District Corn Loan Notices Will Be Sent September 15

Loans on corn produced in 1948, 1949 and in 1950 maturing on or after Sept. 31, 1951, according to a report from the district PMA office.

There are several ways that producers may take care of these loans. On the 1948 production corn the note may be paid off including interest and no storage will be received. Also any storage that has been paid must be refunded; or the farmer can deliver the corn to the Commodity Credit corporation and there will be no interest on the loan and storage payment will be made.

With the 1949 and 1950 produced corn now under seal, producers can recall this corn or can pay the loans, including interest.

Notices will be sent Sept. 15, 1951, to producers having loans, giving them 15 days to determine the disposition they wish to make of such loans, provided they have not made previous arrangements.

Wallace Buck Shows Dutch How We Farm

Wallace Buck, district officer of the Soil Conservation service, accompanied three Dutch agriculture officials on a tour last week including an experimental and demonstration farm near Havelock.

Thursday afternoon the group visited the Norris Schroeder farm near Havelock to observe soil conservation projects. Buck stated the men were particularly interested in our use of sandy soils.

The men were Peter den Engelfe, an extension director from Holland; Spik Kijpers, soils specialist, and J. Schelling, soils survey specialist. They are making a tour of this country to study the farming methods.

1951 Corn Rate Set At \$1.45

The price support rate for 1951 corn crop in Wayne county will be \$1.45 a bushel under the present government program. T. P. Roberts, district FMA chairman reported last week.

The county rate will be seven cents a bushel more than last year.

No Lower. The 1951 price will not be permitted to drop below this support price, but may go above it. The price is determined on the basis of 90 per cent of farm parity. If the parity price effective Oct. 1 goes up, the support level will be revised upwards.

Other county support rates include: Dixon, \$1.46; Pierce and Madison, \$1.44; Thurston and Cumming, \$1.46; Stanton and Cedar, \$1.45.

Children's Day Slated For Friday

Gates open at 1 p.m., Wednesday, Sept. 12, as the annual Wayne County fair starts a four-day adventure for every member of the family. Dates for the event are Sept. 12-13-14-15.

The fair board announced Tuesday that "the animals were shaping up and it looks like the fair will be the best ever."

Members of Wayne's National Guard unit, 568th Field Artillery service battery, will police the grounds as in previous years.

Opening night brings Joie Chitwood and his nationally famous auto daredevils to the fairground. Chitwood will present a two-hour, thrill-packed show. Last week an aerial stunt with his troupe was killed at the Dawson county fair where both his chutes failed to open.

The fair board never slacks with horse racing and hot rod racing. Following Saturday, 15 to 20 of the fastest hot rods in the state will burn up the track going after the checkered flag and the first place money.

The 80-piece Wayne High school band, directed by A. J. Atkins, will be on hand every day to add music to the festivities. There will be a change of show every night. Gymnastic teams, dance troupes, and sensational acrobats are just part of the entertainment scheduled for the grandstand shows.

Fat Steer Show. The fat steer show is a feature of the fair again this year. Steers must weigh 1350 pounds to be eligible. The animals have to be on grounds by 12 noon Saturday. The entry fee is \$15 per steer with the winner entry getting 40 and 40 percent of the entry fees in this division.

Only a few entries are now on file, but with this year's top prize money being offered there is sure to be a fine selection on hand next Saturday.

The \$80,134.79 bid of the Emul Dupsky Construction company for 16 miles of condenser and tie-in lines in the REA system in Wayne and Pierce counties has been approved by the local board according to Robert Haas, director of this district.

"However," Haas states, "Final approval must come from Washington before construction can be started."

The contract calls for new distribution lines in the area. The lines will carry power from two substations scheduled to be built three miles east of Osmond on highway 20 and three miles south and one-half east of Wayne.

Bids on the sub-stations will be opened Sept. 7.

