Program Set for Methodist Church's 70th Anniversary

Sunday, Sept. 2 marks the 70th anniversary of the Wayne First Methodist church, and the 50th anniversary of the present building. Special morning, afternoon and evening services are scheduled for the celebration, according to pastor Rev. A. B. Gray.

Former minister here, Rev. E. G. Goley, Nashville, Tenn., speaks at the morning service. Dr. Victor West, Lincoln, is scheduled to speak in the afternoon and Bishop Dana Dawson, Topeka, Kan., will give the evening services.

The morning service will follow the original church dedication program given in 1901. Dr. West will preside when the historical highlights are given during the afternoon service.

At 7 p.m. dinner will be served. It is expected over 500 will be present.

Committees in charge of the celebration are: historian, Mrs. Carl Wright; publicity, Mrs. Wilbur Wiltsie; dinner, Mrs. Ismael Hughes; correspondence, Helen Gillersleeve and Mrs. L. A. Fenske; planning, K. N. Parke and Archie Wert; program, Mrs. R. M. Carhart, Mrs. Edward Seymour, Mrs. Raymond Ellis and G. W. Costerisan.

The church had its beginning in 1881 when Rev. Carter was visitation minister. In 1884 a drive was started to get funds for a new building. The Methodists used the courthouse, Presbyterian and Baptist churches, while the building was being constructed.

Rev. Pittenger was the first minister to preach from the pulpit of the new church in 1885.

Rev. Gort followed Pittenger in 1886. Rev. Myers and Millard were succeeding pastors. During 1897 it was evident a larger building was needed to handle the growing congregation and a drive was started which culminated in 1901 when the present building was ready for use. Rev. Bittel was then pastor.

In the succeeding years the following ministers served the Methodist church: Rev. Wright, Rev. Dawson, Rev. Horn, Rev. Sharp, Rev. Kippatrick, Rev. Gort, Rev. Glofely, Rev. Meyers, Rev. Buel, Rev. MacGregor, Rev. Kilburn, Rev. Shick, Rev. Townsend, Rev. Whitman, Rev. Caspe, Rev. Mills, Rev. Bader, Dr. Victor West, Rev. E. Goley and Rev. A. B. Gray.

The congregation during the 70 years has grown from six to over 500.

Band Boosters Give Report on Activities

Band Boosters were organized March 5, 1948, to secure uniforms for the band and to further promote the band, orchestra, and baton twirlers. Dues were set at 50c. Money was raised through contributions, donkey ball, magazine sales and square dances. The sum of \$3,865.26 was paid for uniforms and \$180 for gold feather plumes.

The band group sponsored a stand at the county fair in the fall of 1948. The members donated labor and put flooring in the booth with the understanding that the organization might use this booth each fall if it desired. The materials for flooring cost \$53.30. An ice box cost \$15 and a stove \$27.50.

Parents pay for dry cleaning of uniforms their children wear and the organization pays for the extra suits, these having cost \$15.36.

Band Boosters contributed \$50 to the March of Dimes in January 1949. Each year the group entertains faculty members at a Christmas tea.

In February 1949 the group paid \$113.72 for the district. The month of Commerce paid an equal amount. The same month the Boosters paid \$294 for 12 uniforms for baton twirlers, \$181.89 for satin and \$35.60 for braids for the twirlers.

Best Phosphate Use Asked by Roberts

Because of a shortage of sulphur for the manufacture of superphosphate, farmers are urged to make the best possible use of available super-phosphate supplies.

T. P. Roberts, chairman of the Wayne county PMA committee, outlines a number of steps which will help make better use of superphosphate in the production of crops needed in the defense effort.

On land that has received moderate to heavy application of phosphate over a period of years, application can be decreased a year or two without serious decreases in crop yields.

Soil tests are valuable guides in determining whether phosphate is needed and how much. Growing and turning under a green manure crop makes phosphate in the soil slightly more available.

About 25 per cent of all the superphosphate produced in the United States in 1950 was distributed under the agricultural conservation program, Roberts pointed out.

DIXON COUNTY CHURCHMEN HOLD CONSERVATION CAMP
Ponca, Dixon county rural ministers and laymen met at the Ponca State park for an encampment and to study soil, soil formations, and its productive factors.

The encampment began with a fish fry Tuesday evening, Aug. 21. Following the fish fry, James M. Dougal showed motion pictures and led the discussion on what comes from the soil, what in the soil causes production and how to take care of it.

