

Weatherman Causes Fair Officials Trouble

Wayne State Teachers College Enrollment Down 20 Per Cent High-Prep Figures Top Last Year's

Except for WSTC, enrollment is about on par with last year's. Here are the figures released by school officials last week.

Wayne State

Enrollment at Wayne State shows a drop of 20 per cent under last year for a total of 606 students compared to the present time compared to the final figure of 756 last year, according to Milton B. Childs, registrar of the college.

Several registrations which have not been completed will bring the final figure slightly higher, Childs said.

The number of men students has dropped slightly behind the number of women with 297 men registered and 349 women. Last year the men had a substantial lead 401 to 362.

Largest class this year is the freshman class with 251 new students starting college. Last year's beginning class totaled 318. There are 188 sophomores, 78 juniors, 84 seniors and six special graduates.

Largest drop is shown between the sophomore and junior years which would indicate that a number of students left school after receiving two-year teaching certificates to take teaching positions, according to Childs. Some girls also account for a number of drops.

The decrease in enrollment at Wayne State seems to be in line with the estimated national trend. See ENROLLMENT — Page 2

Emil Dupsky Low Bidder On REA Job

The \$156,888.10 bid of the Emil Dupsky Construction company for two sub-stations and 20 miles of 69 thousand-volt transmission lines for the REA system in Pierce and Wayne counties was approved Friday by the local board, according to Robert Haas, director of this district.

"Of course" Haas said, "Final approval must come from Washington."

The sub-stations will be built three miles east of Osmond on highway 20 and three miles south and one-half east of Wayne. Construction will begin on the Osmond station first.

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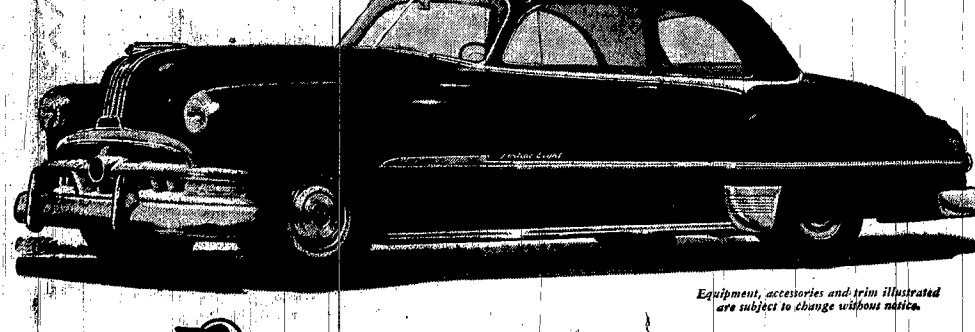

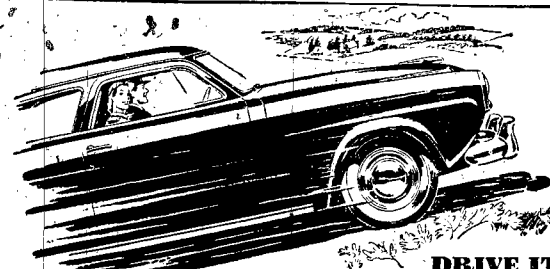

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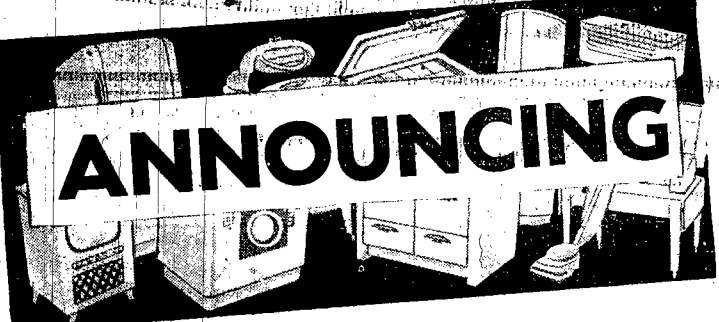

Mrs. Clara Heylmun Amuses Students with Puppet Shows

Puppets are even better than television. At least most children have that opinion. This is evidenced by the experience of Mrs. Clara Heylmun, Wayne puppet maker and manipulator.

Mrs. Heylmun gave evidence of this enthusiasm by describing audience reaction at a recent puppet show staged by her third grade pupils before a Wayne mother's club. The very small children in the audience were so intrigued by the "dollies" they swooned upon and almost besieged the puppets before their embarrassed mothers could restrain them.

This is only one of the many experiences detailed in the puppet business. Mrs. Heylmun has been an interested operator for 15 years, during which she has led each of her Wayne Prep third grade classes through the creative processes of making puppets, writing stories for them and operating them through the action.