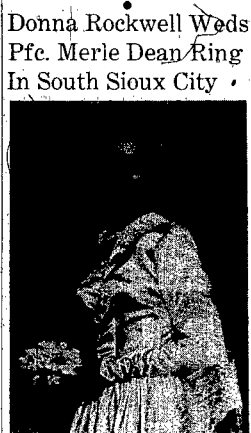

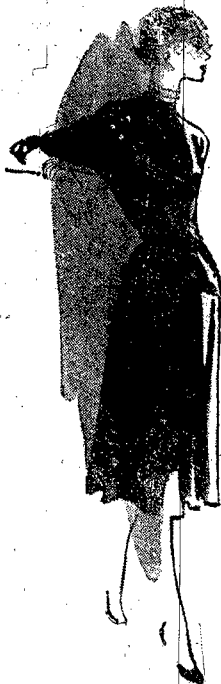

Sculpturing; Painting Hobbies Of Football Coach's Wife

"Art is strictly a matter of taste," quoted Mrs. Jack Wink, artist wife of the football coach at Wayne State Teachers college. To prove this fact she painted out that she likes modern home furnishings but her husband outlaws them from the home. Her abstract and impressionistic oil paintings lie abandoned in the attic of her parents' home in Wisconsin while one of the two only true realistic paintings she has done adorns one of the walls in the Wink apartment.

One of Mrs. Wink's other hobbies is sculpturing which she learned in 1946 while attending the University of Wisconsin. The course was complete in the curriculum for an art degree.

The first sculpturing she did was with clay, beginning with small abstract things and finally working from live models. During this time she was obliged to take on odd jobs doing clay work on the head, then the torso, finally the complete figure. The students were more or less free to sculpture anything they desired from then on.

At this point in her career, just as she was reaching graduation, she was obliged to marry.

Jack Wink in 1948. Encouraged by her father, Mrs. Wink did much more sculpturing after her marriage. She worked with plaster of paris because there was no need to bake it, and she experimented with different textures of materials by trying cloth and household paint. Three coats of paint were needed after the cloth was applied, and Wink did several pieces.

For a plaster figurine, the Wayne artist builds a wire frame and begins applying wet plaster at the bottom. She can mix only a little plaster at one time because it dries quickly. The figurine takes shape and after it is dry, Mrs. Wink chisels out intricate features, more cleanly. Painting is the next and last step.

Her first venture was a woman probably of the Jefferson era, with a bouffant dress and ringlets of hair around her head. This was a paper painted with red house paint.

Her hair was black and her slippers green and gold. The smallest figurine is six inches tall, now on a friend's fireplace mantle. The figure is of a young blonde girl wearing a blue and white dress. The following Resolution calling for special election was duly passed:
RESOLUTION
Whereas, A petition has been presented to the Board of Trustees of the Village of Carroll, Nebraska, petitioning for the calling of a special election for the purpose of voting on the issuance of negotiable general obligation bonds of the Village of Carroll, Nebraska, in the amount of \$20,000 for the purpose of erecting a municipal auditorium in the said village; and
Whereas, said petition is signed by 32 legal voters of said village and which number of voters exceeds 10 per cent of the legal voters voting in the last general municipal election in said Village of Carroll; and
Whereas, a bond to assure the payment of the costs of said election has been filed with the Board of Trustees at the time of filing said petition with a good and sufficient surety in the event that the proposition of the bond issue fails to receive 60 per cent of the votes cast at said election and which bond was approved by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees and the Clerk of said Village of Carroll.
Now, therefore, Be It Resolved by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the Village of Carroll, Nebraska, that a special election be and hereby is called and shall be held in said village at the usual voting place thereof on Tuesday, August 28, 1951, and that the following question be placed upon the official ballot and submitted to and voted upon at said special election:
To-wit: Shall the Village of Carroll, in Wayne County, Nebraska, issue and sell the negotiable bonds of said village to be designated "Auditorium Bonds" in the principal sum of \$20,000, issued in denominations of \$1,000 each, dated January 1, 1952, and payable 20 years from date of issue, but redeemable after 5 years from date of issue, bearing interest at the rate of not to exceed 6 per cent per annum from date of bonds payable annually for the purpose of constructing and equipping an auditorium in the Village of Carroll, Nebraska; and shall said Village levy an annual tax against all the taxable property within said city sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds as the same becomes due and to create a sinking fund for the payment of the principal of said bonds at their maturity?
Be It Further Resolved that notice of said special election signed by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees and Clerk of said Village be given by publication in the newspaper of general circulation in the Village of Carroll for three weeks prior to said election.
Be It Further Resolved that the polls of said special election open at 8 o'clock A.M. and continue open to and close at 6 o'clock P.M. of said day and that the votes cast at said special election be returned and canvassed by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees and Board of Trustees of said Village as provided by law.
Motion was made by Theophilus and seconded by Sans that the foregoing resolution be approved and adopted. The question was put by the Chairman and on roll call the members of the board of trustees voted as follows: Theophilus Sans, Bailey Petersen, Theophilus Johnson, Voting No. None.
The Mayor declared the resolution duly passed and adopted and stated that the same was approved by him.

