899.70, as shown by annual reports filed in the county superintendent's office. Of this amount \$176,775.04 went for operating elementary schools and \$156,124.66 was required for high schools. The total represents an increase of \$33,373.62 over operating expenses of the previous school year.

## Wayne REA Receives Commission Approval

Approval of projects for additional distribution and transmission lines and sub-stations in the Wayne REA Public Power district was recently granted by the state railway commission according to Robert Haas, director of the local district.

The distribution contract, to be let on Aug. 30, is to improve the present system and tie-in the existing distribution lines with the sub-stations.

September 30 a contract will be let calling for two sub-stations and 20 miles of transmission lines. The sub-stations will be located three miles east of Osmond on highway 20 and three miles south and one-half east of Wayne. The transmission line will run seven miles north and east of Osmond and the remaining 43 miles will be constructed from south of Wayne, toward Windside.

## County School Expenses Show Increase; Total Hits \$332,899 Enrollment Tops 1500

percent expenses involved in operating the public schools, this brief survey makes a breakdown of the major divisions of expense for the '50-'51 school year as follows:

- (1) Instruction. The largest amount of money needed to run the school system goes for instruction which includes teachers' salaries, books, supplies and (for rural schools) tuition. This expense amounted to \$235,339.04. High school districts required \$99,882.62 and \$135,516.42 went to elementary schools.
- (2) Control. The county school system requires supervision and management. In the high school districts such tasks are assigned to the Boards of Education and secretaries, whose salaries and office expenses required \$21,506.32. The county superintendent's office, which exercises supervision over rural schools incurred expenses amounting to \$6,817.22 which included salaries and supplies for the year. The total expenses for control amounted to \$28,323.54.
- (3) Operation and Maintenance.

School buildings must be kept operating and maintained. Such work involves salaries for janitors and other employees as well as expenses for fuel, light and power and repairs. Such costs during the year amounted to \$46,366.93 for all county schools.

- (4) Auxiliary Agents. Such extra requirements as libraries, health service, school lunches, recreation and transportation involve considerable outlays. During the year these expenses totaled \$11,144.62. Of this, \$2,485.30 was spent for high school districts and \$8,659.32 went for elementary schools.
- (5) Fixed Expenses. Regular costs involved in running the school system such as rent, insurances, taxes and pensions amounted to \$4,932.19 for the year.

Scarities of qualified teachers and increasing costs of equipment and supplies, as well as increasing salaries, may mean higher increases in costs of running the county's school system in the future. As expenses of other things rise, cost of education necessarily increases also.

## English Supervisor Joins Prep Faculty

Dorothy Larson, former member of the Holdrege high school English department, will serve as English supervisor at Wayne Campus high school this coming school term.

According to Milton Hassel, superintendent, the campus school will have the same staff as last year except for the addition of Miss Larson; Franklin Philcox, vocal music instructor; and one vacancy yet to be filled in the English department.

## Courses in Driving Get Schools' OK

At least 90 high schools in the state will be offering both classroom and actual experience in their driver education programs this year, Leroy C. Green, supervisor of driver education in the state superintendent's office, estimated Tuesday.

In the past four years, he said, the number of schools offering this course has increased from four to 76. Last year, 29 schools added classroom instruction.

Both Wayne City and Campus high schools offer driver training courses for students. Anton Netherland will serve as instructor at the campus school and Rodney Love will instruct Wayne City students.

Outlets said that research studies in various states have shown that young people with driver education have had from 45 to 79 per cent fewer accidents, arrests and violations than those without the school instruction. Seventy of accidents is also lessened, he said.

One of the serious problems encountered in Nebraska has been the lack of well qualified instructors, Ortiguesen said.

Wayne State is one of three teachers colleges in the state now offering driver education courses. Courses are also being offered at Peru and Kearney.

Approximately 4,750 high school pupils received driver training last year and 75 cars were used in instruction. Since the start of the program in 1948, the number trained is 22,650. Teachers' trained number 704.

The classroom program consists of 18 clock hours of instruction. Thirty hours are required in the comprehensive program with four or more actual practice driving by the pupil.

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## Valuations Show Large Increases

City and village tax levies for 1951 in Wayne county will remain the same as those of last year with the exception of Windside which shows a levy increase of 3.65 mills.

According to the reports of the Board of Equalization, levies for cities and villages are set as follows: Wayne, 16.30 mills; Windside, 18.91; Carroll, 18.00; Hoskins, 15.00; and Sholes, 3.50. Wakefield mill levy has been set at 18.00 mills which is an increase of .50 mills over last year.