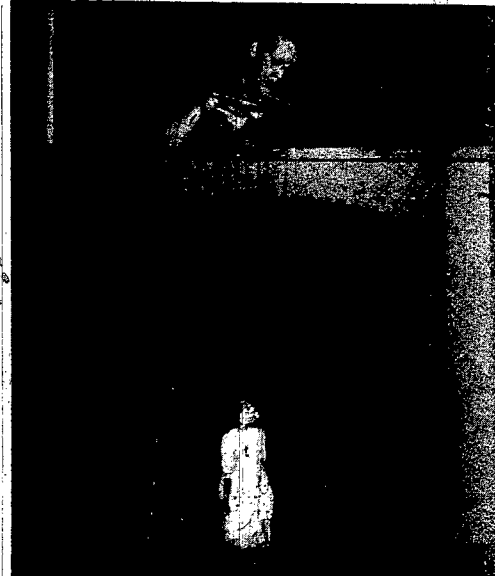
Mrs. Heylmun became interested in marionettes via her own reading. But it was because of a Miss Troy who instructed in public schools in Chicago, that the Wayne teacher made her first one. The Chicago lady gave a summer course in puppetry at Wayne State Teachers college but because of school, Mrs. Heylmun was unable to take the course. After school every evening Mrs. Heylmun brooded through the puppets and discovered how they were best constructed. For the show given by Miss Troy, Mrs. Heylmun made a cloth mounted puppet piano player. She painted the face with oil paint.

Mrs. Heylmun likes marionettes best and uses them in connection with her English courses. The eight-year-old children make a story into a play, writing the conversation themselves. As they say the words they operate the puppet.

In health skits the children show their versatility in free conversation. There is usually a mother nurse and child in the different health exercises and some of the children are "quite clever" in making the puppets act. Rhythm exercises are popular with the children and they react by moving the hands or feet of the dolls in time.

The first work Mrs. Heylmun did with marionettes was in a cardboard box with dolls on only one wire. She tried shadow and hand action for entertainment then, finally concentrating on marionettes with several strings. Those she has now have seven strings on their T-shaped contrivance.

She used a piano box for a stage before buying the regular 8x8-foot stage from the AAUW creative arts group. Mrs. Heylmun believes the stage difficult to elevate and realizes that only a small audience at

bend, move their head, move arms. The operator can use both controls in one hand. By moving each separate string with the other hand, more specialized action is accomplished. Mrs. Heylman says it takes a naturally quick person to operate them best.

One is a forest, another is the interior of a home with fireplace, doors and windows. Still another is plain and on this cloth may be pinned any properties desired. The stage is arranged so that a large board and curtain hides the operator from the audience.

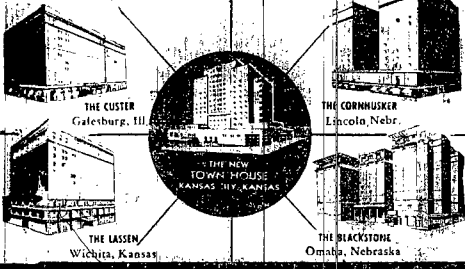

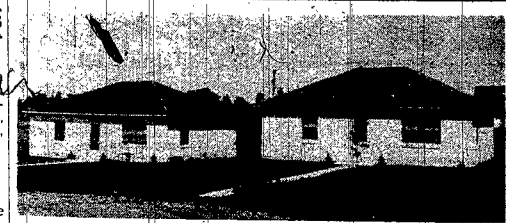

Some Farm Product Imports Restricted

Washington—No commercial imports of peanuts, peanut oil, butter, butter oil and non-fat dried milk solids will be permitted for domestic consumption, the Department of Agriculture has announced. Imports of cheese and casein have been placed on a quota basis. This action has been taken in accordance with provisions of the Defense Production act, which requires that controls be imposed on fats and oils, butter, cheese and other dairy products if the importation would (1) impair or reduce domestic production, (2) interfere with orderly domestic storing and marketing, or (3) result in any unnecessary burden or expenditure under any government price support program. Uncontrolled imports of the specified commodities would have one or more of these adverse effects, the department states.



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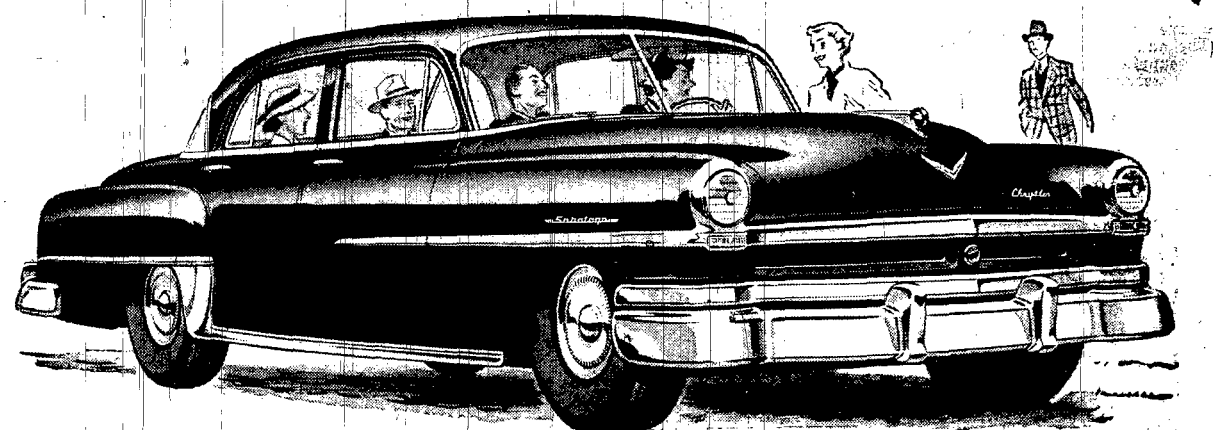