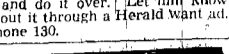

the Dixon County Soil Conservation district. The picture displays a contrast between field production on soil that is thin and was given little, or no protection from erosion, and on soil given extensive care and protection.

After breakfast Wednesday morning, a tour was conducted by Waldo Rodene and Howard Gillespie, county agent. The tour covered the Silvercreek watershed observing the deep gullies in the land caused by water erosion. Harold Pansegrau's farm four miles west of Newcastle was visited to see ways and means of controlling soil erosion.

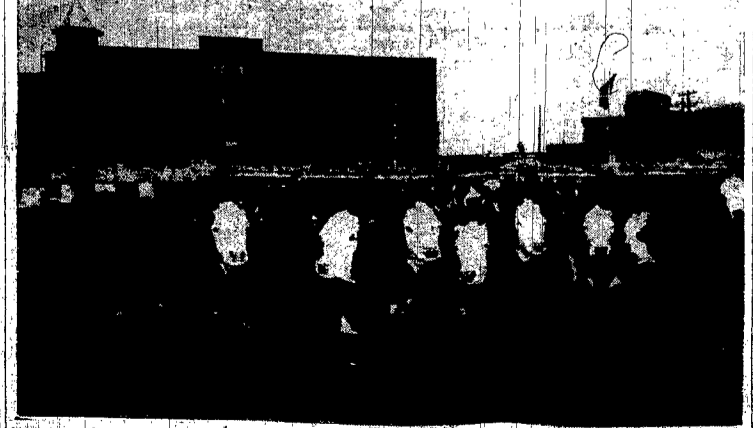

College Instructor Displays Wayne Mortar and Pestle Collection Churches

Mrs. A. J. Lundquist, head of the chemistry department at Wayne State Teachers college, has nurtured a hobby which most suits her vocational interests: she has 26 mortar and pestle sets gathered since 1934. These she owns are not of the common porcelain and agate variety, as she uses in her laboratory, but they are brass, china, wood, glass and iron.



There is only one which she bought for herself, and that is the first one in her collection. She bought it for 50c from the Indian display at the Canadian exposition in 1931. The bowl-shaped one and one-half inch high mortar is of basalt (named) on brass, and when checked it has a molodius ring. From China come seven small brass ones, quite alike and of the mortar mortar shape with small handles. One of these has an engraved design and the rest have a plain design.

wooden set five generations old which a student gave the chemistry instructor. This spice mortar has a history dating from 1862 when it came from upper New York state.

Another brass set with a square profile was taken from a bombed drug store in Bizerte, Tunisia. A New York antique shop supplied the brass one of the flower pot shape, and from New Orleans came another Swedish brass. A very large mortar belonged to an old Swedish family and was found in an antique shop; two others are Swedish in the collection, and still another is from Denmark.

A mortar and pestle almost a foot tall came from a junk shop in Chicago and was reputedly from Russia. A very large antique is from Visby, on the Island of Gotland in the Baltic Sea, a province of Sweden.

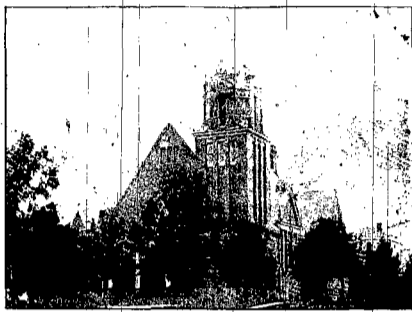

Sign of the Times

A few days ago we walked head-on into another blunder of our times. Touring the county courthouse, we ventured into the treasurer's office and noticed a copy of the 1952 license plates soon to be placed on sale.

This brought to mind the political hokum demonstrated during the 1949 state legislative session when the license plate issue seemed to be the most important in the state. With badly needed legislative demands attracting attention, the Nebraska senators chose to haggle over the system of tagging automobiles. After much passing of time, the abbreviated letter style was accepted.

From the time the plates first appeared there was an immediate dislike shown by the people, and one of the first bills to be passed in the 1951 legislature called for a return to the old style plates with counties designated by numerals.

Thus it was that a portion of two sessions was used—or more correctly, misused—to achieve absolutely nothing. It is another perfect example of cutting out paper dolls when constructive action and thinking is needed.