The rate of tax levied for the county has been set at 5.00 mills which is the same as 1950.

For the county and all cities and villages property valuations have shown increases. The county valuation of \$34,688,970 represents an increase of \$3,222,735 over last year.

Valuations for the city of Wayne total \$3,725,860 which is a rise of \$30,265 above that of 1950. Windside's valuation of \$457,595 represents an increase of \$19,595. Carroll's total valuation of \$288,835 shows a rise of \$9,755. Hoskins with a valuation of \$226,880 has an increase of \$10,000 over 1950; and Sholes' valuation of \$40,960 registers a rise of \$2,940.

State levies in the county for the coming year have increased .00 mills to a total levy of 7.24 mills as compared to 6.34 mill levied last year. The rate of county tax to state tax shows the state requiring a larger percentage of the total than was levied in 1950. The 1951 ratio shows the state requiring 38.13% and the county with 6.11%.

In 1950 the state required 34.93% and the county 4.03%. The Free High School Levy for Wayne county has been set at 3.30 mills which is an increase over 1950 of .05 mills. The levy has been set at 1.70 mill and the county has the largest levy of the total 5.00 mills.

The budget fund will take a 60 cent levy general fund has been set at 1.20 mills; Farm to Market road, .25 mills; county relief fund, .14 mills; and county fair fund, .11 mills.

A complete report on the Board of Equalization proceedings will be published in next week's Herald.

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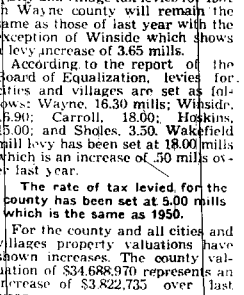

# Refinishing Old Furniture Keeps Wayne Lady Occupied

It is not difficult to see what Mrs. Roy Coryell's hobby is after seeing her home; almost every piece of furniture in her new home so far is a renovated by her hand. A black walnut chair, and a cherry and a walnut table distinguish the livingroom; there are a birdseye maple bedroom suite and several other chairs, chests and tables. In her workshop, which is the family garage, sit several half-scraped, half-gleaming pieces.

Mrs. Coryell began her hobby five years ago out of necessity; she didn't have enough furniture to fill the other home. She began painting and refinishing furniture and then Mrs. Ray Shalander's re-upholstering hobby intrigued her. From the basic steps taught her by Mrs. Shalander and from extra reading, Mrs. Coryell stepped into a new world of creative endeavor.

The first pieces she re-upholstered are a chair and ottoman and her first piece of refinishing was a single bed which she also did. She refinished the Queen Ann chair which she has in her livingroom. She feels there is nothing like the

thrill and satisfaction gleaned from taking a decrepit wooden hunk of furniture and cleaning it up to look like something.

Practical

She is not "foolishly spending money" because she does not buy anything she can't use in her home. Some pieces are ruined by paint and one must know enough about wood to decide the best procedure for refinishing the article. Some pieces lend themselves to paint better than to an oil or varnish finish.

Mrs. Coryell described two characteristics necessary to one with this hobby: "patience and a good right arm." The removal of the old material is the most difficult job, and if the wood is cheap, the finished product is not worth the toil applied.

The Wayne hobbyist first strips all paint and varnish from the piece of wood by using a commercial stripper, a jelly-like substance. Fine sawdust is sprinkled on top of the stripper over the varnish so that the unwanted material is more easily dissolved. With a wide putty knife the sawdust is scraped off and rubbing begins, first with

rough steel wool and then with fine steel wool. Mrs. Coryell suggested that the wood be worked down until it is slick and punge stone and 100 sandpaper are applied, after this.

After the wood is rubbed down to a fine gleam, it is washed with denatured alcohol and left to dry for 24 hours. Fine steel wool is used to rub the piece and then the rubbing begins. The first coating of pure linseed oil is rubbed on before pumice stone and sandpaper, and an interim of 18 hours is necessary before washing the wood off with a damp cloth. If the wooden article will not be used roughly, Mrs. Coryell described a shellac and oil finish to be applied with a nylon stocking, dipping from one to the other.

To finish the wooden piece, oil is applied at least three times with sanding between each. The greater number of times it is oiled, the glossier a piece becomes. No shellac but just oil is used for a rugged finish. For finely carved pieces, Mrs. Coryell suggested using a toothbrush to get into the furrows