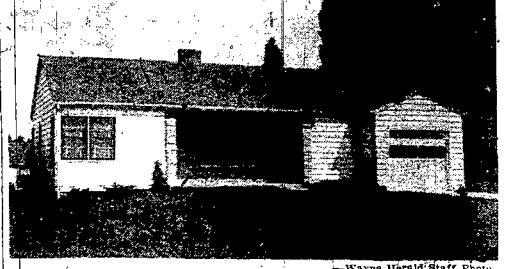

There are six rooms and a bath besides a full basement and much storage space in the attic. The home measures 48x36, with the living room 24x14 and the L-shaped dining room 11x12. 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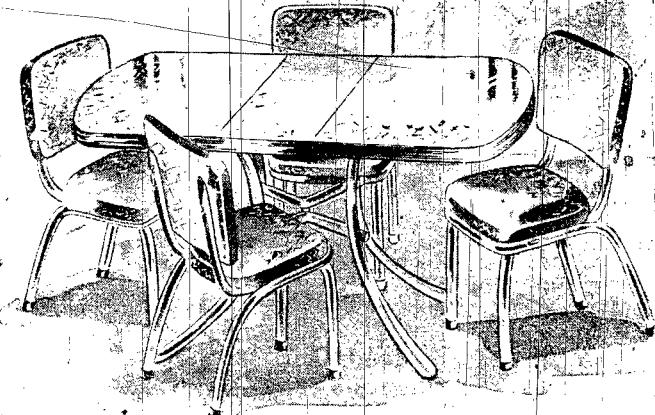
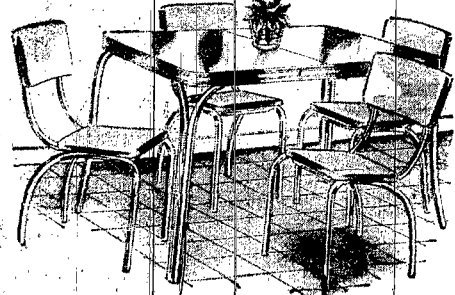

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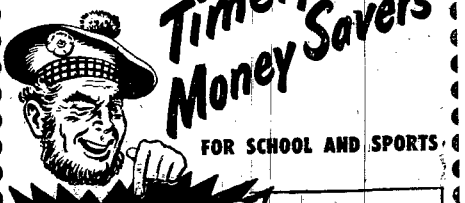

Bicycle Safety
With school starting this week let us all become more safety minded. Far too many bicycle accidents occur because adult drivers forget that youth lives in a dream world of its own. Cyclists dart here and there without rhyme or reason. They zip out of driveways and alleys and side streets. They go tearing past your car as if they want to see how closely they can miss your front fender. They stop when the light is green, go when the light is red. They scare the daylight out of pedestrians, practice loops in the middle of the road, coast with their feet on the handlebars in the middle of traffic, and too often they ride double on the bicycle.

It may not be fair, but everyone expects you as a motorist to know exactly what a bicyclist is going to do. They expect you to be responsible for the youngster's whim if you happen to hit one with your car. You can run into a ten-ton truck and bang up your car all you want to; people will say that's too bad. But if you run into a little girl on a bicycle and injure her, they will say that people like you have no business driving a car anyway. Maybe they aren't too far wrong at that. A bicyclist does not have much chance of winning out against an automobile. The advantages are all on your side, so give the child on the bicycle a break and do as much thinking for him as you can.