If a change was really needed the senators could have copied the very workable plan used by their Iowa neighbors who list their counties numerically according to the alphabet, giving the county closest to "A" the number "1" and so on down to "Z." This system should offer no arguments.

But, that is not important. The important factor is the stress the people and their elected representatives place on insignificant issues. If there ever was a time for good, clear thinking it is now. There are so many problems needing solving that there can be no time wasted on trifles.

Protect Our Teenagers

High school enrollment in the United States steadily increased up to 1940-41 when it reached the all-time high of over seven million students. Each year of World War II saw fewer and fewer students in classes. One million dropped out in three years. These boys and girls were war casualties on the educational front. Now school officials say we are slipping again.

Because of this General Dwight D. Eisenhower and other prominent Americans are urging all children of school ages to take full advantage of all possible educational opportunities.

General Eisenhower says, "The American public school is the principal training ground for informed American citizenship; what is taught in the classroom today shapes the sort of country we shall have decades hence. To neglect our school system today is to neglect our future. Such neglect could well be more disastrous to all our freedoms than the most formidable armed assault on our physical defenses."

The problem today is expanded job opportunities made available by the defense mobilization program and the ambition of our teenagers to contribute their part. Their lack of experience makes it hard for them to realize they can make a greater contribution by staying in school. Whether the youth of today is to become a soldier or a civilian citizen tomorrow he must receive the general education for citizenship and the technical training which a modern army, a modern factory and a modern farm all require.

Help teenagers to help themselves by urging them to stay in school.

In Bookland

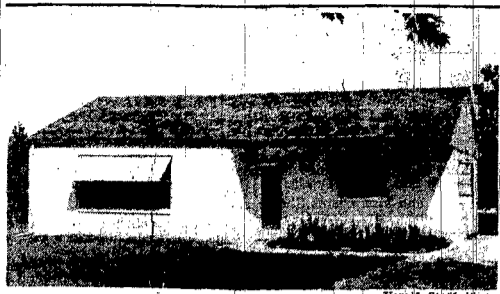

IN LOOKING OVER THE NEW BOOKS we have been receiving recently I have been reminded of the editor who thinks modern novelists write for their own pleasure. If so, most of them seem to be from that category that there are no good books to read that call for there are. It is just the fact that in order to find a few that are good, one has to read so many that are nothing but trash. Perhaps if our paper shortage was a reality the publishers would have to be more selective in the material they printed and we would all benefit by quality instead of quantity.

THE BOOK OF THE MONTH DIVIDEND FOR August was THE GOLDEN BOUGH by Sir James Frazer. Three distinguished leaders in American life were asked to choose the 25 most important books published since 1885. They were John Dewey, Professor Emeritus of Philosophy at Columbia University, the late Charles A. Beard, noted author and historian, and Edward Weeks, editor of the Atlantic Monthly. Their lists differed widely, but on four books all these able judges agreed. THE GOLDEN BOUGH was one of the four. It is the account of use and development of magic, customs, social practices and religion among primitive men and women and here as in no other book, you can trace the gradual evolution of human thought from savagery to civilization. The book when first published in 1922 was in 12 volumes but now it has been condensed to 800 pages in one volume. We do not recommend it for light summer reading but put it in browsing list for next winter, or to use for reference.

A DRIVING, SURFING NOVEL OF MEN, WAR, and the sea is THE BLUE SEA by Nicholas Mousarrat. His writing has been compared to that of John Galsworthy and it is true that you will not forget this novel about the Battle of the North Atlantic. Another book about a man who went to war but written in an entirely different vein is THE RETURN OF CHRISTOPHER by Margaret Eckhard. This one deals with the development of a man's mind and his philosophy of life due to the part the war played in changing his thinking.

Deer Permit Deadline Set

Lincoln—Friday, Aug. 31, 1951 marks the deadline for applications for 1951 special deer permits. Applications postmarked later than Aug. 31 will not be accepted.

According to Lloyd P. Vance, supervisor of the game division, the number of applications has already exceeded 3,000. Sportsmen who wish to apply for deer permits may obtain the official application form from either the county clerk's offices, district game wardens or by writing the Game commission, State House, Lincoln.

Hunters who drew permits in either 1949 or '50 for both years are still eligible to apply for a permit for the 1951 hunt. Any sportsmen getting a special deer permit in 1951, however, will not be eligible again in either 1952 or '53.
