### **Economic Situation**

Inflation still remains the favorite topic of dis-cussion by many leaders inside and outside of agri-culture. Even though prices are still edging for-ward on many durable goods like stoves, refrigera-tors, automobiles and furniture, agricultural prices on the down turn.

are on the down turn.

Within agriculture, inflation reached its peak last February. In February prices paid to farmers reached an all time high, and the parity ratio stood at 113 for the U.S. and 128 for Nebraska. Since February, farm prices, as a group, have fallen 7'. All major commodity prices, except beef, veal, sheep, lamb and wool, are selling below the parity price. This may explain why congress failed to vote a new and stronger price control law.

Beef Feeding & Control

Current features of the national beef cattle situation which seem important to Nebraska feeders include (1) the new price control law, (2) recent trends in inflation, (3) prospective volume of marketings of beef cattle and hogs, (4) prospective supplies of feed grains and (5) the number of cattle on feed in the Corn Belt states.

### No August and October Rollback

No August and October Rollback
Ceiling prices of cattle cannot be less than 90%, of the actual price (by grade) on May 19, 1951, under the provisions of the Defense Production Act amendments of 1951. This prohibits the rollbacks in prices of beef and of cattle that had been scheduled for August 1 and October 1. The average level of cattle prices is limited by restrictions that went into effect June 4 and prices of beef at wholesale and retail remain under the ceilings made effective last May. Controls on slaughterers have been removed.



Prices remain steady on better slaughter grades. Feeder prices are seasonally strong. Demand is strong for immediate delivery par-ticularly for lighter weights.

Inflationary forces have lessened somewhat: thus easing the upward trend in the demand for meat. Cattle prices in the latter part of 1951 may weaken occasionally, in view of the high level of present prices of beef and prospective increases in marketings of both beef cattle and hogs. However, the constantly increasing defense expenditures will continue to have a strengthening effect on the demand for meat.

### Prices May Weaken

Fall marketings of cattle are expected to show a sharp seasonal increase, and marketing of hogs in the late summer and early fall will probably exceed last year's marketings for the same season

by 5 to 10%. Hog slaughter may continue to increase through the summer of 1952. The competitive effect of increased pork supplies will have an important bearing upon the price of beef.

With a large carry-over on hand and with a large crop of feed grains in prospect for 1952, feed supplies appear sufficient for current needs. The

Nebraska corn crop estimated to average 32 bushels per acre, as of September 1. Crop is

total supply of feed grains in prospect seems sufficient to support the prospective increase in live-stock production, with a moderate reduction in carry-over at the end of 1951-52. The beef-feed grain ratio of 21.2 on July 15 was still quite favor-able to feeders.

### Cattle Numbers Up in U.S.; Meat Production Down

The total number of beef cattle in heads is ap-proaching the 1945 all time high. However, the total number of cattle slaughtered through Janu-

ary-June, 1951, was 9% below a year ago. Calf-slaughtering was 18% below for the same period. The total pounds of beef slaughtered was down only 7% because average weights were heavier.

### Cattle Numbers Down in Nebraska.

Cattle Numbers Down in Nebraska.

The number of cattle on feed in Nebraska on July 1, 1951, was 57. less than a year ago. In the Corn Belt States the combined average decrease was 9%. The decline was 17% in the eastern Corn Belt, and 6% in the western Corn Belt. All of the Corn Belt states showed decrease except Wisconsin and South Dakota where the number on feed increased 5%. The greatest decrease of 25% was in Kansas. In Indiana and Illinois the indicated decrease was 20 and 21%, respectively. Heavy marketings of fed cattle in April, May and June may have been a contributing factor in the reduction in the number of feeders on hand on July 1. In Illinois, Iowa and Nebraska, the marketings of fed cattle during this period were 14% higher than in the same period in 1950.

### A Good Way to Save Your Soft Corn

prices weakening except for lambs.

Unless Jack Frost delays his annual appearance, many Nebraska farmers are going to have soft corn. The best way to salvage this late corn is to make silage of it. If you don't have a silo you may construct a temporary silo with little expense and work.

The cheapest silo to build is the so-called aboveground trench. As its name implies, it is completely above ground and consists of two parallel ridges of dirt between which the silage is placed. You will find it easy to fill without special equipment.

Marion McCoy of York, Neb., one mile west of U.S. 34, built a temporary above-ground trench silo last fall. According to Alvah R. Hecht, County Extension Agent of York county, Mr. McCoy's silo was the first of its kind in Nebraska. Mr. McCoy liked his silo so well that he plans to have two this fall.

The cost of building an above-ground trench silo is very small. Mr. McCoy hired a buildozer for \$30 to do the job, which took two hours. One hundred tons of silage fed Mr. McCoy's 45 head of dairy cattle for 115 days. He says that it is easier to fill and to feed from than his pit silo. One thing Mr. McCoy likes about his above-ground trench

products prices are generally unchanged.

was that he could make it as long as necessary, depending upon how much corn he had to ensile. In filling the silo, one row of sorgo was used, then a row of corn, etc.

Charles Malin, who lives six miles west of Mr. McCoy, has an above-ground silo that he began filling in July with chopped alfalfa. He saw Mr. McCoy, silo last winter and thought it was a good idea. There is no one correct size to build above-ground trench silos.

If you have more time you may prefer a regular trench silo. Trench silos are dug in the ground and require better drainage, but they are more permanent. Recommended dimensions include a depth of eight feet, with the width tapering from 12 feet at the top to eight feet at the bottom. The length is determined by the amount of space needed.

Other temporary silos that can be used in cases of emergency are the "fence" and "straw bale" silos.

Regardless of the type of silo you plan to use, the following factors should be understood and practiced:

1. Build on a well drained area—preferably on a knoll.

2. Build in an accessible area—near a hard surfaced lane or road, if possible.

3. Leave adequate room beyond each end for hauling.

4. Tramp or pack as solidly as possible—vou

hauling.

4. Tramp or pack as solidly as possible—you must get the air out to prevent spoilage. Use tractor or truck on trench type silos.

5. Cover with four to six inches of dirt.
Anyone interested in building a temporary silo can get more complete information by securing a copy of E.C. 728 "Temporary or Emergency Silos" from the County Extension Office.