That's one side of the bicycle safety problem. Another angle is to educate children in bicycle safety. It takes a lot of time and organized effort, but it will also pay big dividends if it saves one child's life. The records bear plenty of evidence that we can't trust motorists to save the lives of all children riding bicycles. There in Wayne an effort is being made to instill good bicycle riding habits in the youngsters. The parents who have been instilled and bicyclists who have broken rules have been censured. The men behind these campaigns are to be congratulated. But, even then, is enough being done? Every year sees a new crop of injuries and deaths due to collisions between bicycles and automobiles. There isn't any doubt that cooperation between bicyclists and motorists could reduce this tragedy. Perhaps some civic-minded individual or organization should start a bicycle club.

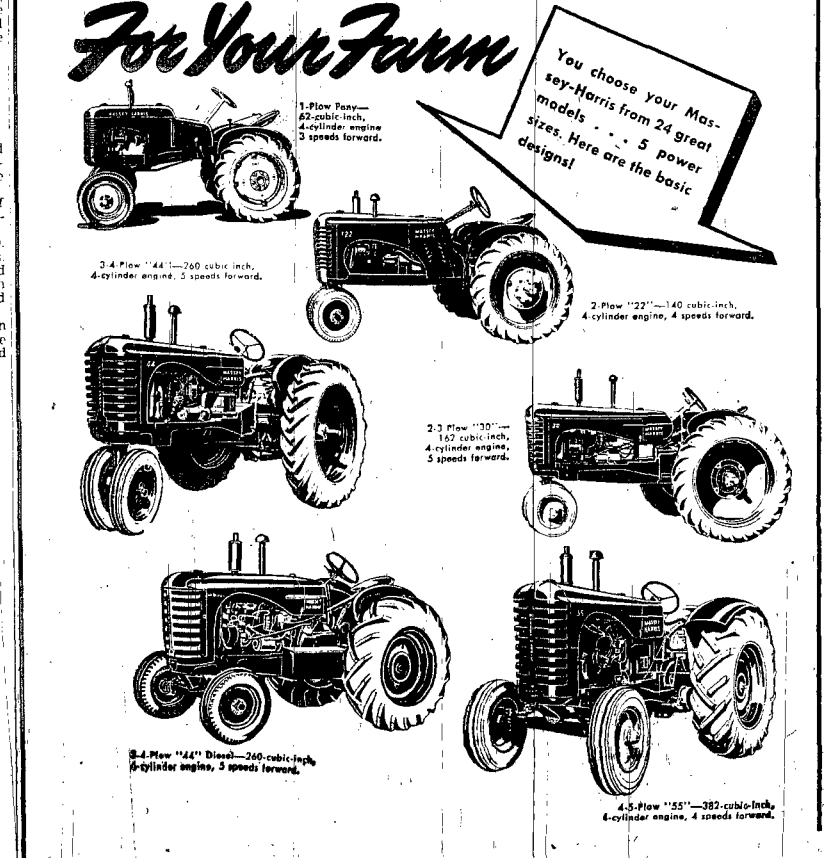

Restricted areas will be: Sioux, Scottsbluff, Banner, Kimball, Dawes, Box Butte, Morrill, Cheyenne, Deuel, Garden, Sheridan, Cherry, Grant, Arthur, Hooker, McPherson, Thomas, Hamlin, Loup, Garfield, Wheeler, Brown, Rock, Holt, Keya Paha, Boyd, Antelope and the west half of Knox counties.

Goose Season
The goose season was set at Nov. 10-12, with a limit of two birds daily and two in possession. Open will be all of Buffalo, Hall, Phelps, Kearney, Adams, Harlan, Franklin, Webster, Hamilton, Clay, Nuckolls, Saunders, Lancaster, Gage, Douglas, Sarpy, Cass, Thayer, Polk, Otter, Butler, York, Nemaha, Seward, Fillmore, Pawnee, Saline, Jefferson and Richardson counties.

Quail Season
The quail season is set for Nov. 1-25 with a daily bag of seven birds and a possession limit of seven. Open will be all of Buffalo, Hall, Phelps, Kearney, Adams, Harlan, Franklin, Webster, Hamilton, Clay, Nuckolls, Saunders, Lancaster, Gage, Douglas, Sarpy, Cass, Thayer, Polk, Otter, Butler, York, Nemaha, Seward, Fillmore, Pawnee, Saline, Jefferson and Richardson counties.
